3	A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 2.2-3300 and 15.2-1812 of the Code of Virginia, relating to wars
4	recognized on Veterans Day and local monuments and memorials.

9	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That §§ 2.2-3300 and 15.2-1812 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:
11	§ 2.2-3300. Legal holidays.
12	It is the policy of the Commonwealth to fix and set aside certain days in the calendar year as legal
13	holidays for the people of Virginia. In each year, the following days are designated as legal holidays:
14	January 1 - New Year's Day.
15	The Friday preceding the third Monday in January - Lee-Jackson Day to honor Robert Edward Lee
16	(1807-1870) and Thomas Jonathan (Stonewall) Jackson (1824-1863), defenders of causes.
17	The third Monday in January - Martin Luther King, Jr., Day to honor Martin Luther King, Jr.,
18	(1929-1968), defender of causes.
19 20	The third Monday in February - George Washington Day to honor George Washington (1732-1799), the first President of the United States.
20 21	The last Monday in May - Memorial Day to honor all persons who made the supreme sacrifice in
22	giving their lives in defense of Virginia and the United States in the following wars and engagements
$\frac{12}{23}$	and otherwise: Indian Uprising (1622), French and Indian Wars (1754-1763), Revolutionary War
24	(1775-1783), War of 1812 (1812-1815), Mexican War (1846-1848), War Between the States
25	(1861-1865), Spanish-American War (1898), World War I (1917-1918), World War II (1941-1945),
26	Korean War (1950-1953), Vietnam War (1965-1973), and Operation Desert Shield-Desert Storm
27	(1990-1991). On this day all flags, national, state, and local, shall be flown at half staff or mast to honor
28	and acknowledge respect for those who made the supreme sacrifice.
29	July 4 - Independence Day to honor the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
30	The first Monday in September - Labor Day to honor all people who work in Virginia.
31	The second Monday in October - Columbus Day and Yorktown Victory Day to honor Christopher
32	Columbus (1451-1506), a discoverer of the Americas, and the final victory at Yorktown on October 19,
33	1781, in the Revolutionary War.
34	November 11 - Veterans Day to honor all persons who served in the Armed Forces of Virginia and
35 36	the United States in the following wars and engagements and otherwise: Indian Uprising (1622), French and Indian Wars (1754-1763), Revolutionary War (1775-1783), War of 1812 (1812-1815), Mexican War
30 37	(1846-1848), War Between the States (1861-1865), Spanish American War (1898), World War I
37 38	(1940-1846), war between the States (1801-1805), Spanish American war (1896), world war 1 (1917-1918), World War II (1941-1945), Korean War (1950-1953), Vietnam War (1965-1973), and

40	Enduring Freedom (2001-), and Operation Iraqi Freedom (2003-).
41	The fourth Thursday in November and the Friday next following - Thanksgiving Day to honor and
42	give thanks in each person's own manner for the blessings bestowed upon the people of Virginia and
43	honoring the first Thanksgiving in 1619.
44	December 25 - Christmas Day.
45	Whenever any of such days falls on Saturday, the Friday next preceding such day, or whenever any
46	of such days falls on Sunday, the Monday next following such day, and any day so appointed by the
47	Governor of the Commonwealth or the President of the United States, shall be a legal holiday as to the
48	transaction of all business.
49	§ 15.2-1812. Memorials for war veterans. A locality may, within the geographical limits of the
50	locality, authorize and permit the erection of monuments or memorials for any war or conflict, or for
51 52	any engagement of such war or conflict, to include the following monuments or memorials: Algonquin (1622), Erench and Indian (1754, 1762), Beyelutionery (1775, 1782), War of 1812 (1812, 1815), Mariann
52 53	(1622), French and Indian (1754-1763), Revolutionary (1775-1783), War of 1812 (1812-1815), Mexican (1846-1848), Confederate or Union monuments or memorials of the War Between the States
53 54	(1846-1848), Confederate or Union monuments or memorials of the War Between the States (1861-1865), Spanish-American (1898), World War I (1917-1918), World War II (1941-1945), Korean
54 55	(1950-1953), Vietnam (1965-1973), Operation Desert Shield-Desert Storm (1990-1991), <i>Global War on</i>
55 56	<i>Terror (2000-), Operation Enduring Freedom (2001-),</i> and Operation Iraqi Freedom (2003-). If
57	such are erected, it shall be unlawful for the authorities of the locality, or any other person or persons,
58	to disturb or interfere with any monuments or memorials so erected, or to prevent its citizens from

taking proper measures and exercising proper means for the protection, preservation and care of same.
For purposes of this section, "disturb or interfere with" includes removal of, damaging or defacing
monuments or memorials, or, in the case of the War Between the States, the placement of Union
markings or monuments on previously designated Confederate memorials or the placement of
Confederate markings or monuments on previously designated Union memorials.

64 The governing body may appropriate a sufficient sum of money out of its funds to complete or aid 65 in the erection of monuments or memorials to the veterans of such wars. The governing body may also 66 make a special levy to raise the money necessary for the erection or completion of any such monuments 67 or memorials, or to supplement the funds already raised or that may be raised by private persons, 68 Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion or other organizations. It may also appropriate, out of

69 any funds of such locality, a sufficient sum of money to permanently care for, protect and preserve such

70 monuments or memorials and may expend the same thereafter as other funds are expended.
