That §§ 16.1-260, 18.2-248.1, 18.2-250.1, 18.2-251, 18.2-252, 18.2-259.1, 18.2-287.2, 18.2-308.1:5, 12 18.2-308.09, 18.2-460, 19.2-386.22, and 46.2-390.1 of the Code of Virginia are amended and 13 reenacted as follows: 14 15 § 16.1-260. Intake; petition; investigation. A. All matters alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the court shall be commenced by the filing of 16 a petition, except as provided in subsection H and in § 16.1-259. The form and content of the petition 17 shall be as provided in § 16.1-262. No individual shall be required to obtain support services from the 18 Department of Social Services prior to filing a petition seeking support for a child. Complaints, requests 19 20 and the processing of petitions to initiate a case shall be the responsibility of the intake officer. However, (i) the attorney for the Commonwealth of the city or county may file a petition on his own 21 22 motion with the clerk, (ii) designated nonattorney employees of the Department of Social Services may 23 complete, sign and file petitions and motions relating to the establishment, modification, or enforcement 24 of support on forms approved by the Supreme Court of Virginia with the clerk, and (iii) any attorney 25 may file petitions on behalf of his client with the clerk except petitions alleging that the subject of the petition is a child alleged to be in need of services, in need of supervision or delinquent. Complaints 26 27 alleging abuse or neglect of a child shall be referred initially to the local department of social services 28 in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 15 (§ 63.2-1500 et seq.) of Title 63.2. Motions and other 29 subsequent pleadings in a case shall be filed directly with the clerk. The intake officer or clerk with whom the petition or motion is filed shall inquire whether the petitioner is receiving child support 30 31 services or public assistance. No individual who is receiving support services or public assistance shall be denied the right to file a petition or motion to establish, modify or enforce an order for support of a 32 33 child. If the petitioner is seeking or receiving child support services or public assistance, the clerk, upon 34 issuance of process, shall forward a copy of the petition or motion, together with notice of the court 35 date, to the Division of Child Support Enforcement. 36 B. The appearance of a child before an intake officer may be by (i) personal appearance before the 37 intake officer or (ii) use of two-way electronic video and audio communication. If two-way electronic 38 video and audio communication is used, an intake officer may exercise all powers conferred by law. All 39 communications and proceedings shall be conducted in the same manner as if the appearance were in 40 person, and any documents filed may be transmitted by facsimile process. The facsimile may be served 41 or executed by the officer or person to whom sent, and returned in the same manner, and with the same force, effect, authority, and liability as an original document. All signatures thereon shall be treated as 42 original signatures. Any two-way electronic video and audio communication system used for an 43 appearance shall meet the standards as set forth in subsection B of § 19.2-3.1. 44 45 When the court service unit of any court receives a complaint alleging facts which may be sufficient to invoke the jurisdiction of the court pursuant to § 16.1-241, the unit, through an intake officer, may 46 47 proceed informally to make such adjustment as is practicable without the filing of a petition or may authorize a petition to be filed by any complainant having sufficient knowledge of the matter to 48 49 establish probable cause for the issuance of the petition. 50 An intake officer may proceed informally on a complaint alleging a child is in need of services, in 51 need of supervision or delinquent only if the juvenile (i) is not alleged to have committed a violent 52 juvenile felony or (ii) has not previously been proceeded against informally or adjudicated delinquent for 53 an offense that would be a felony if committed by an adult. A petition alleging that a juvenile committed a violent juvenile felony shall be filed with the court. A petition alleging that a juvenile is 54 55 delinquent for an offense that would be a felony if committed by an adult shall be filed with the court if the juvenile had previously been proceeded against informally by intake or had been adjudicated 56 delinquent for an offense that would be a felony if committed by an adult. 57 58 If a juvenile is alleged to be a truant pursuant to a complaint filed in accordance with § 22.1-258 and

