2	AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

6	A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-217 of the Code of Virginia, relating to visually impaired students;
7	Braille.
8	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
9	1. That § 22.1-217 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
10	§ 22.1-217. Visually impaired students.
11	A. As used in this section:
12 13	"Braille" means the system of reading and writing through touch and is commonly known as the
13 14	Braille tactile communication system. "Program" means a modified program that provides special materials or services and may include
14	the employment of itinerant teachers or resource room teachers for the visually impaired.
16	"Visually impaired" shall be defined by the Board of Education and the Virginia Department for the
17	Blind and Vision Impaired.
18	B. Special education for visually impaired children students provided by a school division shall be
19	established, maintained, and operated jointly by the school board and the Virginia Department for the
20	Blind and Vision Impaired subject to the regulations of the Board of Education.
21	C. Braille instruction shall be included in the student's Individualized Education Plan Program (IEP),
22	whenever appropriate. When developing the an IEP or a plan pursuant to § 504 of the Rehabilitation
23	Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. § 794 (Section 504 Plan) for students with visual impairment, the presumption
24	shall be that proficiency in literacy is essential for such student to achieve satisfactory educational
25	progress. However, use of Braille shall not be required if other special education services are more
26	appropriate to the student's educational needs, and the provision of other appropriate services shall not
27 28	preclude Braille instruction. Each school division shall provide instruction in Braille and the use of Braille for visually impaired students unless the team responsible for developing a visually impaired
20 29	student's IEP (IEP team) or the team responsible for developing a student's Section 504 Plan (504 team)
<b>30</b>	determines, after an evaluation of the student, that instruction in Braille or the use of Braille is not
31	appropriate to the student's educational needs. The evaluation shall be conducted by a certified Teacher
32	of the Visually Impaired (TVI) and shall include (i) a literacy assessment that is research based, data
33	driven, and validated and that results in objective recommendations; (ii) a functional vision assessment;
34	(iii) an assessment of the student's academic and functional strengths and deficits; (iv) an assessment of
35	the student's current and future needs; (v) a statement of the appropriate reading and writing media for
36	the student; and (vi) in the case of a student with some residual vision, a comparison of the student's
37	current reading and writing skill levels to levels expected of peers who are not visually impaired, as
38	determined by the IEP team or 504 team. The evaluation may include a comprehensive assistive
39 40	technology assessment if the IEP team or 504 team determines that it is necessary. The literacy
40 41	assessment shall be administered to the student at least annually after the evaluation by the certified TVL and when there is a significant change in the student's vision
41 42	TVI and when there is a significant change in the student's vision. D. Nothing in this section shall require the exclusive use of Braille when the IEP team or 504 team
43	determines that other specialized educational services and assistive technology devices are more
44	appropriate for the visually impaired student's educational needs. The provision of other specialized
45	educational services and assistive technology devices shall not preclude instruction in Braille and the
46	use of Braille.
47	E. Each IEP team and 504 team may determine that a blind student is eligible to receive instruction
48	in the use of the appropriate Braille mathematics code in addition to Braille and the use of Braille.
49	F. No visually impaired student shall be denied the opportunity for instruction in Braille and the use
50	of Braille solely on the basis that the student has some residual vision.
51	B. G. The Virginia Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired shall prepare and deliver a
52	program of special education services in addition to the special education provided in the public school
53 54	system designed to meet the educational needs of visually impaired children students between the ages of birth and twenty one 21 and may prepare and deliver such programs for such individuals of other

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53 system designed to meet the educational needs of visually impaired <u>children</u> students between the ages 54 of birth and twenty-one 21 and may prepare and deliver such programs for such individuals of other 55 ages. In the development of such a program, the Virginia Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired 56 shall cooperate with the Board of Education and the school boards of the several school divisions. The 57 Virginia Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired shall assist the Board of Education and the 58 school boards of the several school divisions with in-service training in Braille for currently employed 59 teachers of students who are blind and visually impaired. 60 C. As used in this section:

"Braille" means the system of reading and writing through touch and is commonly known as standard English Braille Grade 2. 61 62

"Program" means a modified program which provides special materials or services and may include the employment of itinerant teachers or resource room teachers for the visually impaired. "Visually impaired" shall be defined by the Board of Education and the Virginia Department for the 63 64
