- **5. Summary:** This bill increases the threshold for reporting water damage from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The bill further provides that if such vehicles are damaged to the extent that they meet the definition of salvage vehicle, they shall be titled as such.
- **6. Fiscal impact estimates:** Indeterminate, but expected to be minimal. Preliminary.
- 7. Budget amendment necessary: No
- **8. Fiscal implications:** Currently, vehicles with \$1,000 or more of water damage would be submitted to the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) on a salvage certificate application. In FY 2009, DMV issued 22,301 salvage titles. Of those, 17,638 applications came from dealers using the on-line process, of which approximately 50 percent or 8,819 were water damaged under the current definition. Increasing the threshold to \$5,000 would decrease the number of water damage titles issued by DMV. A salvage title is issued for a standard \$10.00 fee.
- 9. Specific agency or political subdivisions affected: Department of Motor Vehicles.
- 10. Technical amendment necessary: No.
- **11. Other comments:** A slight spike in water damaged vehicle titles is anticipated in early 2010 as a result of extensive flooding in Norfolk and the Tidewater area in the late fall of 2009.
