6 WHEREAS, since 2008 the Virginia chapter of the Equipping Businesses for Success Institute has
7 worked diligently to provide training for women and minority small business owners in the
8 Commonwealth of Virginia and to influence public policy through education and advocacy; and

10 working for the enactment of public policy that ensures the rights of all small businesses are protected;
