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A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 22.1-253.13:1, 22.1-253.13:3, and 22.1-298.1 of the Code of Virginia, relating to Standards of Learning assessments; administration.

Referred to Committee on Education**Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:**

1. That §§ 22.1-253.13:1, 22.1-253.13:3, and 22.1-298.1 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 22.1-253.13:1. Standard 1. Instructional programs supporting the Standards of Learning and other educational objectives.

A. The General Assembly and the Board of Education believe that the fundamental goal of the public schools of the Commonwealth must be to enable each student to develop the skills that are necessary for success in school, preparation for life, and reaching their full potential. The General Assembly and the Board of Education find that the quality of education is dependent upon the provision of (i) the appropriate working environment, benefits, and salaries necessary to ensure the availability of high-quality instructional personnel; (ii) the appropriate learning environment designed to promote student achievement; (iii) quality instruction that enables each student to become a productive and educated citizen of Virginia and the United States of America; and (iv) the adequate commitment of other resources. In keeping with this goal, the General Assembly shall provide for the support of public education as set forth in Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of Virginia.

B. The Board of Education shall establish educational objectives known as the Standards of Learning, which shall form the core of Virginia's educational program, and other educational objectives, which together are designed to ensure the development of the skills that are necessary for success in school and for preparation for life in the years beyond. At a minimum, the Board shall establish Standards of Learning for English, mathematics, science, and history and social science. The Standards of Learning shall not be construed to be regulations as defined in § 2.2-4001.

The Board shall seek to ensure that the Standards of Learning are consistent with a high-quality foundation educational program. The Standards of Learning shall include, but not be limited to, the basic skills of communication (listening, speaking, reading, and writing); computation and critical reasoning, including problem solving and decision making; proficiency in the use of computers and related technology; and the skills to manage personal finances and to make sound financial decisions.

The English Standards of Learning for reading in kindergarten through grade three shall be based on components of effective reading instruction, to include, at a minimum, phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary development, and text comprehension.

The Standards of Learning in all subject areas shall be subject to regular review and revision to maintain rigor and to reflect a balance between content knowledge and the application of knowledge in preparation for eventual employment and lifelong learning. The Board of Education shall establish a regular schedule, in a manner it deems appropriate, for the review, and revision as may be necessary, of the Standards of Learning in all subject areas. Such review of each subject area shall occur at least once every seven years. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the Board from conducting such review and revision on a more frequent basis.

To provide appropriate opportunity for input from the general public, teachers, and local school boards, the Board of Education shall conduct public hearings prior to establishing revised Standards of Learning. Thirty days prior to conducting such hearings, the Board shall give notice of the date, time, and place of the hearings to all local school boards and any other persons requesting to be notified of the hearings and publish notice of its intention to revise the Standards of Learning in the Virginia Register of Regulations. Interested parties shall be given reasonable opportunity to be heard and present information prior to final adoption of any revisions of the Standards of Learning.

In addition, the Department of Education shall make available and maintain a website, either separately or through an existing website utilized by the Department of Education, enabling public elementary, middle, and high school educators to submit recommendations for improvements relating to the Standards of Learning, when under review by the Board according to its established schedule, and related assessments required by the Standards of Quality pursuant to this chapter. Such website shall facilitate the submission of recommendations by educators.

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School boards shall implement the Standards of Learning or objectives specifically designed for their school divisions that are equivalent to or exceed the Board's requirements. Students shall be expected to achieve the educational objectives established by the school division at appropriate age or grade levels. The curriculum adopted by the local school division shall be aligned to the Standards of Learning.

The Board of Education shall include in the Standards of Learning for history and social science the study of contributions to society of diverse people. For the purposes of this subsection, "diverse" includes consideration of disability, ethnicity, race, and gender.

The Board of Education shall include in the Standards of Learning for health instruction in emergency first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the use of an automated external defibrillator, including hands-on practice of the skills necessary to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Such instruction shall be based on the current national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines for cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of an automated external defibrillator, such as a program developed by the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross. No teacher who is in compliance with subdivision D 4 of § 22.1-298.1 shall be required to be certified as a trainer of cardiopulmonary resuscitation to provide instruction for non-certification.

