2	AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE
3	(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Education and Health
4	on February 23, 2012)
5	(Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Byron)
6 7	A BILL to amend and reenact § 32.1-46 of the Code of Virginia, relating to human papillomavirus vaccination.
8	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
9	1. That § 32.1-46 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
10	§ 32.1-46. Immunization of patients against certain diseases.
11	A. The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis of each child within this Commonwealth
12	shall cause such child to be immunized in accordance with the Immunization Schedule developed and
13	published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Advisory Committee on
14 15	Immunization Practices (ACIP), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). The required immunizations for attendence at a public or
15 16	Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). The required immunizations for attendance at a public or private elementary, middle or secondary school, child care center, nursery school, family day care home
17	or developmental center shall be those set forth in the State Board of Health Regulations for the
18	Immunization of School Children. The Board's regulations shall at a minimum require:
19	1. A minimum of three properly spaced doses of hepatitis B vaccine (HepB).
20	2. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of diphtheria toxoid. One dose shall be
21	administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entering the
22 23	sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of diphtheria toxoid.
23 24	3. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of tetanus toxoid. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose of Tdap vaccine shall be administered prior
25	to entering the sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of tetanus toxoid.
26	4. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of acellular pertussis vaccine. One dose shall
27	be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entry into
28	the sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of pertussis vaccine.
29	5. Two or three primary doses of Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine, depending on the
30 31	6. Two properly spaced doses of live attenuated measles (rubeola) vaccine. The first dose shall be
32	administered at age 12 months or older.
33	7. One dose of live attenuated rubella vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.
34	8. One dose of live attenuated mumps vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.
35	9. All susceptible children born on and after January 1, 1997, shall be required to have one dose of
36	varicella vaccine on or after 12 months.
37	10. Three or more properly spaced doses of oral polio vaccine (OPV) or inactivated polio vaccine (IPV). One dose shell be administered on or ofter the fourth hirthday. A fourth dose shell be required if
38 39	(IPV). One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A fourth dose shall be required if the three dose primary series consisted of a combination of OPV and IPV.
40	11. Two to four doses, dependent on age at first dose, of properly spaced pneumococcal 7-valent
41	conjugate (PVC) vaccine for children less than two years of age.
42	12. Three doses of properly spaced human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine for females. The first dose
43	shall be administered before the child enters the sixth grade.
44	The Board's regulations shall also require the provision of information describing the link between
45 46	the human papillomavirus and cancer to be provided to the parent or guardian of every child prior to entry to the sixth grade. Such information shall be approved by the Board. A parent or guardian, at his
47	sole discretion, may then choose whether to have such child receive three doses of properly spaced
48	human papillomavirus vaccine.
49	The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis may have such child immunized by a
50	physician or registered nurse or may present the child to the appropriate local health department, which
51	shall administer the vaccines required by the State Board of Health Regulations for the Immunization of
52 53	School Children without charge. B A physician registered nurse or local health department administering a vaccine required by this
55 54	B. A physician, registered nurse or local health department administering a vaccine required by this section shall provide to the person who presents the child for immunizations a certificate that shall state
55	the diseases for which the child has been immunized, the numbers of doses given, the dates when
56	administered and any further immunizations indicated.
57	C. The vaccines required by this section shall meet the standards prescribed in, and be administered
58	in accordance with, regulations of the Board.

59 D. The provisions of this section shall not apply if:

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60 1. The parent or guardian of the child objects thereto on the grounds that the administration of
61 immunizing agents conflicts with his religious tenets or practices, unless an emergency or epidemic of
62 disease has been declared by the Board; or

63 2. The parent or guardian presents a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in
64 Virginia, or a licensed nurse practitioner, that states that the physical condition of the child is such that
65 the administration of one or more of the required immunizing agents would be detrimental to the health
66 of the child; or.

67 3. Because the human papillomavirus is not communicable in a school setting, a parent or guardian,
68 at the parent's or guardian's sole discretion, may elect for the parent's or guardian's child not to receive
69 the human papillomavirus vaccine, after having reviewed materials describing the link between the
70 human papillomavirus and cervical cancer approved for such use by the Board.

E. For the purpose of protecting the public health by ensuring that each child receives 71 age-appropriate immunizations, any physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, licensed institutional health care provider, local or district health department, the Virginia Immunization 72 73 Information System, and the Department of Health may share immunization and patient locator 74 75 information without parental authorization, including, but not limited to, the month, day, and year of 76 each administered immunization; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and social 77 security number; and the parents' names. The immunization information; the patient's name, address, 78 telephone number, birth date, and social security number; and the parents' names shall be confidential 79 and shall only be shared for the purposes set out in this subsection.

F. The State Board of Health shall review this section annually and make recommendations for revision by September 1 to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Joint Commission on Health Care.
