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SENATE BILL NO. 167

AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE (Proposed by the Senate Committee on Education and Health

on February 9, 2012) (Patrons Prior to Substitute—Senators Petersen and Marsden [SB 391])

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A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-279.3 of the Code of Virginia, relating to student discipline; parental notification.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That § 22.1-279.3 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 22.1-279.3. Parental responsibility and involvement requirements.

11 A. Each parent of a student enrolled in a public school has a duty to assist the school in enforcing the standards of student conduct and compulsory school attendance in order that education may be 12 conducted in an atmosphere free of disruption and threat to persons or property, and supportive of 13 14 individual rights.

15 B. A school board shall provide opportunities for parental and community involvement in every 16 school in the school division.

17 C. Within one calendar month of the opening of school, each school board shall, simultaneously with any other materials customarily distributed at that time, send to the parents of each enrolled student (i) a 18 19 notice of the requirements of this section; (ii) a copy of the school board's standards of student conduct; 20 and (iii) a copy of the compulsory school attendance law. These materials shall include a notice to the 21 parents that by signing the statement of receipt, parents shall not be deemed to waive, but to expressly 22 reserve, their rights protected by the constitutions or laws of the United States or the Commonwealth 23 and that a parent shall have the right to express disagreement with a school's or school division's 24 policies or decisions.

25 Each parent of a student shall sign and return to the school in which the student is enrolled a statement acknowledging the receipt of the school board's standards of student conduct, the notice of the 26 27 requirements of this section, and the compulsory school attendance law. Each school shall maintain 28 records of such signed statements.

29 D. The school principal may request the student's parent or parents, if both parents have legal and 30 physical custody of such student, to meet with the principal or his designee to review the school board's 31 standards of student conduct and the parent's or parents' responsibility to participate with the school in 32 disciplining the student and maintaining order, to ensure the student's compliance with compulsory school attendance law, and to discuss improvement of the child's behavior, school attendance, and 33 34 educational progress.

35 E. In accordance with the due process procedures set forth in this article and the guidelines required 36 by § 22.1-279.6, the school principal may or his designee shall attempt to notify the parents of any student who violates has violated a school board policy or the compulsory school attendance 37 38 requirements when such violation couldwill result in the student's suspension, the student's expulsion, or 39 the notification of law enforcement, or the filing of a court petition, whether or not the school 40 administration has imposed such disciplinary action or filed a petition. Such notification shall be made 41 as soon as practicable. The notice shall state (i) the date and particulars of the violation; (ii) the 42 obligation of the parent to take actions to assist the school in improving the student's behavior and 43 ensuring compulsory school attendance compliance; (iii) that, if the student is suspended, the parent may be required to accompany the student to meet with school officials; and (iv) that a petition with the 44 juvenile and domestic relations court may be filed under certain circumstances to declare the student a 45 46 child in need of supervision.

47 F. No suspended student shall be admitted to the regular school program until such student and his **48** parent have met with school officials to discuss improvement of the student's behavior, unless the school 49 principal or his designee determines that readmission, without parent conference, is appropriate for the 50 student.

51 G. Upon the failure of a parent to comply with the provisions of this section, the school board may, 52 by petition to the juvenile and domestic relations court, proceed against such parent for willful and 53 unreasonable refusal to participate in efforts to improve the student's behavior or school attendance, as 54 follows:

55 1. If the court finds that the parent has willfully and unreasonably failed to meet, pursuant to a request of the principal as set forth in subsection D of this section, to review the school board's 56 standards of student conduct and the parent's responsibility to assist the school in disciplining the student 57 and maintaining order, and to discuss improvement of the child's behavior and educational progress, it 58 59 may order the parent to so meet; or

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2. If the court finds that a parent has willfully and unreasonably failed to accompany a suspended 60 student to meet with school officials pursuant to subsection F, or upon the student's receiving a second 61 62 suspension or being expelled, it may order the student or his parent, or both, to participate in such 63 programs or such treatment, including, but not limited to, extended day programs, summer school, other 64 educational programs and counseling, as the court deems appropriate to improve the student's behavior 65 or school attendance. The order may also require participation in a parenting, counseling or a mentoring 66 program, as appropriate or that the student or his parent, or both, shall be subject to such conditions and limitations as the court deems appropriate for the supervision, care, and rehabilitation of the student or 67 his parent. In addition, the court may order the parent to pay a civil penalty not to exceed \$500. 68

⁶⁹ H. The civil penalties established pursuant to this section shall be enforceable in the juvenile and
⁷⁰ domestic relations court in which the student's school is located and shall be paid into a fund maintained
⁷¹ by the appropriate local governing body to support programs or treatments designed to improve the
⁷² behavior of students as described in subdivision G 2. Upon the failure to pay the civil penalties imposed
⁷³ by this section, the attorney for the appropriate county, city, or town shall enforce the collection of such
⁷⁴ civil penalties.

75 I. All references in this section to the juvenile and domestic relations court shall be also deemed to mean any successor in interest of such court.