With such funds as are made available for this purpose, the Board shall regularly review and revise the competencies for career and technical education programs to require the full integration of English, mathematics, science, and history and social science Standards of Learning. Career and technical education programs shall be aligned with industry and professional standard certifications, where they exist.

C. Local school boards shall develop and implement a program of instruction for grades K through 12 that is aligned to the Standards of Learning and meets or exceeds the requirements of the Board of Education. The program of instruction shall emphasize reading, writing, speaking, mathematical concepts and computations, proficiency in the use of computers and related technology, and scientific concepts and processes; essential skills and concepts of citizenship, including knowledge of Virginia history and world and United States history, economics, government, foreign languages, international cultures, health and physical education, environmental issues, and geography necessary for responsible participation in American society and in the international community; fine arts, which may include, but need not be limited to, music and art, and practical arts; knowledge and skills needed to qualify for further education, gainful employment, or training in a career or technical field; and development of the ability to apply such skills and knowledge in preparation for eventual employment and lifelong learning and to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

Local school boards shall also develop and implement programs of prevention, intervention, or remediation for students who are educationally at risk including, but not limited to, those who fail to achieve a passing score on any Standards of Learning assessment in grades three through eight or who fail an ~~end-of-course~~ a test required for the award of a verified unit of credit. Such programs shall include components that are research-based.

Any student who achieves a passing score on one or more, but not all, of the Standards of Learning assessments for the relevant grade level in grades three through eight may be required to attend a remediation program.

Any student who fails to achieve a passing score on all of the Standards of Learning assessments for the relevant grade level in grades three through eight or who fails an ~~end-of-course~~ a test required for the award of a verified unit of credit shall be required to attend a remediation program or to participate in another form of remediation. Division superintendents shall require such students to take special programs of prevention, intervention, or remediation, which may include attendance in public summer school programs, in accordance with clause (ii) of subsection A of § 22.1-254 and § 22.1-254.01.

Remediation programs shall include, when applicable, a procedure for early identification of students who are at risk of failing the Standards of Learning assessments in grades three through eight or who fail an ~~end-of-course~~ a test required for the award of a verified unit of credit. Such programs may also include summer school for all elementary and middle school grades and for all high school academic courses, as defined by regulations promulgated by the Board of Education, or other forms of remediation. Summer school remediation programs or other forms of remediation shall be chosen by the division superintendent to be appropriate to the academic needs of the student. Students who are required to attend such summer school programs or to participate in another form of remediation shall not be charged tuition by the school division.

The requirement for remediation may, however, be satisfied by the student's attendance in a program of prevention, intervention or remediation that has been selected by his parent, in consultation with the division superintendent or his designee, and is either (i) conducted by an accredited private school or (ii) a special program that has been determined to be comparable to the required public school remediation program by the division superintendent. The costs of such private school remediation program or other special remediation program shall be borne by the student's parent.

The Board of Education shall establish standards for full funding of summer remedial programs that

shall include, but not be limited to, the minimum number of instructional hours or the equivalent thereof required for full funding and an assessment system designed to evaluate program effectiveness. Based on the number of students attending and the Commonwealth's share of the per pupil instructional costs, state funds shall be provided for the full cost of summer and other remediation programs as set forth in the appropriation act, provided such programs comply with such standards as shall be established by the Board, pursuant to § 22.1-199.2.

D. Local school boards shall also implement the following:

1. Programs in grades K through three that emphasize developmentally appropriate learning to enhance success.

2. Programs based on prevention, intervention, or remediation designed to increase the number of students who earn a high school diploma and to prevent students from dropping out of school. Such programs shall include components that are research-based.

