A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 24.2-110, 24.2-111, and 24.2-411 of the Code of Virginia, relating to elections; appointment, compensation, and offices of general registrars.

## 10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

## 1. That §§ 24.2-110, 24.2-111, and 24.2-411 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as 11 12 follows:

13 § 24.2-110. Appointment, qualifications, and term of general registrar; vacancies; certain prohibitions. 14 Each electoral board shall meet in the month of May or June in 2007, and every four years 15 thereafter, and shall appoint a general registrar, who shall be a qualified voter of the county or city for 16 which he is appointed. However, in the case of a city that is wholly contained within one county, the city electoral board may appoint a qualified voter of that county to serve as city general registrar. 17 General registrars shall serve full time and for four-year terms beginning July 1, 2007, and each fourth 18 19 year thereafter, and continue in office until a successor is appointed and qualifies.

20 The electoral board shall fill any vacancy in the office of general registrar for the unexpired term. 21 The electoral board shall declare vacant and fill the office of the general registrar if the appointee fails 22 to qualify and deliver a copy of his oath to the secretary of the electoral board within 30 days after he 23 has been notified of his appointment.

24 No general registrar shall hold any other office, by election or appointment, while serving as general 25 registrar; however, with the consent of the electoral board, he may undertake other duties which do not conflict with his duties as general registrar. General registrars shall not serve as officers of election. The 26 27 election or appointment of a general registrar to any other office shall vacate the office of the general 28 registrar.

29 No general registrar shall be eligible to offer for or hold an office to be filled by election in whole 30 or in part by the qualified voters of his jurisdiction at any election held during the time he serves as 31 general registrar or for the six months thereafter.

The electoral board shall not appoint to the office of general registrar any person who is the spouse 32 of an electoral board member or any person, or the spouse of any person, who is the parent, grandparent, sibling, child, or grandchild of an electoral board member. 33 34

35 No general registrar shall serve as the chairman of a political party or other officer of a state, local 36 or district level political party committee. No general registrar shall serve as a paid or volunteer worker 37 in the campaign of a candidate for nomination or election to an office filled by election in whole or in 38 part by the qualified voters of his jurisdiction. The restrictions of this paragraph shall apply to paid 39 assistant registrars but shall not apply to unpaid assistant registrars. 40

§ 24.2-111. Compensation and expenses of general registrars.

41 The General Assembly shall establish a compensation plan in the general appropriation act for the general registrars all of whom shall serve on a full-time basis. The governing body for the county or 42 city of each general registrar shall pay compensation in accordance with the plan and be reimbursed annually as authorized in the act. The governing body shall be required to provide benefits to the general and assistant registrars and staff as provided to other employees of the locality, and shall be 43 44 45 46 authorized to supplement the salary of the general registrar to the extent provided in the act.

47 Each locality shall pay the reasonable expenses of the general registrar, including reimbursement for mileage at the rate payable to members of the General Assembly. In case of a dispute, the State Board 48 49 shall approve or disapprove the reimbursement. Reasonable expenses include, but are not limited to, costs for: (i) an adequately trained registrar's staff, including training in the use of computers and other 50 51 technology to the extent provided to other local employees with similar job responsibilities, and 52 reasonable costs for the general registrar or at least one member of the registrar's staff to attend the 53 annual training offered by the State Board; (ii) adequate training for officers of election; (iii) conducting 54 elections as required by this title; and (iv) voter education.

55 § 24.2-411. Office of the general registrar.

Each local governing body shall furnish the general registrar with a clearly marked and suitable 56 office which shall be the principal office for voter registration. The office shall be owned or leased by 57 the city or county, or by the state for the location of Department of Motor Vehicles facilities, adequately 58

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59 furnished, and located within the city or within the county or a city in which the county courthouse is

60 located. The governing body shall provide property damage liability and bodily injury liability coverage

61 for the office and shall furnish the general registrar with necessary postage, stationery, equipment, and 62 office supplies. The telephone number shall be listed in the local telephone directory separately or under

63 the local governmental listing under the designation "Voter Registration."

64 No private business enterprise shall be conducted in the general registrar's office.

The general registrar's office in counties with a population under 10,000 and in cities with a population under 7,500 shall be open a minimum of three days each week and additional days as required by the general appropriation act. The general registrar's office in all other counties and cities shall be open a minimum of five days each week. The specific days of normal service each week for general registrars shall be determined by the State Board.

70 Additional hours, if any, that the general registrar's office is open for voter registration may be determined and set by the general registrar or the electoral board.

72 2. That the provisions of this act shall not become effective unless an appropriation effectuating

73 the purposes of this act is included in the general appropriation act passed during the  $201\tilde{2}$ 

74 Regular Session of the General Assembly that becomes law.
