**3. Committee:** Privileges and Elections

**4. Title:** Members of the United States Congress; filling vacancies.

**5. Summary:** Prohibits the Governor from issuing a writ of election if a vacancy occurs in the representation of the Commonwealth in the United States Senate or the House of Representatives within the 55 days prior to the general election at which the office is regularly scheduled to be filled. The bill provides that candidate who receives the highest number of votes at the general election shall be deemed also to have been elected for the unexpired term of office, and the results shall be certified and transmitted as such to the clerk of the United States Senate or House of Representatives, as appropriate.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** According to the Department of Elections, the substitute for Senate Bill 1066 would not have a state fiscal impact. This bill is not expected to generate any cost savings because the special election would run concurrent with the general election. The resulting change would be one less item on the ballot. This bill is also not expected to eliminate all special elections but only the special elections that are scheduled on the same day as a general election that are filling the same office.
