3. Committee: Courts of Justice

4. Title: Reporting of medical aid or treatment for drug overdoses.

5. Summary: Requires a physician or other person who renders any medical aid or treatment to any person for an overdose that he knows or has reason to believe is an overdose of a controlled substance classified in Schedule I or II of the Drug Control Act to report such aid or treatment and the patient's name and address, if known, to local law enforcement.

6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No.

7. Fiscal Impact Estimate: Indeterminate, see Item 8.

8. Fiscal Implications: The agency has stated that this bill will not impact agency operations. Furthermore, noncompliance is a Class 3 misdemeanor, which does not carry any jail or prison time and is handled via a fine. There is no way of projecting the number of persons likely to be convicted nor the amount of any fine imposed, therefore the fiscal impact would be indeterminate.
