10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That §§ 58.1-901, 58.1-902, 58.1-905, and 58.1-912 of the Code of Virginia are amended and
12	reenacted as follows:
13	§ 58.1-901. Definitions.
14	As used in this chapter, unless the context clearly shows otherwise, the term or phrase:
15	"Decedent" means a deceased person.
16	"Federal credit" means the maximum amount of the credit for state death taxes allowable by § 2011
17	of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended or renumbered, or successor provision,
18 19	in respect to a decedent's taxable estate. The term "maximum amount" shall be construed as to take full
20	advantage of such credit as the laws of the United States may allow. For deaths occurring on or after July 1, 2014, in no event, however, shall such maximum amount be less than the federal credit
20 21	allowable by § 2011 of the Internal Revenue Code as it existed on January 1, 1978.
22	"Gross estate" means "gross estate" as defined in § 2031 of the United States Internal Revenue Code
$\overline{23}$	of 1954, as amended or renumbered, or the successor provision of the laws of the United States.
24	"Interest in a closely held business" means an "interest in a closely held business" as defined in
25	§ 6166 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended or renumbered, or the successor provision of
26	the laws of the United States.
27	"Nonresident" means a decedent who was domiciled outside of the Commonwealth of Virginia at his
28	death.
29 30	"Personal representative" means the personal representative of the estate of the decedent, appointed,
30 31	qualified and acting within the Commonwealth, or, if there is no personal representative appointed, qualified and acting within the Commonwealth, then any person in actual or constructive possession of
32	the Virginia gross estate of the decedent.
33	"Resident" means a decedent who was domiciled in the Commonwealth of Virginia at his death.
34	"State" means any state, territory or possession of the United States and the District of Columbia.
35	"Taxable estate" means "taxable estate" as defined in § 2051 of the United States Internal Revenue
36	Code of 1954, as amended or renumbered, or the successor provision of the laws of the United States.
37	"Value" means "value" as finally determined for federal estate tax purposes under the laws of the
38	United States relating to federal estate taxes.
39	"Working farm" means an interest in a closely held business that operates as an active trade or
40	business for agricultural purposes.
41 42	Any reference in this chapter to the laws of the United States relating to federal estate and gift taxes
42 43	means the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, and amendments thereto, and other provisions of the laws of the United States relating to federal estate and gift taxes, as the same may be
44	or become effective at any time or from time to time. If any such provision is repealed and no
45	successor is enacted, then the reference in this chapter shall be given the meaning of such provision as
46	it existed immediately prior to its repeal.
47	§ 58.1-902. Tax on transfer of taxable estate of residents; amounts; credit; property of resident
48	defined.
49	A. A tax in the amount of the federal credit is imposed on the transfer of the taxable estate of every
50	resident, subject, where applicable, to the credit provided for in subsection B. However, for deaths
51	occurring on or after July 1, 2014, no tax shall be imposed on a gross estate if the majority of the
52 53	assets of the total estate is an interest in a closely held business or working farm.
53 54	B. If the real and tangible personal property of a resident is located outside of the Commonwealth and is subject to a death tax imposed by another state for which a credit is allowed under § 2011 of the
54 55	Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended or renumbered, or the successor provision of the laws of
56	the United States relating to federal estate taxes, the amount of tax due under this section shall be

credited with the lesser of: 1. The amount of the death tax paid the other state and credited against the federal estate tax; or 57 58

59 2. An amount computed by multiplying the federal credit by a fraction, the numerator of which is the 60 value of that part of the gross estate over which another state or states have jurisdiction to the same extent to which Virginia would exert jurisdiction under this chapter with respect to the residents of such 61 62 other state or states and the denominator of which is the value of the decedent's gross estate.

63 C. Property of a resident includes:

- 64 1. Real property situated in the Commonwealth of Virginia;
- 65 2. Tangible personal property having an actual situs in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and
- 3. Intangible personal property owned by the resident regardless of where it is located. 66 67

§ 58.1-905. Filing returns; payment of tax due thereon.

A. 1. The personal representative of every estate subject to the tax imposed by this chapter who is **68** required by the laws of the United States to file a federal estate tax return shall file with the 69 70 Department, on or before the date the federal estate tax return is required to be filed:, (i) a return for the 71 tax due under this chapter; and (ii) a copy of the federal estate tax return.

2. If the personal representative of any estate subject to the tax imposed by this chapter is not 72 required by the laws of the United States to file a federal estate tax return, then the personal 73 74 representative shall file with the Department a return for the tax due under this chapter within the 270 75 days immediately following the death of the decedent.

B. 1. If the personal representative has obtained an extension of time for filing the federal estate tax 76 77 return or paying the federal estate tax or any portion thereof, the filing required by subsection A 78 subdivision A 1 or payment required by subsection C shall be similarly extended until the end of the 79 time period granted in the federal extension. Upon obtaining an extension of time for filing the federal 80 estate tax return, or paying the federal estate tax or any portion thereof, the personal representative shall provide the Department with a true copy of the instrument providing for this extension. 81

2. For personal representatives described under subdivision \overline{A} 2, the Department may grant an 82 83 extension of time for filing the state estate tax return or remitting to the Department the tax due pursuant to this chapter, or any portion of the tax due. The Department shall establish procedures and 84 85 conditions for an extension.

C. The tax due under this chapter shall be paid by the personal representative to the Department not 86 87 later than the date specified under subsection A or B. If such tax is paid pursuant to subsection B, 88 interest, at a rate equal to the rate of interest established pursuant to § 58.1-15, shall be added for the 89 period between the date when such tax would have been due had no extension been granted and the 90 date of full payment.

91 D. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the extensions provided to individual 92 taxpayers under subdivisions 1 and 2 of subsections F and G of § 58.1-344 shall be applicable in the 93 same manner to the tax imposed by this chapter. 94

§ 58.1-912. Deposit of funds.

95 All moneys collected pursuant to this chapter shall be paid into the general fund of the state treasury. If, on or after July 1, 2014, the General Assembly by law increases the staffing standards in nursing 96 97 homes requiring a minimum of direct care services to each resident per 24-hour period, then such 98 moneys shall first be used for funding the Medicaid cost of meeting such increases.

99 Five percent of the remaining moneys shall be designated through the general appropriation act to 100 fund home-based and community-based services to enable older adults and people with disabilities to 101 remain in home settings. Such appropriations shall include, but not be limited to, payment for services 102 through area agencies on aging and payment for support of home care providers through increased

103 Medicaid compensation, health insurance, and training.

104 Any moneys collected under this chapter remaining shall be used for health care purposes as 105 provided in the general appropriation act.
