Patron-Albo 6 7 Referred to Committee on Rules 8 9 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. § 1. The Office of the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia shall contract with an 10 independent entity such as the National Center for State Courts to study the feasibility and effect of 11 implementing a senior judge system for the circuit and district courts of the Commonwealth. Under such 12 a system, a specified number of retired circuit and district judges would become senior judges who sit 13 14 for a specified amount of time each year in return for a portion of the current compensation of active 15 judges, eliminating the need for substitute judges and special justices and for the reliance on recalled 16 retired judges. 17 Technical assistance for the study shall be provided by the Office of the Executive Secretary of the 18 Supreme Court of Virginia. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance for this study, 19 upon request. 20 The Office of the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia shall report to the General 21 Assembly by November 15, 2014, on the feasibility of implementing a senior judge system. The report 22 shall include (i) recommendations for the number of senior judges required and the minimum amount of 23 time each senior judge would be required to sit in order to eliminate the need for substitute judges and 24 special justices and to eliminate the reliance on recalled retired judges; (ii) the fiscal impact of a senior 25 judge system in order to weigh the costs and benefits of such a system; (iii) recommendations for how a 26 senior judge system should be structured to allow for more equitable and efficient allocation of judicial 27 resources within and among the judicial circuits and districts; (iv) the improvements to the 28 administration of justice resulting from such a system, including but not limited to more efficient and 29 consistent adjudication in all courts through the use of a constant group of judges, in contrast to the 30 more random, unsystematic use of substitute judges, special justices, and recalled retired judges; (v)31 recommendations for the method used to select, designate, and compensate senior judges, including the appropriate duration of such service; and (vi) recommendations for the most effective procedure to 32 33 transition to a senior judge system.