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59 the attendance officer has provided documentation to the intake officer that the relevant school division 60 has complied with the provisions of § 22.1-258, then the intake officer shall file a petition with the court. The intake officer may defer filing the complaint for 90 days and proceed informally by 61 62 developing a truancy plan. The intake officer may proceed informally only if the juvenile has not 63 previously been proceeded against informally or adjudicated in need of supervision for failure to comply 64 with compulsory school attendance as provided in § 22.1-254. The juvenile and his parent or parents, 65 guardian or other person standing in loco parentis must agree, in writing, for the development of a truancy plan. The truancy plan may include requirements that the juvenile and his parent or parents, 66 guardian or other person standing in loco parentis participate in such programs, cooperate in such 67 treatment or be subject to such conditions and limitations as necessary to ensure the juvenile's 68 compliance with compulsory school attendance as provided in § 22.1-254. The intake officer may refer 69 the juvenile to the appropriate public agency for the purpose of developing a truancy plan using an interagency interdisciplinary team approach. The team may include qualified personnel who are 70 71 reasonably available from the appropriate department of social services, community services board, local 72 73 school division, court service unit and other appropriate and available public and private agencies and 74 may be the family assessment and planning team established pursuant to § 2.2-5207. If at the end of the 75 90-day period the juvenile has not successfully completed the truancy plan or the truancy program, then 76 the intake officer shall file the petition.

77 Whenever informal action is taken as provided in this subsection on a complaint alleging that a child 78 is in need of services, in need of supervision or delinquent, the intake officer shall (i) develop a plan for 79 the juvenile, which may include restitution and the performance of community service, based upon community resources and the circumstances which resulted in the complaint, (ii) create an official record 80 81 of the action taken by the intake officer and file such record in the juvenile's case file, and (iii) advise the juvenile and the juvenile's parent, guardian or other person standing in loco parentis and the 82 83 complainant that any subsequent complaint alleging that the child is in need of supervision or delinquent based upon facts which may be sufficient to invoke the jurisdiction of the court pursuant to § 16.1-241 84 85 will result in the filing of a petition with the court.

86 C. The intake officer shall accept and file a petition in which it is alleged that (i) the custody, 87 visitation or support of a child is the subject of controversy or requires determination, (ii) a person has 88 deserted, abandoned or failed to provide support for any person in violation of law, (iii) a child or such 89 child's parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis is entitled to treatment, 90 rehabilitation or other services which are required by law, (iv) family abuse has occurred and a 91 protective order is being sought pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1, or (v) an act of 92 violence, force, or threat has occurred, a protective order is being sought pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 93 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10, and either the alleged victim or the respondent is a juvenile. If any such 94 complainant does not file a petition, the intake officer may file it. In cases in which a child is alleged to 95 be abused, neglected, in need of services, in need of supervision or delinquent, if the intake officer 96 believes that probable cause does not exist, or that the authorization of a petition will not be in the best 97 interest of the family or juvenile or that the matter may be effectively dealt with by some agency other 98 than the court, he may refuse to authorize the filing of a petition. The intake officer shall provide to a 99 person seeking a protective order pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1 a written explanation of the conditions, procedures and time limits applicable to the issuance of protective orders 100 101 pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1. If the person is seeking a protective order pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10, the intake officer shall provide a written explanation of the 102 103 conditions, procedures, and time limits applicable to the issuance of protective orders pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10. 104

105 D. Prior to the filing of any petition alleging that a child is in need of supervision, the matter shall 106 be reviewed by an intake officer who shall determine whether the petitioner and the child alleged to be 107 in need of supervision have utilized or attempted to utilize treatment and services available in the community and have exhausted all appropriate nonjudicial remedies which are available to them. When 108 109 the intake officer determines that the parties have not attempted to utilize available treatment or services 110 or have not exhausted all appropriate nonjudicial remedies which are available, he shall refer the 111 petitioner and the child alleged to be in need of supervision to the appropriate agency, treatment facility 112 or individual to receive treatment or services, and a petition shall not be filed. Only after the intake 113 officer determines that the parties have made a reasonable effort to utilize available community 114 treatment or services may he permit the petition to be filed.