3. Career and technical education programs incorporated into the K through 12 curricula that include:

a. Knowledge of careers and all types of employment opportunities, including, but not limited to, apprenticeships, entrepreneurship and small business ownership, the military, and the teaching profession, and emphasize the advantages of completing school with marketable skills;

b. Career exploration opportunities in the middle school grades;

c. Competency-based career and technical education programs that integrate academic outcomes, career guidance, and job-seeking skills for all secondary students. Programs shall be based upon labor market needs and student interest. Career guidance shall include counseling about available employment opportunities and placement services for students exiting school. Each school board shall develop and implement a plan to ensure compliance with the provisions of this subdivision. Such plan shall be developed with the input of area business and industry representatives and local community colleges and shall be submitted to the Superintendent of Public Instruction in accordance with the timelines established by federal law; and

d. Annual notice on its website to enrolled high school students and their parents of the availability of the postsecondary education and employment data published by the State Council of Higher Education on its website pursuant to § 23-9.2:3.04.

4. Educational objectives in middle and high school that emphasize economic education and financial literacy pursuant to § 22.1-200.03.

5. Early identification of students with disabilities and enrollment of such students in appropriate instructional programs consistent with state and federal law.

6. Early identification of gifted students and enrollment of such students in appropriately differentiated instructional programs.

7. Educational alternatives for students whose needs are not met in programs prescribed elsewhere in these standards. Such students shall be counted in average daily membership (ADM) in accordance with the regulations of the Board of Education.

8. Adult education programs for individuals functioning below the high school completion level. Such programs may be conducted by the school board as the primary agency or through a collaborative arrangement between the school board and other agencies.

9. A plan to make achievements for students who are educationally at risk a divisionwide priority that shall include procedures for measuring the progress of such students.

10. An agreement for postsecondary degree attainment with a community college in the Commonwealth specifying the options for students to complete an associate's degree or a one-year Uniform Certificate of General Studies from a community college concurrent with a high school diploma. Such agreement shall specify the credit available for dual enrollment courses and Advanced Placement courses with qualifying exam scores of three or higher.

11. A plan to notify students and their parents of the availability of dual enrollment and advanced placement classes, the International Baccalaureate Program, and Academic Year Governor's School Programs, the qualifications for enrolling in such classes and programs, and the availability of financial assistance to low-income and needy students to take the advanced placement and International Baccalaureate examinations. This plan shall include notification to students and parents of the agreement with a community college in the Commonwealth to enable students to complete an associate's degree or a one-year Uniform Certificate of General Studies concurrent with a high school diploma.

12. Identification of students with limited English proficiency and enrollment of such students in appropriate instructional programs.

13. Early identification, diagnosis, and assistance for students with reading and mathematics problems and provision of instructional strategies and reading and mathematics practices that benefit the development of reading and mathematics skills for all students.

Local school divisions shall provide reading intervention services to students in kindergarten through grade three who demonstrate deficiencies based on their individual performance on the Standards of

182 Learning reading test or any reading diagnostic test that meets criteria established by the Department of
183 Education. Local school divisions shall report the results of the diagnostic tests to the Department of
184 Education on an annual basis, at a time to be determined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
185 Each student who receives early intervention reading services will be assessed again at the end of that
186 school year. The local school division, in its discretion, shall provide such reading intervention services
187 prior to promoting a student from grade three to grade four. Reading intervention services may include
188 the use of: special reading teachers; trained aides; volunteer tutors under the supervision of a certified
189 teacher; computer-based reading tutorial programs; aides to instruct in-class groups while the teacher
190 provides direct instruction to the students who need extra assistance; and extended instructional time in
191 the school day or school year for these students. Funds appropriated for prevention, intervention, and
192 remediation; summer school remediation; at-risk; or early intervention reading may be used to meet the
193 requirements of this subdivision.

194 Local school divisions shall provide algebra readiness intervention services to students in grades six
195 through nine who are at risk of failing the Algebra I ~~end-of-course test~~ *Standards of Learning*
196 *assessment*, as demonstrated by their individual performance on any diagnostic test that has been
197 approved by the Department of Education. Local school divisions shall report the results of the
198 diagnostic tests to the Department of Education on an annual basis, at a time to be determined by the
199 Superintendent of Public Instruction. Each student who receives algebra readiness intervention services
200 will be assessed again at the end of that school year. Funds appropriated for prevention, intervention,
201 and remediation; summer school remediation; at-risk; or algebra readiness intervention services may be
202 used to meet the requirements of this subdivision.

