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11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That §§ 18.2-340.16, 18.2-340.19, 18.2-340.22, and 18.2-340.33 of the Code of Virginia are
13 14	amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 18.2-340.28:2 as follows:
14	§ 18.2-340.16. Definitions.
16	As used in this article, unless the context requires a different meaning:
17	"Bingo" means a specific game of chance played with (i) individual cards having randomly numbered
18	squares ranging from one to 75, (ii) Department-approved electronic devices that display facsimiles of
19	bingo cards and are used for the purpose of marking and monitoring players' cards as numbers are
20	called, or (iii) Department-approved cards, in which prizes are awarded on the basis of designated
21	numbers on such cards conforming to a predetermined pattern of numbers selected at random.
22	"Board" means the Charitable Gaming Board created pursuant to § 2.2-2455.
23	"Bona fide member" means an individual who participates in activities of a qualified organization
24	other than such organization's charitable gaming activities.
25	"Charitable gaming" or "charitable games" means those raffles and games of chance explicitly
26	authorized by this article.
27	"Charitable gaming supplies" includes bingo cards or sheets, devices for selecting bingo numbers,
28	instant bingo cards, pull-tab cards and seal cards, and any other equipment or product manufactured for
29 30	or intended to be used in the conduct of charitable games. However for the purposes of this article, charitable gaming supplies shall not include items incidental to the conduct of charitable gaming such as
30 31	markers, wands or tape.
32	"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
33	"Conduct" means the actions associated with the provision of a gaming operation during and
34	immediately before or after the permitted activity, which may include, but not be limited to, (i) selling
35	bingo cards or packs, electronic devices, instant bingo or pull-tab cards, or raffle tickets, (ii) calling
36	bingo games, (iii) distributing prizes, and (iv) any other services provided by volunteer workers.
37	"Department" means the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
38	"Electronic poker game" means the game of poker when offered and simulated by an electronic
39	gaming machine that uses video images and a random number generator and the images projected on
40	the video display of electronic poker gaming machines are a material component of the game.
41	"Fair market rental value" means the rent that a rental property will bring when offered for lease by
42	a lessor who desires to lease the property but is not obligated to do so and leased by a lessee under no
43 44	necessity of leasing.
44 45	"Gaming expenses" means prizes, supplies, costs of publicizing gaming activities, audit and administration or permit fees, and a portion of the rent, utilities, accounting and legal fees and such
<b>4</b> 6	other reasonable and proper expenses as are directly incurred for the conduct of charitable gaming.
47	"Gross receipts" means the total amount of money generated by an organization from charitable
48	gaming before the deduction of expenses, including prizes.
49	"Instant bingo," "pull tabs," or "seal cards" means specific games of chance played by the random
50	selection of one or more individually prepacked cards, including Department-approved electronic
51	versions thereof, with winners being determined by the preprinted or predetermined appearance of
52	concealed letters, numbers or symbols that must be exposed by the player to determine wins and losses
53	and may include the use of a seal card which conceals one or more numbers or symbols that have been
54	designated in advance as prize winners. Such cards may be dispensed by electronic or mechanical
55	equipment.
56 57	"Jackpot" means a bingo game that the organization has designated on its game program as a jackpot
57 58	game in which the prize amount is greater than \$100. "I andlord" means any person or his agent firm association organization partnership or corporation
50	"Landlord" means any person or his agent, firm, association, organization, partnership, or corporation,

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59 employee, or immediate family member thereof, which owns and leases, or leases any premises devoted 60 in whole or in part to the conduct of bingo games, and any person residing in the same household as a

61 landlord.

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62 "Management" means the provision of oversight of a gaming operation, which may include, but is 63 not limited to, the responsibilities of applying for and maintaining a permit or authorization, compiling, 64 submitting and maintaining required records and financial reports, and ensuring that all aspects of the 65 operation are in compliance with all applicable statutes and regulations.

"Network bingo" means a specific bingo game in which pari-mutuel play is permitted. 66

"Network bingo provider" means a person licensed by the Department to operate network bingo. 67

"Operation" means the activities associated with production of a charitable gaming activity, which 68 may include, but not be limited to (i) the direct on-site supervision of the conduct of charitable gaming; 69 70 (ii) coordination of volunteers; and (iii) all responsibilities of charitable gaming designated by the 71 organization's management.