E. If the intake officer refuses to authorize a petition relating to an offense that if committed by an adult would be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor or as a felony, the complainant shall be notified in writing at that time of the complainant's right to apply to a magistrate for a warrant. If a magistrate determines that probable cause exists, he shall issue a warrant returnable to the juvenile and domestic relations district court. The warrant shall be delivered forthwith to the juvenile court, and the intake officer shall accept and file a petition founded upon the warrant. If the court is closed and the magistrate

121 finds that the criteria for detention or shelter care set forth in § 16.1-248.1 have been satisfied, the 122 juvenile may be detained pursuant to the warrant issued in accordance with this subsection. If the intake 123 officer refuses to authorize a petition relating to a child in need of services or in need of supervision, a 124 status offense, or a misdemeanor other than Class 1, his decision is final.

125 Upon delivery to the juvenile court of a warrant issued pursuant to subdivision 2 of § 16.1-256, the 126 intake officer shall accept and file a petition founded upon the warrant.

127 F. The intake officer shall notify the attorney for the Commonwealth of the filing of any petition 128 which alleges facts of an offense which would be a felony if committed by an adult.

129 G. Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 12 (§ 16.1-299 et seq.), the intake officer shall file a 130 report with the division superintendent of the school division in which any student who is the subject of 131 a petition alleging that such student who is a juvenile has committed an act, wherever committed, which 132 would be a crime if committed by an adult, or that such student who is an adult has committed a crime and is alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the court. The report shall notify the division 133 134 superintendent of the filing of the petition and the nature of the offense, if the violation involves:

135 1. A firearm offense pursuant to Article 4 (§ 18.2-279 et seq.), 5 (§ 18.2-288 et seq.), 6 (§ 18.2-299 136 et seq.), 6.1 (§ 18.2-307.1 et seq.), or 7 (§ 18.2-308.1 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2;

137 2. Homicide, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-30 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2;

138 3. Felonious assault and bodily wounding, pursuant to Article 4 (§ 18.2-51 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of 139 Title 18.2;

140 4. Criminal sexual assault, pursuant to Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2;

141 5. Manufacture, sale, gift, distribution or possession of Schedule I or II controlled substances, 142 pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2;

143 6. Manufacture, sale or distribution of marijuana pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 144 7 of Title 18.2;

7. Arson and related crimes, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-77 et seq.) of Chapter 5 of Title 18.2;

146 8. Burglary and related offenses, pursuant to §§ 18.2-89 through 18.2-93;

9. Robbery pursuant to § 18.2-58; 147

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148 10. Prohibited criminal street gang activity pursuant to § 18.2-46.2;

149 11. Recruitment of other juveniles for a criminal street gang activity pursuant to § 18.2-46.3; or

150 12. An act of violence by a mob pursuant to § 18.2-42.1.

151 The failure to provide information regarding the school in which the student who is the subject of 152 the petition may be enrolled shall not be grounds for refusing to file a petition.

153 The information provided to a division superintendent pursuant to this section may be disclosed only 154 as provided in § 16.1-305.2. 155

H. The filing of a petition shall not be necessary:

156 1. In the case of violations of the traffic laws, including offenses involving bicycles, hitchhiking and 157 other pedestrian offenses, game and fish laws or a violation of the ordinance of any city regulating 158 surfing or any ordinance establishing curfew violations, animal control violations or littering violations. 159 In such cases the court may proceed on a summons issued by the officer investigating the violation in 160 the same manner as provided by law for adults. Additionally, an officer investigating a motor vehicle 161 accident may, at the scene of the accident or at any other location where a juvenile who is involved in 162 such an accident may be located, proceed on a summons in lieu of filing a petition.

163 2. In the case of seeking consent to apply for the issuance of a work permit pursuant to subsection H 164 of § 16.1-241.

