8. Fiscal Implications: This bill decreases the administrative and regulatory responsibilities of the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation (DPOR) by removing the requirement for installers and operators of conventional onsite sewage systems to be licensed under the Board for Waterworks and Wastewater Works Operators and Onsite Sewage System Professionals (the Board). Currently, there are approximately 366 licensed professionals that install or operate conventional onsite sewage systems.

Per the agency, there is an immaterial reduction in costs due to this legislation, with minimal savings resulting from such actions as no longer mailing renewal notices.

Revenue: According to DPOR, roughly 24 professionals apply to be licensed and approximately 165 professionals renew their installer or operator of conventional onsite sewage system licenses each year. The agency expects that without the licensure requirement, the Board could receive approximately \$15,600 less in nongeneral fund revenue each year, beginning in FY 2013. The current license fee is \$100, while the license renewal fee is \$80. Licenses are valid for two years.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 54.1-113 (Callahan Act), Code of Virginia, licensing fees are established at rates adequate to cover a program's operating costs and a proportionate share of agency support costs. Under this requirement, the Board is expecting to raise the licensing fees by FY 2016. With fewer required licensees and the related loss of revenue, the Board may need to increase its fees one year earlier, by FY 2015.