"Organization" means any one of the following:

73 1. A volunteer fire department or rescue squad or auxiliary unit thereof which has been recognized in 74 accordance with § 15.2-955 by an ordinance or resolution of the political subdivision where the 75 volunteer fire department or rescue squad is located as being a part of the safety program of such 76 political subdivision: 77

2. An organization operated exclusively for religious, charitable, community or educational purposes;

78 3. An athletic association or booster club or a band booster club established solely to raise funds for 79 school-sponsored athletic or band activities for a public school or private school accredited pursuant to 80 § 22.1-19 or to provide scholarships to students attending such school; 81

4. An association of war veterans or auxiliary units thereof organized in the United States;

5. A fraternal association or corporation operating under the lodge system;

6. A local chamber of commerce; or

84 7. Any other nonprofit organization that raises funds by conducting raffles that generate annual gross 85 receipts of \$40,000 or less, provided such gross receipts from the raffle, less expenses and prizes, are 86 used exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or community purposes.

87 "Poker game" means any of several card games in which a player bets that the value of his hand is 88 greater than that of the hands held by other players, in which each subsequent player must either equal 89 or raise the bet or drop out, and in which the player holding the highest hand at the end of the betting 90 wins the prize, stake, or other consideration or thing of value.

91 "Pari-mutuel play" means an integrated network operated by a licensee of the Department comprised 92 of participating charitable organizations for the conduct of network bingo games in which the purchase 93 of a network bingo card by a player automatically includes the player in a pool with all other players in 94 the network, and where the prize to the winning player is awarded based on a percentage of the total 95 amount of network bingo cards sold in a particular network.

"Qualified organization" means any organization to which a valid permit has been issued by the 96 97 Department to conduct charitable gaming or any organization that is exempt pursuant to § 18.2-340.23.

98 "Raffle" means a lottery in which the prize is won by (i) a random drawing of the name or 99 prearranged number of one or more persons purchasing chances or (ii) a random contest in which the 100 winning name or preassigned number of one or more persons purchasing chances is determined by a race involving inanimate objects floating on a body of water, commonly referred to as a "duck race." 101

102 "Reasonable and proper business expenses" means business expenses actually incurred by a qualified organization in the conduct of charitable gaming and not otherwise allowed under this article or under 103 Board regulations on real estate and personal property tax payments, travel expenses, payments of 104 utilities and trash collection services, legal and accounting fees, costs of business furniture, fixtures and 105 office equipment and costs of acquisition, maintenance, repair or construction of an organization's real 106 107 property. For the purpose of this definition, salaries and wages of employees whose primary 108 responsibility is to provide services for the principal benefit of an organization's members shall not 109 qualify as a business expense. However, payments made pursuant to § 51.1-1204 to the Volunteer Firefighters' and Rescue Squad Workers' Service Award Fund shall be deemed a reasonable and proper 110 111 business expense.

"Supplier" means any person who offers to sell, sells or otherwise provides charitable gaming 112 113 supplies to any qualified organization.

## § 18.2-340.19. Regulations of the Board.

A. The Board shall adopt regulations that:

1. Require, as a condition of receiving a permit, that the applicant use a predetermined percentage of 116 117 its gross receipts for (i) those lawful religious, charitable, community or educational purposes for which the organization is specifically chartered or organized or (ii) those expenses relating to the acquisition, 118 119 construction, maintenance or repair of any interest in real property involved in the operation of the organization and used for lawful religious, charitable, community or educational purposes. The 120

121 regulation may provide for a graduated scale of percentages of gross receipts to be used in the foregoing 122 manner based upon factors the Board finds appropriate to and consistent with the purpose of charitable 123 gaming.

124 2. Specify the conditions under which a complete list of the organization's members who participate 125 in the management, operation or conduct of charitable gaming may be required in order for the Board to 126 ascertain the percentage of Virginia residents in accordance with subdivision A 3 of § 18.2-340.24.

127 Membership lists furnished to the Board or Department in accordance with this subdivision shall not 128 be a matter of public record and shall be exempt from disclosure under the provisions of the Freedom of 129 Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.).

130 3. Prescribe fees for processing applications for charitable gaming permits. Such fees may reflect the 131 nature and extent of the charitable gaming activity proposed to be conducted. 132

4. Establish requirements for the audit of all reports required in accordance with § 18.2-340.30.

133 5. Define electronic and mechanical equipment used in the conduct of charitable gaming. Board 134 regulations shall include capacity for such equipment to provide full automatic daubing as numbers are 135 called. For the purposes of this subdivision, electronic or mechanical equipment for instant bingo, pull tabs, or seal cards shall include such equipment that displays facsimiles of instant bingo, pull tabs, or 136 137 seal cards and are used solely for the purpose of dispensing or opening such paper or electronic cards, 138 or both; but shall not include (i) devices operated by dropping one or more coins or tokens into a slot 139 and pulling a handle or pushing a button or touchpoint on a touchscreen to activate one to three or more 140 reels marked into horizontal segments by varying symbols, where the predetermined prize amount 141 depends on how and how many of the symbols line up when the rotating reels come to rest, or (ii) other 142 similar devices that display flashing lights or illuminations, or bells, whistles, or other sounds, solely 143 intended to entice players to play.