165 3. In the case of a misdemeanor violation of  $\frac{18.2-250.1}{18.2-260.1}$ , 18.2-266, 18.2-266.1, or 29.1-738, or the 166 commission of any other alcohol-related offense, or a violation of § 18.2-250.1, provided the juvenile is 167 released to the custody of a parent or legal guardian pending the initial court date. The officer releasing a juvenile to the custody of a parent or legal guardian shall issue a summons to the juvenile and shall 168 also issue a summons requiring the parent or legal guardian to appear before the court with the juvenile. 169 170 Disposition of the charge shall be in the manner provided in § 16.1-278.8, 16.1-278.8:01, or 16.1-278.9. If the juvenile so charged with a violation of § 18.2-51.4, 18.2-266, 18.2-266.1, 18.2-272, or 29.1-738 171 172 refuses to provide a sample of blood or breath or samples of both blood and breath for chemical analysis pursuant to §§ 18.2-268.1 through 18.2-268.12 or 29.1-738.2, the provisions of these sections 173 174 shall be followed except that the magistrate shall authorize execution of the warrant as a summons. The 175 summons shall be served on a parent or legal guardian and the juvenile, and a copy of the summons 176 shall be forwarded to the court in which the violation is to be tried. When a violation of § 18.2-250.1 is 177 charged by summons, the juvenile shall be entitled to have the charge referred to intake for 178 consideration of informal proceedings pursuant to subsection B, provided such right is exercised by 179 written notification to the clerk not later than 10 days prior to trial. At the time such summons alleging 180 a violation of § 18.2-250.1 is served, the officer shall also serve upon the juvenile written notice of the 181 right to have the charge referred to intake on a form approved by the Supreme Court and make return

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182 of such service to the court. If the officer fails to make such service or return, the court shall dismiss 183 the summons without prejudice.

184 4. In the case of offenses which, if committed by an adult, would be punishable as a Class 3 or 185 Class 4 misdemeanor. In such cases the court may direct that an intake officer proceed as provided in 186 § 16.1-237 on a summons issued by the officer investigating the violation in the same manner as 187 provided by law for adults provided that notice of the summons to appear is mailed by the investigating 188 officer within five days of the issuance of the summons to a parent or legal guardian of the juvenile.

189 I. Failure to comply with the procedures set forth in this section shall not divest the juvenile court of 190 the jurisdiction granted it in § 16.1-241.

#### 191 § 18.2-248.1. Penalties for sale, gift, distribution, or possession with intent to sell, give, or 192 distribute marijuana.

A. Except as authorized in the Drug Control Act, Chapter 34 of Title 54.1 (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.), it 193 194 shall be is unlawful for any person to sell, give, distribute, or possess with intent to sell, give, or 195 distribute marijuana.

(a) B. Any person who violates this section with respect to:

(1) 1. Not more than one-half one ounce of marijuana is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor;

198 (2) 2. More than one half one ounce but not more than five pounds one pound of marijuana is guilty 199 of a Class 56 felony;

200 (3) 3. More than five pounds one pound of marijuana but not more than five pounds is guilty of a 201 Class 5 felony punishable by imprisonment of not less than five nor more than 30 years. 202

4. More than five pounds is guilty of a Class 4 felony.

If such person proves that he gave, distributed, or possessed with intent to give or distribute 203 marijuana only as an accommodation to another individual and not with intent to profit thereby from 204 205 any consideration received or expected nor to induce the recipient or intended recipient of the marijuana 206 to use or become addicted to or dependent upon such marijuana, he shall be is guilty of a Class 1 207 misdemeanor.

208 (b) C. Any person who gives, distributes, or possesses marijuana as an accommodation and not with 209 intent to profit thereby, to an inmate of a state or local correctional facility as defined in § 53.1-1, or in 210 the custody of an employee thereof shall be is guilty of a Class 4 felony.

211 (c) D. Any person who manufactures marijuana, or possesses marijuana with the intent to 212 manufacture such substance, not for his own use is guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment of not 213 less than five nor more than 30 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000 Class 5 felony.

214 There shall be a rebuttable presumption that a person who possesses no more than one ounce of 215 marijuana possesses it for personal use.

