12102254D **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 112** 1 2 Offered January 11, 2012 3 Prefiled January 11, 2012 4 Recognizing the inestimable value of early childhood education to children and to the Commonwealth. 5 Patrons-Kory and Surovell; Senator: Favola 6 7 Referred to Committee on Appropriations 8 9 WHEREAS, quality early childhood education programs benefit all children, but particularly those 10 from economically disadvantaged homes, and provide a sound basis for learning and build knowledge, personal competence, confidence, and a sense of social responsibility; and 11 WHEREAS, multiple studies have shown that early childhood education produces not only improved 12 13 subsequent performance in school but improved life skills leading to better jobs and more satisfying 14 lives: and WHEREAS, ensuring access to quality preschool for three-year-olds and four-year-olds has proven to 15 16 be one of the soundest educational investments the public can make, providing demonstrated, significant, long-term reductions in the costs of special education, grade retention, welfare, and crime; and 17 WHEREAS, during their K through 12 years and beyond, children who attend quality preschool 18 19 perform better on standardized achievement tests in reading and math; exhibit more positive behaviors in 20 the classroom; and are more likely to graduate from high school, continue their education, and be more 21 prosperous as adults; and 22 WHEREAS, quality preschool programs should be funded adequately in order to assure adherence to 23 established standards of quality and to attract and keep educated professionals; and 24 WHEREAS, the Commonwealth in 2012 expects to allocate \$65.1 million for the Virginia Preschool 25 Initiative to expand childhood education opportunities for children not served by the federal Head Start program, which itself provides \$102 million in support for early childhood education; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the Virginia Preschool Initiative and Head Start each serve approximately 17,000 28 children in Virginia; and 29 WHEREAS, this is only 20 percent of the children in Virginia who could benefit from preschool 30 education; and 31 WHEREAS, during 2011, the Commonwealth chose not to pursue a share of \$500 million of federal funds available through the "Race to the Top" grant competition; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Commonwealth recognize 32 33 34 the inestimable value of early childhood education to children and to the Commonwealth and set a goal 35 of extending the availability of early childhood education so that the Virginia Preschool Initiative and 36 Head Start together reach 50,000 children in the Commonwealth by 2017; and, be it 37 RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates transmit a copy of this resolution 38 to the Governor that he may be apprised of the sense of the General Assembly of Virginia in this 39 matter.
