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11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That § 23-295 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia
13	is amended by adding in Chapter 24 of Title 23 a section numbered 23-295.2 as follows:
14	§ 23-295. Board of Regents of Gunston Hall; Board of Visitors for Gunston Hall.
15	There is hereby created the Board of Regents of Gunston Hall and the Board of Visitors for Gunston
16 17	Hall. Membership of both collegial bodies shall be pursuant to the terms and conditions of the deed of gift of Gunston Hall from Louis Hertle to the Commonwealth of Virginia. The duties for the two boards
17	are prescribed in Chapter 138 of the 1932 Acts of Assembly and, Chapter 175 of the 1948 Acts of
19	Assembly, and this chapter. As such, the Board of Regents is declared an educational institution with all
20	the rights, powers, privileges, and immunities under law. The Board of Regents shall manage, maintain
21	and operate Gunston Hall and accept and administer gifts of real and personal property made for the
22	benefit of Gunston Hall. The Board of Visitors, as prescribed by the deed of gift, shall be constituted of
23	three fit and competent persons appointed by the Governor. Such persons shall, by their education,
24	training, or experience, be knowledgeable in the fields of history, museum administration, fundraising,
25 26	and education or outreach. In accordance with § 2.2-106, any administrative head of Gunston Hall shall be appointed by the
<b>2</b> 7	Governor to serve at his pleasure. The administrative head shall protect and further the interests of the
28	Commonwealth as set out in the deed of gift and the laws of this chapter.
29	§ 23-295.2. Certain powers of the Board of Visitors.
30	A. In fulfillment of its responsibilities under the deed of gift, the Board of Visitors shall examine and,
31	by November 15 each year, report to the Governor and the General Assembly on the Board of Regents
32 33	and the manner in which Gunston Hall is managed and supervised. To fully address such responsibility,
33 34	the Board of Visitors shall, with the input of the Board of Regents, Gunston Hall staff and employees, and interested members of the surrounding community, prepare a long-term plan and examine the extent
35	to which the Board of Regents maintains the capacity to fulfill such plan. The Board of Visitors shall
36	meet at least four times per year at Gunston Hall, at least one time of which shall be within standard
37	hours of operation for the purpose of observing a variety of educational tours and outreach initiatives.
38	B. The Board of Visitors shall appoint a Board of Advisors constituted of seven members, one of
	whom shall be the president of George Mason University or his designee and one of whom shall be a
40 41	resident of Mason Neck. All appointments are for terms of four years, except that appointments to fill unexpired vacancies shall be for the remainder of the unexpired terms and the term of the president of
42	George Mason University shall be coincident with his office.
43	The Board of Advisors shall report, annually and by July 1, to the Board of Visitors on the
44	following:
45	1. The performance of Gunston Hall in meeting its mission and purpose, as set out in the deed of
46	gift by Louis Hertle, to honor the principles of just government and civic righteousness exemplified in
47 48	the life and work of George Mason with the hope and expectation that such a memorial will serve to strengthen the adherence of all who may visit the memorial to the fundamental views on governmental
<b>4</b> 9	and social obligations and privileges expressed in the declaration of rights;
50	2. The adequacy of Gunston Hall administration in representing the Commonwealth's interests to
51	educate the general public regarding the significance and influence of George Mason for his unique
52	contribution to the universal cause of human rights;
53	3. The provision of access, activities, and experiences for students in the Commonwealth and the
54 55	coordination of such access, activities, and experiences with the Standards of Learning; 4. The availability and range of historically accurate, interactive, high-quality educational tours and
55 56	experiences, seminars, and outreach initiatives offered to students, educators, researchers, and the
57	general public; and
58	5. Long-term planning and budget matters affecting such issues described in this section.

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2. The initial terms of the members of the Board of Advisors appointed pursuant to this act shall 59

be staggered as follows: (i) three members appointed to a term of four years, (ii) two members appointed to a term of three years, and (iii) one member appointed to a term of two years. Thereafter, the terms of members shall be four years. 60 61

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
