**2. Patron:** Howell

**3. Committee:** Passed Both Houses.

**4. Title:** Juvenile code.

**5. Summary:** Makes various clarifying changes in code sections pertaining to juveniles and juvenile court provisions. The bill specifies any juveniles found to have committed a violation of subsection A (underage consumption, purchase and possession of alcohol) will have the disposition handled according to the provisions of Article 9 (§ 16.1-278 et seq.) of Chapter 11 of Title 16.1. The substitute also allows juvenile probation officers to keep relevant photographs in their files, provides that a guardian ad litem of a child may file a petition alleging that the child is in need of services or supervision, specifies that a petition must be filed (rather than proceeding informally) if the offense for which the juvenile had been previously adjudicated delinquent would be a felony if committed by an adult. The House substitute restores references to juvenile boot camps.