216 (d) E. When a person is convicted of a third or subsequent felony offense under this section and it is 217 alleged in the warrant, indictment, or information that he has been before convicted of two or more 218 felony offenses under this section or of substantially similar offenses in any other jurisdiction which 219 offenses would be felonies if committed in the Commonwealth and such prior convictions occurred 220 before the date of the offense alleged in the warrant, indictment, or information, he shall be sentenced to 221 imprisonment for life or for any period not less than five years, five years of which shall be a 222 mandatory minimum term of imprisonment to be served consecutively with any other sentence and he 223 shall be fined not more than \$500,000. 224

#### § 18.2-250.1. Possession of marijuana unlawful; civil penalty.

225 A. It is unlawful for any person knowingly or intentionally to possess marijuana unless the substance 226 was obtained directly from, or pursuant to, a valid prescription or order of a practitioner while acting in 227 the course of his professional practice, or except as otherwise authorized by the Drug Control Act 228 (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.). The attorney for the Commonwealth or the county, city, or town attorney may 229 prosecute such a case. Any violation of this section may be charged by summons.

230 Upon the prosecution of a person for violation of this section, ownership or occupancy of the 231 premises or vehicle upon or in which marijuana was found shall not create a presumption that such 232 person either knowingly or intentionally possessed such marijuana.

233 Any person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be confined in jail not 234 more than 30 days and fined not more than \$500, either or both; any person, upon a second or 235 subsequent conviction of a violation of this section, is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor subject to a civil 236 penalty of no more than \$100, upon a second violation is subject to a civil penalty of no more than 237 \$250, and upon a third or subsequent violation is subject to a civil penalty of no more than \$500. Such 238 civil penalties are payable to the Literary Fund.

239 B. The provisions of this section shall not apply to members of state, federal, county, city, or town 240 law-enforcement agencies, jail officers, or correctional officers, as defined in § 53.1-1, certified as 241 handlers of dogs trained in the detection of controlled substances when possession of marijuana is necessary for the performance of their duties. 242

243 C. In any prosecution under this section involving marijuana in the form of cannabidiol oil or

THC-A oil as those terms are defined in § 54.1-3408.3, it shall be an affirmative defense that the 244 245 individual possessed such oil pursuant to a valid written certification issued by a practitioner in the 246 course of his professional practice pursuant to § 54.1-3408.3 for treatment or to alleviate the symptoms 247 of (i) the individual's intractable epilepsy or (ii) if such individual is the parent or legal guardian of a 248 minor, such minor's intractable epilepsy. If the individual files the valid written certification with the 249 court at least 10 days prior to trial and causes a copy of such written certification to be delivered to the 250 attorney for the Commonwealth or the county, city, or town attorney prosecuting the case, such written 251 certification shall be prima facie evidence that such oil was possessed pursuant to a valid written 252 certification.

# § 18.2-251. Persons charged with first offense may be placed on probation; conditions; substance abuse screening, assessment treatment and education programs or services; drug tests; costs and fees; violations; discharge.

256 Whenever any person who has not previously been convicted of any *criminal* offense under this 257 article or under any statute of the United States or of any state relating to narcotic drugs, marijuana, or 258 stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic drugs, or has not previously had a proceeding against him for violation of such an offense dismissed as provided in this section, pleads guilty to or enters a plea of 259 260 not guilty to possession of a controlled substance under § 18.2-250 or to possession of marijuana under 261 <u>§ 18.2-250.1</u>, the court, upon such plea if the facts found by the court would justify a finding of guilt, 262 without entering a judgment of guilt and with the consent of the accused, may defer further proceedings 263 and place him on probation upon terms and conditions.

264 As a term or condition, the court shall require the accused to undergo a substance abuse assessment 265 pursuant to § 18.2-251.01 or 19.2-299.2, as appropriate, and enter treatment and/or education program or 266 services, if available, such as, in the opinion of the court, may be best suited to the needs of the accused 267 based upon consideration of the substance abuse assessment. The program or services may be located in 268 the judicial district in which the charge is brought or in any other judicial district as the court may 269 provide. The services shall be provided by (i) a program licensed by the Department of Behavioral 270 Health and Developmental Services, by a similar program which is made available through the 271 Department of Corrections, (ii) a local community-based probation services agency established pursuant 272 to  $\S$  9.1-174, or (iii) an ASAP program certified by the Commission on VASAP.

