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# HOUSE BILL NO. 2349

Offered January 23, 2015

A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-208.01 of the Code of Virginia, relating to character education; summer youth development academies.

#### Referred to Committee on Education

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

### 10 1. That § 22.1-208.01 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### § 22.1-208.01. Character education required.

12 A. Each school board shall establish, within its existing programs or as a separate program, a character education program in its schools, which may occur during the regular school year, during the 13 summer in a youth development academy offered by the school division, or both. The Department of 14 15 Education shall develop curricular guidelines for school divisions to use in establishing a character 16 education program through a summer youth development academy, including a summer youth development academy for female middle school students that focuses on career and life goals, 17 self-esteem, self-image, and other positive attributes. The purpose of the character education program 18 shall be to instill in students civic virtues and personal character traits so as to improve the learning 19 environment, promote student achievement, reduce disciplinary problems, and develop civic-minded students of high character. The components of each program shall be developed in cooperation with the 20 21 students, their parents, and the community at large. The basic character traits taught may include (i) 22 trustworthiness, including honesty, integrity, reliability, and loyalty; (ii) respect, including the precepts of 23 the Golden Rule, tolerance, and courtesy; (iii) responsibility, including hard work, economic 24 25 self-reliance, accountability, diligence, perseverance, and self-control; (iv) fairness, including justice, consequences of bad behavior, principles of nondiscrimination, and freedom from prejudice; (v) caring, 26 27 including kindness, empathy, compassion, consideration, generosity, and charity; and (vi) citizenship, 28 including patriotism, the Pledge of Allegiance, respect for the American flag, concern for the common 29 good, respect for authority and the law, and community-mindedness.

Classroom instruction may be used to supplement a character education program; however, each
 program shall be interwoven into the school procedures and environment and structured to instruct
 primarily through example, illustration, and participation, in such a way as to complement the Standards
 of Learning. The program shall also address the inappropriateness of bullying, as defined in
 § 22.1-276.01.

This provision is intended to educate students regarding those core civic values and virtues that are efficacious to civilized society and are common to the diverse social, cultural, and religious groups of the Commonwealth. Consistent with this purpose, Virginia's civic values, which are the principles articulated in the Bill of Rights (Article I) of the Constitution of Virginia and the ideals reflected in the seal of the Commonwealth, as described in § 1-500, may be taught as representative of such civic values. Nothing herein shall be construed as requiring or authorizing the indoctrination in any particular religious or political belief.

42 B. The Board of Education shall establish criteria for character education programs consistent with the provisions of this section. The Department of Education shall assist school divisions in implementing 43 44 character education programs and practices that are designed to promote the development of personal 45 qualities as set forth in this section and the Standards of Quality and that will improve family and 46 community involvement in the public schools. With such funds as are made available for this purpose, the Department of Education shall provide resources and technical assistance to school divisions 47 regarding successful character education programs and shall (i) identify and analyze effective character 48 49 education programs and practices and (ii) collect and disseminate among school divisions information regarding such programs and practices and potential funding and support sources. The Department of 50 51 Education may also provide resources supporting professional development for administrators and 52 teachers in the delivery of any character education programs.

53 C. The Department of Education shall award, with such funds as are appropriated for this purpose,
54 grants to school boards for the implementation of innovative character education programs, including a
55 summer youth development academy.
