## **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 893**

**3** *Commending Bethany College.* **4**

6 WHEREAS, Bethany College, located in Brooke County, West Virginia, which traces its roots to the
7 Buffalo Seminary early in the 19th century, was chartered by the Commonwealth of Virginia as a
8 four-year liberal arts college on March 2, 1840, and was recognized as a college by the new state of
9 West Virginia in 1863, making it the oldest college in the state of West Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Alexander Campbell, one of the principal founders of the Christian Church (Disciples of
Christ) in the United States, established Bethany College for the instruction of youth in science,
literature, the arts, and foreign languages, and Bethany College retains its historic affiliation with the
Christian Church; and

WHEREAS, Bethany College has provided its students with an excellent education to prepare them
for service in myriad careers, including law (Thomas Buergenthal, retired judge, International Court of
Justice, the Hague); medicine (Dr. John Niederhuber, former director of the National Cancer Institute
and currently chief executive officer, Inova Translational Medicine Institute); business (Gregory B.
Jordan, executive vice president and general counsel, PNC, and Robert J. McCann, chief executive
officer, The Americas UBS); and community service (Dr. Arthur B. Keys, Jr., former chief executive
officer of International Relief and Development); and

WHEREAS, other notable alumni of Bethany College include broadcasters Dave Sims of the Seattle
 Mariners, Faith Daniels, and Bob Orr, and Academy Award-winning actress Frances McDormand,
 among many others in various fields and professions; and

WHEREAS, Bethany College has benefited from many talented faculty members, including Amos
 Emerson Dolbear, the American physicist and inventor, who invented the electrostatic telephone while
 serving on the faculty at Bethany College in 1868 and had previously invented the first permanent
 magnet and metallic diaphragm for the telephone receiver; and

WHEREAS, Bethany College has benefited from excellent lay leaders through the years, including
United States President James A. Garfield, who served on the Bethany College board of trustees from
1866 to 1881; and

WHEREAS, in addition to President Garfield, four other United States presidents have visited the
 Bethany College campus, namely John F. Kennedy, Lyndon B. Johnson, Richard M. Nixon, and Gerald
 Ford; and

WHEREAS, since 1840, when Alexander Campbell became the first president of Bethany College,
only 19 individuals have served as president, with Scott D. Miller now serving in that position; the late
Governor of West Virginia, Cecil Underwood, served as Bethany College's 13th president, from 1972 to
1975; and

WHEREAS, Bethany College first admitted female students in 1877 and has upheld its commitment
to provide a quality liberal arts education to students from West Virginia and 27 other states, the District
of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and nine countries, serving its students as the only national liberal arts
college in West Virginia; now, therefore, be it

42 RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly hereby43 commend Bethany College on the occasion of its 175th anniversary; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates prepare a copy of this resolution
for presentation to Scott D. Miller, president of Bethany College, as an expression of the General
Assembly's admiration for the college's storied history and its outstanding leadership, scholarship, and
service to the State of West Virginia and the nation.