144 6. Prescribe the conditions under which a qualified organization may (i) provide food and 145 nonalcoholic beverages to its members who participate in the management, operation or conduct of 146 bingo; (ii) permit members who participate in the management, operation or conduct of bingo to play 147 bingo; and (iii) subject to the provisions of subdivision 13 of § 18.2-340.33, permit nonmembers to 148 participate in the conduct of bingo so long as the nonmembers are under the direct supervision of a 149 bona fide member of the organization during the bingo game.

150 7. Prescribe the conditions under which a qualified organization may sell raffle tickets for a raffle 151 drawing that will be held outside the Commonwealth pursuant to subsection B of § 18.2-340.26.

152 8. Prescribe the conditions under which persons who are bona fide members of a qualified 153 organization or a child, above the age of 13 years, of a bona fide member of such organization may 154 participate in the conduct or operation of bingo games.

155 9. Prescribe the conditions under which a person below the age of 18 years may play bingo, 156 provided such person is accompanied by his parent or legal guardian.

157 10. Require all qualified organizations that are subject to Board regulations to post in a conspicuous 158 place in every place where charitable gaming is conducted a sign which bears a toll-free telephone number for "Gamblers Anonymous" or other organization which provides assistance to compulsive 159 160 gamblers.

161 11. Prescribe the conditions under which a qualified organization may sell network bingo cards in 162 accordance with § 18.2-340.28:1 and establish a percentage of proceeds derived from network bingo 163 sales to be allocated to (i) prize pools, (ii) the organization conducting the network bingo, and (iii) the 164 network bingo provider. The regulations shall also establish procedures for the retainage and ultimate 165 distribution of any unclaimed prize.

166 12. Prescribe the conditions under which a qualified organization may manage, operate, or conduct 167 electronic poker games.

168 B. In addition to the powers and duties granted pursuant to § 2.2-2456 and this article, the Board 169 may, by regulation, approve variations to the card formats for bingo games provided such variations 170 result in bingo games that are conducted in a manner consistent with the provisions of this article. 171 Board-approved variations may include, but are not limited to, bingo games commonly referred to as 172 player selection games and 90-number bingo.

173 § 18.2-340.22. Only raffles, bingo, network bingo, instant bingo games, and electronic poker 174 games permitted; prizes not gaming contracts.

175 A. This article permits qualified organizations to conduct raffles, bingo, network bingo, and instant 176 bingo games, and electronic poker games. All games not explicitly authorized by this article or Board 177 regulations adopted in accordance with § 18.2-340.18 are prohibited.

178 B. The award of any prize money for any charitable game shall not be deemed to be part of any 179 gaming contract within the purview of § 11-14.

180 C. Nothing in this article shall prohibit an organization from using the Virginia Lottery's Pick-3 181 number or any number or other designation selected by the Virginia Lottery in connection with any 182 lottery, as the basis for determining the winner of a raffle.

183 § 18.2-340.28:2. Conduct of electronic poker games by certain qualified organizations.

184 A. A qualified organization that has been conducting regular bingo games for at least 36 months 185 pursuant to a valid permit issued by the Department is authorized to conduct electronic poker games at 186 any time under the following conditions:

187 1. The electronic poker games are conducted at the same location designated in the permit for 188 regular bingo games;

189 2. The location is owned by the qualified organization; and

3. The location is not operated on a for-profit basis. 190

191 B. A qualified organization shall accept only cash in payment of any charges or assessments for 192 participation in any electronic poker game.

C. No qualified organization or any person on the premises shall extend lines of credit or accept any 193 194 credit or debit card or other electronic fund transfer in payment of any charges or assessments for 195 players to participate in electronic poker games.

196 D. No qualified organization shall allow any individual younger than 18 years of age to participate 197 in an electronic poker game.

198 E. No hand of any electronic poker game shall allow a bet in excess of \$10.

199 F. Nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize a qualified organization to allow poker 200 card games or to conduct poker tournaments. 201

## § 18.2-340.33. Prohibited practices.

202 In addition to those other practices prohibited by this article, the following acts or practices are 203 prohibited:

204 1. No part of the gross receipts derived by a qualified organization may be used for any purpose 205 other than (i) reasonable and proper gaming expenses, (ii) reasonable and proper business expenses, (iii) 206 those lawful religious, charitable, community or educational purposes for which the organization is 207 specifically chartered or organized, and (iv) expenses relating to the acquisition, construction, 208 maintenance, or repair of any interest in the real property involved in the operation of the organization 209 and used for lawful religious, charitable, community or educational purposes. For the purposes of clause (iv), such expenses may include the expenses of a corporation formed for the purpose of serving as the 210 real estate holding entity of a qualified organization, provided (a) such holding entity is qualified as a 211 tax exempt organization under § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code and (b) the membership of the 212 213 qualified organization is identical to such holding entity.