The court shall require the person entering such program under the provisions of this section to pay
all or part of the costs of the program, including the costs of the screening, assessment, testing, and
treatment, based upon the accused's ability to pay unless the person is determined by the court to be
indigent.

As a condition of probation, the court shall require the accused (i) to successfully complete treatment or education program or services, (ii) to remain drug and alcohol free during the period of probation and submit to such tests during that period as may be necessary and appropriate to determine if the accused is drug and alcohol free, (iii) to make reasonable efforts to secure and maintain employment, and (iv) to comply with a plan of at least 100 hours of community service for a felony and up to 24 hours of community service for a misdemeanor. Such testing shall be conducted by personnel of the supervising probation agency or personnel of any program or agency approved by the supervising probation agency.

**284** The court shall, unless done at arrest, order the accused to report to the original arresting **285** law-enforcement agency to submit to fingerprinting.

286 Upon violation of a term or condition, the court may enter an adjudication of guilt and proceed as 287 otherwise provided. Upon fulfillment of the terms and conditions, the court shall discharge the person 288 and dismiss the proceedings against him. Discharge and dismissal under this section shall be without 289 adjudication of guilt and is a conviction only for the purposes of applying this section in subsequent 290 proceedings.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, whenever a court places an individual on probation upon terms and conditions pursuant to this section, such action shall be treated as a conviction for purposes of §§ 18.2-259.1, 22.1-315, and 46.2-390.1, and the driver's license forfeiture provisions of those sections shall be imposed. The provisions of this paragraph shall not be applicable to any offense for which a juvenile has had his license suspended or denied pursuant to § 16.1-278.9 for the same offense.

# \$ 18.2-252. Suspended sentence conditioned upon substance abuse screening, assessment, testing, and treatment or education.

The trial judge or court trying the case of (*i*) any person found guilty of violating a criminal violation of any law concerning the use, in any manner, of drugs, controlled substances, narcotics, marijuana, noxious chemical substances and like substances, or (*ii*) any minor penalized for a violation of § 18.2-250.1 shall condition any suspended sentence or suspension of any civil penalty by first requiring such person to agree to undergo a substance abuse screening pursuant to § 18.2-251.01 and to submit to such periodic substance abuse testing, to include alcohol testing, as may be directed by the 317

305 court. Such testing shall be conducted by the supervising probation agency or by personnel of any 306 program or agency approved by the supervising probation agency. The cost of such testing ordered by 307 the court shall be paid by the Commonwealth and taxed as a part of the costs of such eriminal 308 proceedings. The judge or court shall order the person, as a condition of any suspended sentence or 309 suspended civil penalty, to undergo such treatment or education for substance abuse, if available, as the 310 judge or court deems appropriate based upon consideration of the substance abuse assessment. The 311 treatment or education shall be provided by a program or agency licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, by a similar program or services available through the 312 313 Department of Corrections if the court imposes a sentence of one year or more or, if the court imposes 314 a sentence of 12 months or less, by a similar program or services available through a local or regional jail, a local community-based probation services agency established pursuant to § 9.1-174, or an ASAP 315 program certified by the Commission on VASAP. 316

### § 18.2-259.1. Forfeiture of driver's license for violations of article.

318 A. In addition to any other sanction or penalty imposed for a *criminal* violation of this article or for 319 a civil violation of § 18.2-250.1 committed by a juvenile, the (i) judgment of either a conviction under this article or a civil violation of § 18.2-250.1 by a juvenile or (ii) placement on probation following 320 321 deferral of further proceedings under § 18.2-251 or subsection H of § 18.2-258.1 for any such offense 322 shall of itself operate to deprive the person so convicted or placed on probation after deferral of 323 proceedings under § 18.2-251 or subsection H of § 18.2-258.1 of the privilege to drive or operate a 324 motor vehicle, engine, or train in the Commonwealth for a period of six months from the date of such 325 judgment or placement on probation. Such license forfeiture shall be in addition to and shall run 326 consecutively with any other license suspension, revocation, or forfeiture in effect or imposed upon the 327 person so convicted or placed on probation. However, a juvenile who has had his license suspended or denied pursuant to § 16.1-278.9 shall not have his license forfeited pursuant to this section for the same 328 329 offense.