203 14. Incorporation of art, music, and physical education as a part of the instructional program at the
204 elementary school level.

205 15. A program of physical fitness available to all students with a goal of at least 150 minutes per
206 week on average during the regular school year. Such program may include any combination of (i)
207 physical education classes, (ii) extracurricular athletics, or (iii) other programs and physical activities
208 deemed appropriate by the local school board. Each local school board shall incorporate into its local
209 wellness policy a goal for the implementation of such program during the regular school year.

210 16. A program of student services for kindergarten through grade 12 that shall be designed to aid
211 students in their educational, social, and career development.

212 17. The collection and analysis of data and the use of the results to evaluate and make decisions
213 about the instructional program.

214 E. From such funds as may be appropriated or otherwise received for such purpose, there shall be
215 established within the Department of Education a unit to (i) conduct evaluative studies; (ii) provide the
216 resources and technical assistance to increase the capacity for school divisions to deliver quality
217 instruction; and (iii) assist school divisions in implementing those programs and practices that will
218 enhance pupil academic performance and improve family and community involvement in the public
219 schools. Such unit shall identify and analyze effective instructional programs and practices and
220 professional development initiatives; evaluate the success of programs encouraging parental and family
221 involvement; assess changes in student outcomes prompted by family involvement; and collect and
222 disseminate among school divisions information regarding effective instructional programs and practices,
223 initiatives promoting family and community involvement, and potential funding and support sources.
224 Such unit may also provide resources supporting professional development for administrators and
225 teachers. In providing such information, resources, and other services to school divisions, the unit shall
226 give priority to those divisions demonstrating a less than 70 percent passing rate on the Standards of
227 Learning assessments.

228 **§ 22.1-253.13:3. Standard 3. Accreditation, other standards, assessments, and releases from state**
229 **regulations.**

230 A. The Board of Education shall promulgate regulations establishing standards for accreditation
231 pursuant to the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), which shall include, but not be limited
232 to, student outcome measures, requirements and guidelines for instructional programs and for the
233 integration of educational technology into such instructional programs, administrative and instructional
234 staffing levels and positions, including staff positions for supporting educational technology, student
235 services, auxiliary education programs such as library and media services, course and credit requirements
236 for graduation from high school, community relations, and the philosophy, goals, and objectives of
237 public education in Virginia.

238 The Board of Education shall promulgate regulations establishing standards for accreditation of
239 public virtual schools under the authority of the local school board that enroll students full time.

240 The Board shall review annually the accreditation status of all schools in the Commonwealth.

241 Each local school board shall maintain schools that are fully accredited pursuant to the standards for
242 accreditation as prescribed by the Board of Education. Each local school board shall review the
243 accreditation status of all schools in the local school division annually in public session. Within the time

specified by the Board of Education, each school board shall submit corrective action plans for any schools within its school division that have been designated as not meeting the standards as approved by the Board.

When the Board of Education has obtained evidence through the school academic review process that the failure of schools within a division to achieve full accreditation status is related to division level failure to implement the Standards of Quality, the Board may require a division level academic review. After the conduct of such review and within the time specified by the Board of Education, each school board shall submit for approval by the Board a corrective action plan, consistent with criteria established by the Board and setting forth specific actions and a schedule designed to ensure that schools within its school division achieve full accreditation status. Such corrective action plans shall be part of the relevant school division's comprehensive plan pursuant to § 22.1-253.13:6.

With such funds as are appropriated or otherwise received for this purpose, the Board shall adopt and implement an academic review process, to be conducted by the Department of Education, to assist schools that are accredited with warning. The Department shall forward a report of each academic review to the relevant local school board, and such school board shall report the results of such academic review and the required annual progress reports in public session. The local school board shall implement any actions identified through the academic review and utilize them for improvement planning.

B. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall develop and the Board of Education shall approve criteria for determining and recognizing educational performance in the Commonwealth's public school divisions and schools. Such criteria, when approved, shall become an integral part of the accreditation process and shall include student outcome measurements. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall annually identify to the Board those school divisions and schools that exceed or do not meet the approved criteria. Such identification shall include an analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of public education programs in the various school divisions in Virginia and recommendations to the General Assembly for further enhancing student learning uniformly across the Commonwealth. In recognizing educational performance in the school divisions, the Board shall include consideration of special school division accomplishments, such as numbers of dual enrollments and students in Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate courses, and participation in academic year Governor's Schools.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall assist local school boards in the implementation of action plans for increasing educational performance in those school divisions and schools that are identified as not meeting the approved criteria. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall monitor the implementation of and report to the Board of Education on the effectiveness of the corrective actions taken to improve the educational performance in such school divisions and schools.

C. With such funds as are available for this purpose, the Board of Education shall prescribe assessment methods to determine the level of achievement of the Standards of Learning objectives by all students. Such assessments shall evaluate knowledge, application of knowledge, critical thinking, and skills related to the Standards of Learning being assessed. The Board shall ~~(i) in consultation with the chairpersons of the eight regional superintendents' study groups, establish a timetable for administering the Standards of Learning assessments to ensure genuine end-of-course and end-of-grade testing and (ii),~~ with the assistance of independent testing experts, conduct a regular analysis and validation process for these assessments.

The Board shall make such assessments available to each local school board in advance of each school year. Each local school board shall administer such assessments on the date during the school year that the board deems most appropriate to evaluate each student's knowledge, application of knowledge, critical thinking, and skills related to the Standards of Learning being assessed.

The Board shall also provide the option of industry certification and state licensure examinations as a student-selected verified credit.

The Board of Education shall make publicly available such assessments in a timely manner and as soon as practicable following the *final* administration of such tests, so long as the release of such assessments does not compromise test security or deplete the bank of assessment questions necessary to construct subsequent tests, or limit the ability to test students on demand and provide immediate results in the web-based assessment system.

The Board shall include in the student outcome measures that are required by the Standards for Accreditation ~~end-of-course or end-of-grade~~ assessments for various grade levels and classes, including the completion of the alternative assessments implemented by each local school board, in accordance with the Standards of Learning. These assessments shall include ~~end-of-course or end-of-grade~~ tests for English, mathematics, science, and history and social science.

The Standards of Learning assessments administered to students in grades three through eight shall not exceed (a) reading and mathematics in grades three and four; (b) reading, mathematics, and science in grade five; (c) reading and mathematics in grades six and seven; (d) reading, writing, mathematics,

305 and science in grade eight; and (e) Virginia Studies and Civics and Economics once each at the grade
306 levels deemed appropriate by each local school board.

307 Each school board shall annually certify that it has provided instruction and administered an
308 alternative assessment, consistent with Board guidelines, to students in grades three through eight in
309 each Standards of Learning subject area in which a Standards of Learning assessment was not
310 administered during the school year. Such guidelines shall (1) incorporate options for age-appropriate,
311 authentic performance assessments and portfolios with rubrics and other methodologies designed to
312 ensure that students are making adequate academic progress in the subject area and that the Standards of
313 Learning content is being taught; (2) permit and encourage integrated assessments that include multiple
314 subject areas; and (3) emphasize collaboration between teachers to administer and substantiate the
315 assessments and the professional development of teachers to enable them to make the best use of
316 alternative assessments.

317 Local school divisions shall provide targeted mathematics remediation and intervention to students in
318 grades six through eight who show computational deficiencies as demonstrated by their individual
319 performance on any diagnostic test or grade-level Standards of Learning mathematics test that measures
320 non-calculator computational skills.

