4	Establishing a joint subcommittee to study the feasibility of establishing a state renewable energy utility.

10	WHEREAS, Delaware created a sustainable energy utility (SEU) in 2007 in order to foster a
11	sustainable energy future for the state; and
12	WHEREAS, the Delaware SEU model leverages competitive markets and private financing to deliver
13	revenue positive to the state, and end-use energy services to Delaware's citizens and businesses; and
14 15	WHEREAS, the Delaware SEU is an independent nonprofit corporation that delivers energy
15 16	efficiency and renewable energy services and that is being replicated in several other communities around the world; and
17	WHEREAS, in 2011, the Delaware SEU issued \$70 million in tax-exempt bonds to provide capital
18	for energy retrofits and renewable energy projects for municipal and public buildings, universities,
19	schools, and hospitals; and
20	WHEREAS, the bonds are financed through guaranteed savings agreements that pledge energy
21	savings without pledging the full-faith and credit of the state, with no taxpayer funds, and with a bond
22 23	rating of AA+; and WHEREAS, the projects financed by these bonds do not require up-front capital from the entities
24	that host these projects and benefit from the energy savings; and
25	WHEREAS, the projects financed by these bonds will create between 900 and 1,000 construction
26 27	jobs in the State of Delaware; and WIEDEAS these tay event hands will result in additional tay revenues to the State of Delaware.
<sup>2</sup> / <sub>28</sub>	WHEREAS, these tax-exempt bonds will result in additional tax revenues to the State of Delaware; and
29	WHEREAS, the Delaware SEU's bond program has been cited by the federal government as a
30	positive example of how to capture the enormous potential of energy efficiency and to lead the country
31	in achieving a clean energy economy and green workforce; and
32 33	WHEREAS, it is estimated that the Delaware SEU model could generate at least \$300 million in bondable projects in the Commonwealth and may provide examples of programs that can be adapted for
34	use in the Commonwealth; now, therefore, be it
35	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That a joint subcommittee be
36	established to study the feasibility of establishing a state renewable energy utility. The joint
37	subcommittee shall have a total membership of 13 members that shall consist of eight legislative
38 39	members and five nonlegislative citizen members. Members shall be appointed as follows: five members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates in accordance with
<b>40</b>	the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; three
41	members of the Senate to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; three nonlegislative citizen
42	members with expertise in the SEU model, energy-efficiency and renewable energy projects, financing,
43	and related regulation to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and two nonlegislative
44 45	citizen members with expertise in the SEU model, energy-efficiency and renewable energy projects,
<b>4</b> 5 <b>4</b> 6	financing, and related regulation to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules. Nonlegislative citizen members of the joint subcommittee shall be citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Unless
47	otherwise approved in writing by the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk,
<b>48</b>	nonlegislative citizen members shall only be reimbursed for travel originating and ending within the
<b>49</b>	Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of attending meetings. If a companion joint resolution of the
50 51	other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both Clerks shall be required. The joint
51 52	subcommittee shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership who shall be members of the General Assembly.
53	In conducting its study, the joint subcommittee shall (i) examine the report of Delaware's Sustainable
54	Energy Task Force to the Delaware State Legislature, available on the Task Force's website,
55	www.seu-de.org; (ii) examine the feasibility of authorizing a state renewable energy utility to issue
56 57	tax-exempt bonds for the purpose of funding renewable energy improvements at state buildings funded by the difference between existing energy costs and the reduced energy costs of energy the buildings.
57 58	by the difference between existing energy costs and the reduced energy costs of operating the buildings; (iii) develop projections for the benefits that could accrue to the Commonwealth; (iv) characterize the
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risks; and (v) determine what lessons can be learned from Delaware's experience in establishing andoperating its SEU.

Administrative staff support shall be provided by the Office of the Clerk of the House of Delegates.
Legal, research, policy analysis, and other services as requested by the joint subcommittee shall be provided by the Division of Legislative Services. Technical assistance shall be provided by the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the joint subcommittee for this study, upon request.

The joint subcommittee shall be limited to four meetings for the 2013 interim, and the direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$21,040 without approval as set out in this resolution. Approval for unbudgeted nonmember-related expenses shall require the written authorization of the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk. If a companion joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both Clerks shall be required.

71 No recommendation of the joint subcommittee shall be adopted if a majority of the House members 72 or a majority of the Senate members appointed to the joint subcommittee (i) vote against the 73 recommendation and (ii) vote for the recommendation to fail notwithstanding the majority vote of the 74 joint subcommittee.

75 The joint subcommittee shall complete its meetings by November 30, 2013, and the chairman shall 76 submit to the Division of Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and 77 recommendations no later than the first day of the 2014 Regular Session of the General Assembly. The 78 executive summary shall state whether the joint subcommittee intends to submit to the General 79 Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a House or 80 Senate document. The executive summary and the report shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents 81 and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's website. 82

83 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint
 84 Rules Committee. The Committee may approve or disapprove expenditures for this study, extend or
 85 delay the period for the conduct of the study, or authorize additional meetings during the 2013 interim.
