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## **HOUSE BILL NO. 861**

A BILL to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Article 13 of Chapter 3 of Title 58.1 a section numbered 58.1-439.12:03, relating to motion picture film production tax incentives.

## 10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

## 1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Article 13 of Chapter 3 of Title 58.1 a 11 section numbered 58.1-439.12:03 as follows: 12 13

§ 58.1-439.12:03. Motion picture film production tax credit.

A. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 2010, any motion picture production 14 company with qualifying expenses of at least \$250,000 with respect to a motion picture film production 15 filmed in Virginia shall be allowed a credit against the taxes imposed by § 58.1-320 or 58.1-400 in an 16 amount equal to 15 percent of the production company's qualifying expenses or 20 percent of such 17 expenses if the production is filmed in an economically distressed area of the Commonwealth. The 18 19 Secretary of Commerce and Trade shall designate which areas of the Commonwealth are deemed to be 20 economically distressed areas. For purposes of this section, in the case of an episodic television series, 21 an entire season of episodes is one production. The credit shall be computed based on all of the 22 taxpayer's qualifying expenses incurred with respect to the production, not just the qualifying expenses 23 incurred during the taxable year.

24 "Qualifying expenses" means the sum of the following amounts spent in the Commonwealth by a 25 production company in connection with the production of a motion picture film filmed in the 26 Commonwealth:

27 1. Goods and services leased or purchased. For goods with a purchase price of \$25,000 or more, 28 the amount included in qualifying expenses is the purchase price less the fair market value of the good 29 at the time the production is completed.

30 2. Compensation and wages except in the case of each individual who directly or indirectly receives 31 compensation in excess of \$1 million for personal services with respect to a single production. In such a 32 case, only the first \$1 million of salary shall be considered a qualifying expense. An individual is 33 deemed to receive compensation indirectly when a production company pays a personal service company 34 or an employee leasing company that pays the individual.

35 B. 1. In addition to the credit authorized under subsection A, such production company shall be 36 allowed an additional credit equal to 10 percent of the total aggregate payroll for Virginia residents employed in connection with the production of a film in the Commonwealth when total production costs 37 38 in the Commonwealth are at least \$250,000 but not more than \$1 million. The additional credit shall be 39 equal to 20 percent of the total aggregate payroll for Virginia residents employed in connection with 40 such production when total production costs in the Commonwealth exceed \$1 million.

2. In addition to the credits authorized under subsection A and subdivision B 1, such production 41 42 company shall be allowed an additional credit equal to 10 percent of the total aggregate payroll for 43 Virginia residents employed for the first time as actors or members of a production crew in connection 44 with the production of a film in the Commonwealth.

C. A taxpayer may claim the credits allowed by this section on a return filed for the taxable year in 45 46 which the production activities are completed. The return must state the name of the production, provide a description of the production, and include a detailed accounting of the qualifying expenses with 47 48 respect to which a credit is claimed.

49 D. If the credits allowed by this section exceed the amount of tax imposed for the taxable year 50 reduced by the sum of all other credits allowable, the excess shall not be redeemable by the Tax 51 Commissioner on behalf of the Commonwealth. The total amount of credits allowed under this section 52 for any biennium shall not exceed \$10 million.

53 E. For purposes of this section, the amount of any credit attributable to a partnership, electing small 54 business corporation (S corporation), or limited liability company shall be allocated to the individual 55 partners, shareholders, or members, respectively, in proportion to their ownership or interest in such 56 business entities.

57 F. No credit shall be allowed under this section for any production that (i) is political advertising; INTRODUCED

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58 (ii) is a television production of a news program or live sporting event; or (iii) contains obscene 59 material.

60 G. A taxpayer allowed a credit under this section must maintain and make available for inspection
61 any information or records required by the Tax Commissioner. The taxpayer has the burden of proving
62 eligibility for a credit and the amount of the credit. The Tax Commissioner shall consult with the
63 Virginia Film Office in order to determine the amount of qualifying expenses.

64 H. The Department of Taxation, in consultation with the Virginia Film Office, must publish by 65 November 1 of each year for the 12-month period ending the preceding December 31 the following 66 information:

67 1. Location of sites used in a production for which a credit was claimed;

68 2. Qualifying expenses for which a credit was claimed, classified by whether the expenses were for goods, services, or compensation paid by the production company;

70 3. Number of people employed in the Commonwealth with respect to credits claimed; and

4. Total cost to the Commonwealth's general fund of the credits claimed.

I. The Department of Taxation shall promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative
Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) consistent with the provisions of this section including but not limited to
the definition of "qualifying expenses" and setting forth the record-keeping requirements applicable to
production companies claiming this credit.

J. The General Assembly of Virginia finds that modern motion picture film productions may be
located within a state with minimal regard to the location of such state, and that the economic vitality
of the Commonwealth would be enhanced if such productions were filmed in Virginia. Accordingly, the
provisions of this section targeting the credit to expenditures made in this Commonwealth and the
employment of Virginia residents and limiting the credit to those companies which meet those criteria

**81** are integral to the purpose of the credit earned pursuant to this section and shall not be deemed **82** severable.