321 In addition, to assess the educational progress of students, the Board of Education shall (A) develop
322 appropriate assessments, which may include criterion-referenced tests and other assessment instruments
323 that may be used by classroom teachers; (B) select appropriate industry certification and state licensure
324 examinations; and (C) prescribe and provide measures, which may include nationally normed tests to be
325 used to identify students who score in the bottom quartile at selected grade levels. An annual
326 justification that includes evidence that the student meets the participation criteria defined by the
327 Virginia Department of Education shall be provided for each student considered for the Virginia Grade
328 Level Alternative. Each Individual Education Program team shall review such justification and make the
329 final determination as to whether or not the Virginia Grade Level Alternative is appropriate for the
330 student. The superintendent and the school board chairman shall certify to the Board of Education, as a
331 part of certifying compliance with the Standards of Quality, that there is a justification in the Individual
332 Education Program for every student who takes the Virginia Grade Level Alternative. Compliance with
333 this requirement shall be monitored as a part of the special education monitoring process conducted by
334 the Department of Education. The Board shall report to the Governor and General Assembly in its
335 annual reports pursuant to § 22.1-18 any school division that is not in compliance with this
336 requirement.

337 The Standards of Learning requirements, including all related assessments, shall be waived for any
338 student awarded a scholarship under the Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship Program, pursuant to
339 § 30-231.2, who is enrolled in a preparation program for a high school equivalency examination
340 approved by the Board of Education or in an adult basic education program or an adult secondary
341 education program to obtain the high school diploma or a high school equivalency certificate.

342 The Board of Education may adopt special provisions related to the administration and use of any
343 Standards of Learning test or tests in a content area as applied to accreditation ratings for any period
344 during which the Standards of Learning content or assessments in that area are being revised and phased
345 in. Prior to statewide administration of such tests, the Board of Education shall provide notice to local
346 school boards regarding such special provisions.

347 D. The Board of Education may pursue all available civil remedies pursuant to § 22.1-19.1 or
348 administrative action pursuant to § 22.1-292.1 for breaches in test security and unauthorized alteration
349 of test materials or test results.

350 The Board may initiate or cause to be initiated a review or investigation of any alleged breach in
351 security, unauthorized alteration, or improper administration of tests, including the exclusion of students
352 from testing who are required to be assessed, by local school board employees responsible for the
353 distribution or administration of the tests.

354 Records and other information furnished to or prepared by the Board during the conduct of a review
355 or investigation may be withheld pursuant to subdivision 11 of § 2.2-3705.3. However, this section shall
356 not prohibit the disclosure of records to (i) a local school board or division superintendent for the
357 purpose of permitting such board or superintendent to consider or to take personnel action with regard to
358 an employee or (ii) any requester, after the conclusion of a review or investigation, in a form that (a)
359 does not reveal the identity of any person making a complaint or supplying information to the Board on
360 a confidential basis and (b) does not compromise the security of any test mandated by the Board. Any
361 local school board or division superintendent receiving such records or other information shall, upon
362 taking personnel action against a relevant employee, place copies of such records or information relating
363 to the specific employee in such person's personnel file.

364 Notwithstanding any other provision of state law, no test or examination authorized by this section,
365 including the Standards of Learning assessments, shall be released or required to be released as
366 minimum competency tests, if, in the judgment of the Board, such release would breach the security of

such test or examination or deplete the bank of questions necessary to construct future secure tests.

E. With such funds as may be appropriated, the Board of Education may provide, through an agreement with vendors having the technical capacity and expertise to provide computerized tests and assessments, and test construction, analysis, and security, for (i) web-based computerized tests and assessments, including computer-adaptive Standards of Learning assessments, for the evaluation of student progress during and after remediation and (ii) the development of a remediation item bank directly related to the Standards of Learning.

F. To assess the educational progress of students as individuals and as groups, each local school board shall require the use of Standards of Learning assessments, alternative assessments, and other relevant data, such as industry certification and state licensure examinations, to evaluate student progress and to determine educational performance. Each local school shall require the administration of appropriate assessments to students, which may include criterion-referenced tests and teacher-made tests and shall include the Standards of Learning assessments, the local school board's alternative assessments, and the National Assessment of Educational Progress state-by-state assessment. Each school board shall analyze and report annually, in compliance with any criteria that may be established by the Board of Education, the results from the Stanford Achievement Test Series, Ninth Edition (Stanford Nine) assessment, if administered, industry certification examinations, and the Standards of Learning Assessments to the public.

The Board of Education shall not require administration of the Stanford Achievement Test Series, Ninth Edition (Stanford Nine) assessment, except as may be selected to facilitate compliance with the requirements for home instruction pursuant to § 22.1-254.1.

