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## VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact §§ 20-108, 20-124.8, and 20-124.9 of the Code of Virginia, relating to 3 military parents; delegation of visitation rights.

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### Approved

#### 6 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

#### 7 1. That §§ 20-108, 20-124.8, and 20-124.9 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as 8 follows:

§ 20-108. Revision and alteration of such decrees.

10 The court may, from time to time after decreeing as provided in § 20-107.2, on petition of either of the parents, or on its own motion or upon petition of any probation officer or the Department of Social 11 12 Services, which petition shall set forth the reasons for the relief sought, revise and alter such decree 13 concerning the care, custody, and maintenance of the children and make a new decree concerning the 14 same, as the circumstances of the parents and the benefit of the children may require. The intentional 15 withholding of visitation of a child from the other parent without just cause may constitute a material 16 change of circumstances justifying a change of custody in the discretion of the court.

17 No support order may be retroactively modified, but may be modified with respect to any period 18 during which there is a pending petition for modification in any court, but only from the date that notice 19 of such petition has been given to the responding party.

20 Any member of the United States Armed Forces Reserves Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, 21 Coast Guard, Virginia National Guard, or Virginia National Guard Reserves any other reserve component thereof, who files a petition or is a party to a petition requesting the adjudication of the 22 23 custody, visitation or support of a child based on a change of circumstances because due to one of the 24 parents has been called to active duty parent's deployment, as that term is defined in § 20-124.7, shall 25 be entitled to have such a petition expedited on the docket of the court. 26

§ 20-124.8. Deployment; temporary order.

A. Any court order limiting previously ordered custodial or visitation rights of a deploying parent or 27 28 guardian due to the parent's or guardian's deployment shall specify the deployment as the basis for the 29 order and shall be entered by the court as a temporary order. Any such order shall further require the 30 nondeploying parent or guardian to provide the court with 30 days advance written notice of any change 31 of address and any change of telephone number.

32 B. The court, on motion of the deploying parent or guardian to delegate visitation to a family 33 member, including a stepparent, with whom the child has a close and substantial relationship and upon 34 finding that such delegation is in the best interests of the child, may enter an order delegating visitation 35 that:

36 1. Delegates all or a portion of the deploying parent's or guardian's visitation rights to such family 37 member, if the deploying parent or guardian had visitation rights with the child prior to the deployment; 38 or

39 2. Provides visitation rights to such family member, if the deploying parent or guardian had physical 40 custody of the child prior to the deployment and the nondeploying parent or guardian, or a family 41 member of the nondeploying parent or guardian, is awarded physical custody during the deployment.

42 An order delegating or providing visitation rights to a family member pursuant to this subsection 43 does not create a separate right to visitation in the family member to whom visitation rights are 44 delegated or provided. The deploying parent or guardian may at any time, and the nondeploying parent 45 or guardian may upon a showing of a material change in circumstances, file a motion to rescind the order delegating or providing visitation rights to a family member and such order shall terminate by 46 47 operation of law upon the return of the deploying parent or guardian from deployment. Written notice 48 of the return of the deployed parent or guardian and the termination of the delegated visitation shall be 49 provided by the previously deployed parent or guardian to any family member whose visitation is 50 thereby terminated.

C. The court, on motion of the deploying parent or guardian returning from deployment seeking to 51 amend or review the custody or visitation order entered based upon the deployment, shall set a hearing 52 53 on the matter that shall take precedence on the court's docket, and shall be set within 30 days of the 54 filing of the motion. For purposes of this hearing, the nondeploying parent or guardian shall bear the 55 burden of showing that reentry of the custody or visitation order in effect before the deployment is no 56 longer in the child's best interests.

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57 C D. This section shall not otherwise preclude a parent or guardian from petitioning for a 58 modification of a custody or visitation order based upon a change in circumstances.

59 § 20-124.9. When no order is in place; expedited hearing; conduct of hearing.

A. If no court order exists as to the custody, visitation, or support of a child of a deploying parent or guardian, any petition filed to establish custody, visitation, or support for a child of a deploying parent or guardian shall be so identified at the time of filing by the deploying parent or guardian to ensure that the deploying parent or guardian has access to the child, and that reasonable support and other orders are in place for the protection of the parent-child or guardian-child relationship, consistent with the other provisions of this chapter. Such petition shall be expedited on the court's docket in accordance with § 20-108.

B. In any proceeding under this chapter where a deploying parent or guardian is reasonably unable
to appear as a result of his deployment, the court, upon motion of the deploying parent or guardian and
for good cause shown, may conduct any hearing using a telephonic communication system or an
electronic audio and video communication system to provide for the appearance of any parties and