214 2. Except as provided in § 18.2-340.34:1, no qualified organization shall enter into a contract with or 215 otherwise employ for compensation any person for the purpose of organizing, managing, or conducting 216 any charitable games. However, organizations composed of or for deaf or blind persons may use a part 217 of their gross receipts for costs associated with providing clerical assistance in the management and operation but not the conduct of charitable gaming. 218

The provisions of this subdivision shall not prohibit the joint operation of bingo games held in 219 220 accordance with § 18.2-340.29.

221 3. No person shall pay or receive for use of any premises devoted, in whole or in part, to the 222 conduct of any charitable games, any consideration in excess of the current fair market rental value of 223 such property. Fair market rental value consideration shall not be based upon or determined by reference 224 to a percentage of the proceeds derived from the operation of any charitable games or to the number of 225 people in attendance at such charitable games.

226 4. No building or other premises shall be utilized in whole or in part for the purpose of conducting 227 charitable gaming more frequently than two calendar days in any one calendar week. However, no 228 building or other premises owned by (i) a qualified organization which is exempt from taxation pursuant 229 to § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code or (ii) any county, city or town shall be utilized in whole or in 230 part for the purpose of conducting bingo games more frequently than four calendar days in any one 231 calendar week.

232 The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to the playing of bingo games pursuant to a special 233 permit issued in accordance with § 18.2-340.27.

234 5. No person shall participate in the management or operation of any charitable game unless such 235 person is and, for a period of at least 30 days immediately preceding such participation, has been a bona 236 fide member of the organization. For any organization that is not composed of members, a person who 237 is not a bona fide member may volunteer in the conduct of a charitable game as long as that person is 238 directly supervised by a bona fide official member of the organization.

239 The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to (i) persons employed as clerical assistants by qualified organizations composed of or for deaf or blind persons; (ii) employees of a corporate sponsor of a qualified organization, provided such employees' participation is limited to the management, operation or conduct of no more than one raffle per year; (iii) the spouse or family member of any such 240 241 242 243 bona fide member of a qualified organization provided at least one bona fide member is present; or (iv)

244 persons employed by a qualified organization authorized to sell pull tabs or seal cards in accordance 245 with § 18.2-340.16, provided (a) such sales are conducted by no more than two on-duty employees, (b) such employees receive no compensation for or based on the sale of the pull tabs or seal cards, and (c) 246 247 such sales are conducted in the private social quarters of the organization.

248 6. No person shall receive any remuneration for participating in the management, operation or 249 conduct of any charitable game, except that:

250 a. Persons employed by organizations composed of or for deaf or blind persons may receive 251 remuneration not to exceed \$30 per event for providing clerical assistance in the management and 252 operation but not the conduct of charitable games only for such organizations;

253 b. Persons under the age of 19 who sell raffle tickets for a qualified organization to raise funds for 254 youth activities in which they participate may receive nonmonetary incentive awards or prizes from the 255 organization;

256 c. Remuneration may be paid to off-duty law-enforcement officers from the jurisdiction in which 257 such bingo games are played for providing uniformed security for such bingo games even if such officer 258 is a member of the sponsoring organization, provided the remuneration paid to such member is in 259 accordance with off-duty law-enforcement personnel work policies approved by the local law-enforcement official and further provided that such member is not otherwise engaged in the 260 management, operation or conduct of the bingo games of that organization, or to private security 261 services businesses licensed pursuant to § 9.1-139 providing uniformed security for such bingo games, 262 263 provided that employees of such businesses shall not otherwise be involved in the management, 264 operation, or conduct of the bingo games of that organization;

265 d. A member of a qualified organization lawfully participating in the management, operation or 266 conduct of a bingo game may be provided food and nonalcoholic beverages by such organization for 267 on-premises consumption during the bingo game provided the food and beverages are provided in 268 accordance with Board regulations; and

269 e. Remuneration may be paid to bingo managers or callers who have a current registration certificate 270 issued by the Department in accordance with § 18.2-340.34:1, or who are exempt from such registration 271 requirement. Such remuneration shall not exceed \$100 per session.