The Board shall include requirements for the reporting of the Standards of Learning assessment scores and averages for each year as part of the Board's requirements relating to the School Performance Report Card. Such scores shall be disaggregated for each school by student subgroups on the Virginia assessment program as appropriate and shall be reported to the public within three months of their receipt. These reports (i) shall be posted on the portion of the Department of Education's website relating to the School Performance Report Card, in a format and in a manner that allows year-to-year comparisons, and (ii) may include the National Assessment of Educational Progress state-by-state assessment.

G. Each local school division superintendent shall regularly review the division's submission of data and reports required by state and federal law and regulations to ensure that all information is accurate and submitted in a timely fashion. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall provide a list of the required reports and data to division superintendents annually. The status of compliance with this requirement shall be included in the Board of Education's annual report to the Governor and the General Assembly as required by § 22.1-18.

H. Any school board may request the Board of Education for release from state regulations or, on behalf of one or more of its schools, for approval of an Individual School Accreditation Plan for the evaluation of the performance of one or more of its schools as authorized for certain other schools by the Standards of Accreditation pursuant to 8 VAC 20-131-280 C of the Virginia Administrative Code. Waivers of regulatory requirements may be granted by the Board of Education based on submission of a request from the division superintendent and chairman of the local school board. The Board of Education may grant, for a period up to five years, a waiver of regulatory requirements that are not (i) mandated by state or federal law or (ii) designed to promote health or safety. The school board shall provide in its waiver request a description of how the releases from state regulations are designed to increase the quality of instruction and improve the achievement of students in the affected school or schools. The Department of Education shall provide (a) guidance to any local school division that requests releases from state regulations and (b) information about opportunities to form partnerships with other agencies or entities to any local school division in which the school or schools granted releases from state regulations have demonstrated improvement in the quality of instruction and the achievement of students.

The Board of Education may also grant local school boards waivers of specific requirements in § 22.1-253.13:2, based on submission of a request from the division superintendent and chairman of the local school board, permitting the local school board to assign instructional personnel to the schools with the greatest needs, so long as the school division employs a sufficient number of personnel divisionwide to meet the total number required by § 22.1-253.13:2 and all pupil/teacher ratios and class size maximums set forth in subsection C of § 22.1-253.13:2 are met. The school board shall provide in its request a description of how the waivers from specific Standards of Quality staffing standards are designed to increase the quality of instruction and improve the achievement of students in the affected school or schools. The waivers may be renewed in up to five-year increments, or revoked, based on student achievement results in the affected school or schools.

§ 22.1-298.1. Regulations governing licensure.

428 A. As used in this section:

429 "Alternate route to licensure" means a nontraditional route to teacher licensure available to
430 individuals who meet the criteria specified in the regulations issued by the Board of Education.

431 "Industry certification credential" means a career and technical education credential that is earned by
432 successfully completing a Board of Education-approved industry certification examination, being issued a
433 state professional license, or successfully completing an occupational competency examination.

434 "Licensure by reciprocity" means a process used to issue a license to an individual coming into
435 Virginia from another state when that individual meets certain conditions specified in the Board of
436 Education's regulations.

437 "Professional teacher's assessment" means those tests mandated for licensure as prescribed by the
438 Board of Education.

439 "Provisional license" means a nonrenewable license issued by the Board of Education for a specified
440 period of time, not to exceed three years, to an individual who may be employed by a school division in
441 Virginia and who generally meets the requirements specified in the Board of Education's regulations for
442 licensure, but who may need to take additional coursework or pass additional assessments to be fully
443 licensed with a renewable license.

444 "Renewable license" means a license issued by the Board of Education for five years to an individual
445 who meets the requirements specified in the Board of Education's regulations.

