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VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact §§ 22.1-271.5 and 22.1-271.6 of the Code of Virginia, relating to local 3 school divisions; "Return to Learn Protocol" for students who have suffered concussions or other 4 head injuries.

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Approved

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

8 1. That §§ 22.1-271.5 and 22.1-271.6 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as 9 follows: 10

§ 22.1-271.5. Guidelines and policies and procedures on concussions in student-athletes.

11 A. The Board of Education shall develop and distribute to each local school division guidelines on 12 policies to inform and educate coaches, student-athletes, and their parents or guardians of the nature and 13 risk of concussions, criteria for removal from and return to play, risks of not reporting the injury and continuing to play, and the effects of concussions on student-athletes' academic performance. 14

15 B. Each local school division shall develop policies and procedures regarding the identification and 16 handling of suspected concussions in student-athletes. Such policies shall require:

17 1. In Require that in order to participate in any extracurricular physical activity, each student-athlete 18 and the student-athlete's parent or guardian shall review, on an annual basis, information on concussions 19 provided by the local school division. After having reviewed materials describing the short- and 20 long-term health effects of concussions, each student-athlete and the student-athlete's parent or guardian 21 shall sign a statement acknowledging receipt of such information, in a manner approved by the Board of 22 Education; and

23 2. A Require a student-athlete suspected by that student-athlete's coach, athletic trainer, or team 24 physician of sustaining a concussion or brain injury in a practice or game shall to be removed from the 25 activity at that time. A student-athlete who has been removed from play, evaluated, and suspected to 26 have a concussion or brain injury shall not return to play that same day nor until (i) evaluated by an 27 appropriate licensed health care provider as determined by the Board of Education and (ii) in receipt of 28 written clearance to return to play from such licensed health care provider.

29 The licensed health care provider evaluating student-athletes suspected of having a concussion or 30 brain injury may be a volunteer.; and 31

3. Include a "Return to Learn Protocol" with the following requirements:

32 a. School personnel shall be alert to cognitive and academic issues that may be experienced by a 33 student who has suffered a concussion or other head injury, including (i) difficulty with concentration, 34 organization, and long-term and short-term memory; (ii) sensitivity to bright lights and sounds; and (iii) 35 short-term problems with speech and language, reasoning, planning, and problem solving; and

36 b. School personnel shall accommodate the gradual return to full participation in academic activities 37 of a student who has suffered a concussion or other head injury as appropriate, based on the 38 recommendation of the student's licensed health care provider as to the appropriate amount of time that 39 such student needs to be away from the classroom.

40 C. Each non-interscholastic youth sports program utilizing public school property shall either (i) 41 establish policies and procedures regarding the identification and handling of suspected concussions in 42 student-athletes, consistent with either the local school division's policies and procedures developed in 43 compliance with this section or the Board's Guidelines for Policies on Concussions in Student-Athletes, or (ii) follow the local school division's policies and procedures as set forth in subsection B. In addition, 44 45 local school divisions may provide the guidelines to organizations sponsoring athletic activity for student-athletes on school property. Local school divisions shall not be required to enforce compliance 46 47 with such policies.

48 D. As used in this section, "non-interscholastic youth sports program" means a program organized for 49 recreational athletic competition or recreational athletic instruction for youth. 50

§ 22.1-271.6. School division policies and procedures on concussions in students.

The Board of Education shall amend its guidelines for school division policies and procedures on 51 concussions in student-athletes to include a "Return to Learn Protocol" with the following requirements: 52

53 1. School personnel shall be alert to cognitive and academic issues that may be experienced by a 54 student-athlete student who has suffered a concussion or other head injury, including (i) difficulty with 55 concentration, organization, and long-term and short-term memory; (ii) sensitivity to bright lights and 56 sounds; and (iii) short-term problems with speech and language, reasoning, planning, and problem

on the recommendation of the student-athlete's student's licensed health care provider as to the
appropriate amount of time that such student-athlete student needs to be away from the classroom.