272 7. No landlord shall, at bingo games conducted on the landlord's premises, (i) participate in the 273 conduct, management, or operation of any bingo games; (ii) sell, lease or otherwise provide for 274 consideration any bingo supplies, including, but not limited to, bingo cards, instant bingo cards, or other 275 game pieces; or (iii) require as a condition of the lease or by contract that a particular manufacturer, 276 distributor or supplier of bingo supplies or equipment be used by the organization.

277 The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to any qualified organization conducting bingo 278 games on its own behalf at premises owned by it.

279 8. No qualified organization shall enter into any contract with or otherwise employ or compensate 280 any member of the organization on account of the sale of bingo supplies or equipment.

281 9. No organization shall award any bingo prize money or any merchandise valued in excess of the 282 following amounts:

283 a. No bingo door prize shall exceed \$50 for a single door prize or \$250 in cumulative door prizes in 284 any one session; 285

b. No regular bingo or special bingo game prize shall exceed \$100;

c. No instant bingo, pull tab, or seal card prize for a single card shall exceed \$1,000;

287 d. Except as provided in subdivision 9, no bingo jackpot of any nature whatsoever shall exceed 288 \$1,000, nor shall the total amount of bingo jackpot prizes awarded in any one session exceed \$1,000. 289 Proceeds from the sale of bingo cards and the sheets used for bingo jackpot games shall be accounted 290 for separately from the bingo cards or sheets used for any other bingo games; and

291 e. No single network bingo prize shall exceed \$25,000. Proceeds from the sale of network bingo 292 cards shall be accounted for separately from bingo cards and sheets used for any other bingo game; and 293 f. No electronic poker game prize shall exceed \$100.

10. The provisions of subdivision 9 shall not apply to:

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294 295 Any progressive bingo game, in which (a) a regular or special prize, not to exceed \$100, is awarded 296 on the basis of predetermined numbers or patterns selected at random and (b) a progressive prize, not to 297 exceed \$500 for the initial progressive prize and \$5,000 for the maximum progressive prize, is awarded 298 if the predetermined numbers or patterns are covered when a certain number of numbers is called, 299 provided (i) there are no more than six such games per session per organization, (ii) the amount of 300 increase of the progressive prize per session is no more than \$100, (iii) the bingo cards or sheets used in 301 such games are sold separately from the bingo cards or sheets used for any other bingo games, (iv) the 302 organization separately accounts for the proceeds from such sale, and (v) such games are otherwise 303 operated in accordance with the Department's rules of play.

304 11. No organization shall award any raffle prize valued at more than \$100,000. SB964

The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to a raffle conducted no more than once per calendar year by a qualified organization qualified as a tax-exempt organization pursuant to § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code for a prize consisting of a lot improved by a residential dwelling where 100 percent of the moneys received from such a raffle, less deductions for the fair market value for the cost of acquisition of the land and materials, are donated to lawful religious, charitable, community, or educational organizations specifically chartered or organized under the laws of the Commonwealth and qualified as a § 501(c) tax-exempt organization.

312 12. No qualified organization composed of or for deaf or blind persons which employs a person not
a member to provide clerical assistance in the management and operation but not the conduct of any
charitable games shall conduct such games unless it has in force fidelity insurance, as defined in §
315 38.2-120, written by an insurer licensed to do business in the Commonwealth.

13. No person shall participate in the management or operation of any charitable game if he has ever 316 317 been convicted of any felony or if he has been convicted of any misdemeanor involving fraud, theft, or financial crimes within the preceding five years. No person shall participate in the conduct of any 318 319 charitable game if, within the preceding 10 years, he has been convicted of any felony or if, within the 320 preceding five years he has been convicted of any misdemeanor involving fraud, theft, or financial 321 crimes. In addition, no person shall participate in the management, operation or conduct of any charitable game if that person, within the preceding five years, has participated in the management, 322 323 operation, or conduct of any charitable game which was found by the Department or a court of 324 competent jurisdiction to have been operated in violation of state law, local ordinance or Board 325 regulation.

14. Qualified organizations jointly conducting bingo games pursuant to § 18.2-340.29 shall not
circumvent any restrictions and prohibitions which would otherwise apply if a single organization were
conducting such games. These restrictions and prohibitions shall include, but not be limited to, the
frequency with which bingo games may be held, the value of merchandise or money awarded as prizes,
or any other practice prohibited under this section.

15. A qualified organization shall not purchase any charitable gaming supplies for use in the
 Commonwealth from any person who is not currently registered with the Department as a supplier
 pursuant to § 18.2-340.34.

16. Unless otherwise permitted in this article, no part of an organization's charitable gaming grossreceipts shall be used for an organization's social or recreational activities.
