10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 54.1-2930 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 54.1-2930. Requirements for licensure.
13	The Board may issue a license to practice medicine, osteopathy, chiropractic, and podiatric medicine
14	to any candidate who has submitted satisfactory evidence verified by affidavits that he:
15	1. Is 18 years of age or more;
16 17	<ol> <li>Is of good moral character;</li> <li>Has successfully completed all or such part as may be prescribed by the Board, of an educational</li> </ol>
18	course of study of that branch of the healing arts in which he desires a license to practice, which course
10 19	of study and the educational institution providing that course of study are acceptable to the Board; and
20	4. Has completed one year of satisfactory postgraduate training in a hospital approved by an
21	accrediting agency recognized by the Board for internships or residency training. At the discretion of the
22	Board, the postgraduate training may be waived if an applicant for licensure in podiatry has been in
23	active practice for four continuous years while serving in the military and is a diplomate of the
24	American Board of Podiatric Surgery. Applicants for licensure in chiropractic need not fulfill this
25	requirement.
26	In determining whether such course of study and institution are acceptable to it, the Board may
27 28	consider the reputation of the institution and whether it is approved or accredited by regional or national educational or professional associations including, but not limited to, such organizations as the
20 29	Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, Liaison Committee on Medical Education,
<u>30</u>	Council on Postgraduate Training of the American Osteopathic Association, Council on Osteopathic
31	College Accreditation, College of Family Physicians of Canada, Committee for the Accreditation of
32	Canadian Medical Schools, Education Commission on Foreign Medical Graduates, Royal College of
33	Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, or their appropriate subsidiary agencies; by any appropriate agency
34	of the United States government; or by any other organization approved by the Board. Supervised
35	clinical training that is received in the United States as part of the curriculum of an international medical
36	school shall be obtained in an approved hospital, institution or school of medicine offering an approved
37 38	residency program in the specialty area for the relevant clinical training or in a program acceptable to the Board and deemed a substantially equivalent experience. The Board may also consider any other