446 B. The Board of Education shall prescribe, by regulation, the requirements for the licensure of
447 teachers and other school personnel required to hold a license. Such regulations shall include
448 requirements for the denial, suspension, cancellation, revocation, and reinstatement of licensure. The
449 Board of Education shall revoke the license of any person for whom it has received a notice of
450 dismissal or resignation pursuant to subsection F of § 22.1-313 and, in the case of a person who is the
451 subject of a founded complaint of child abuse or neglect, after all rights to any appeal provided by
452 § 63.2-1526 have been exhausted. Regardless of the authority of any other agency of the Commonwealth
453 to approve educational programs, only the Board of Education shall have the authority to license
454 teachers to be regularly employed by school boards, including those teachers employed to provide
455 nursing education.

456 The Board of Education shall prescribe by regulation the licensure requirements for teachers who
457 teach only online courses, as defined in § 22.1-212.23. Such license shall be valid only for teaching
458 online courses. Teachers who hold a five-year renewable license issued by the Board of Education may
459 teach online courses for which they are properly endorsed.

460 C. The Board of Education's regulations shall include requirements that a person seeking initial
461 licensure:

462 1. Complete professional assessments as prescribed by the Board of Education;

463 2. Complete study in attention deficit disorder;

464 3. Complete study in gifted education, including the use of multiple criteria to identify gifted
465 students; and

466 4. Complete study in methods of improving communication between schools and families and ways
467 of increasing family involvement in student learning at home and at school.

468 D. In addition, such regulations shall include requirements that:

469 1. Every person seeking initial licensure or renewal of a license demonstrate proficiency in the use of
470 educational technology for instruction;

471 2. Every person seeking initial licensure and persons seeking licensure renewal as teachers who have
472 not completed such study shall complete study in child abuse recognition and intervention in accordance
473 with curriculum guidelines developed by the Board of Education in consultation with the Department of
474 Social Services that are relevant to the specific teacher licensure routes;

475 3. Every person seeking initial licensure or renewal of a license shall receive professional
476 development in instructional methods tailored to promote student academic progress and effective
477 preparation for the Standards of Learning ~~end-of-course and end-of-grade~~ assessments;

478 4. Every person seeking initial licensure or renewal of a license shall provide evidence of completion
479 of certification or training in emergency first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the use of
480 automated external defibrillators. The certification or training program shall be based on the current
481 national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines for cardiopulmonary resuscitation and
482 the use of an automated external defibrillator, such as a program developed by the American Heart
483 Association or the American Red Cross. The Board shall provide a waiver for this requirement for any
484 person with a disability whose disability prohibits such person from completing the certification or
485 training;

486 5. Every person seeking licensure with an endorsement as a teacher of the blind and visually
487 impaired shall demonstrate proficiency in reading and writing Braille; and

488 6. Every teacher seeking initial licensure with an endorsement in the area of career and technical
489 education shall have an industry certification credential in the area in which the teacher seeks

490 endorsement.

491 E. The Board's regulations shall require that initial licensure for principals and assistant principals be
492 contingent upon passage of an assessment as prescribed by the Board.

493 F. The Board shall establish criteria in its regulations to effectuate the substitution of experiential
494 learning for coursework for those persons seeking initial licensure through an alternate route as defined
495 in Board regulations.

496 G. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the Board may provide for the issuance of
497 a provisional license, valid for a period not to exceed three years, to any person who does not meet the
498 requirements of this section or any other requirement for licensure imposed by law.

499 H. The Board's licensure regulations shall also provide for licensure by reciprocity:

500 1. With comparable endorsement areas for those individuals holding a valid out-of-state teaching
501 license and national certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards or a
502 nationally recognized certification program approved by the Board of Education. The application for
503 such individuals shall require evidence of such valid licensure and national certification and shall not
504 require official student transcripts;

505 2. For individuals who have obtained a valid out-of-state license, with full credentials and without
506 deficiencies, that is in force at the time the application for a Virginia license is received by the
507 Department of Education. The individual must establish a file in the Department of Education by
508 submitting a complete application packet, which shall include official student transcripts. An assessment
509 of basic skills as provided in § 22.1-298.2 and service requirements shall not be imposed for these
510 licensed individuals; however, other licensing assessments, as prescribed by the Board of Education,
511 shall be required; and

512 3. The Board may include other provisions for reciprocity in its regulations.