330 B. The court trying the case shall order any person so convicted or placed on probation or any juvenile so penalized for a civil violation of § 18.2-250.1 to surrender his driver's license to be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of § 46.2-398 and shall notify the Department of Motor Vehicles of 331 332 333 any such conviction *or judgment* entered and of the license forfeiture to be imposed.

334 C. In those cases where the court determines there are compelling circumstances warranting an 335 exception, the court may provide that any individual be issued a restricted license to operate a motor 336 vehicle for any of the purposes set forth in subsection E of § 18.2-271.1. No restricted license issued 337 pursuant to this subsection shall permit any person to operate a commercial motor vehicle as defined in 338 the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.). The court shall order the surrender 339 of such person's license in accordance with the provisions of subsection B and shall forward to the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles a copy of its order entered pursuant to this 340 341 subsection. This order shall specifically enumerate the restrictions imposed and contain such information 342 regarding the person to whom such a permit is issued as is reasonably necessary to identify such person. 343 The court shall also provide a copy of its order to such person who may operate a motor vehicle on the 344 order until receipt from the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles of a restricted license, but only if the order provides for a restricted license for that period. A copy of the order and, after 345 receipt thereof, the restricted license shall be carried at all times by such person while operating a motor 346 347 vehicle. The court may require a person issued a restricted permit under the provisions of this subsection 348 to be monitored by an alcohol safety action program during the period of license suspension. Any 349 violation of the terms of the restricted license or of any condition set forth by the court related thereto, 350 or any failure to remain drug-free during such period shall be reported forthwith to the court by such program. Any person who operates a motor vehicle in violation of any restriction imposed pursuant to 351 352 this section shall be is guilty of a violation of § 46.2-301.

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#### § 18.2-287.2. Wearing of body armor while committing a crime; penalty.

Any person who, while committing a crime of violence as defined in § 18.2-288 (2) or a felony 354 355 violation of § 18.2-248 or subdivision (a) B 2 or, 3, or 4 of § 18.2-248.1, has in his possession a firearm 356 or knife and is wearing body armor designed to diminish the effect of the impact of a bullet or 357 projectile shall be is guilty of a Class 4 felony. 358

#### § 18.2-308.1:5. Purchase or transportation of firearms prohibited for certain drug offenders.

359 Any person who, within a 36-consecutive-month period, has been convicted of two misdemeanor offenses under subsection B of former § 18.2-248.1:1, or § 18.2-250 or 18.2-250.1 shall be ineligible to 360 purchase or transport a handgun. A civil violation under § 18.2-250.1 shall be considered a conviction 361 for purposes of this section. However, upon expiration of a period of five years from the date of the 362 second conviction or civil violation and provided the person has not been convicted of or the subject of 363 a civil penalty for any such offense within that period, the ineligibility shall be removed. 364

#### 365 § 18.2-308.09. Disqualifications for a concealed handgun permit.

366 The following persons shall be deemed disqualified from obtaining a permit: 367 1. An individual who is ineligible to possess a firearm pursuant to § 18.2-308.1:1, 18.2-308.1:2, or 368 18.2-308.1:3 or the substantially similar law of any other state or of the United States.

369 2. An individual who was ineligible to possess a firearm pursuant to § 18.2-308.1:1 and who was 370 discharged from the custody of the Commissioner pursuant to § 19.2-182.7 less than five years before 371 the date of his application for a concealed handgun permit.

372 3. An individual who was ineligible to possess a firearm pursuant to § 18.2-308.1:2 and whose 373 competency or capacity was restored pursuant to § 64.2-2012 less than five years before the date of his 374 application for a concealed handgun permit.

375 4. An individual who was ineligible to possess a firearm under § 18.2-308.1:3 and who was released 376 from commitment less than five years before the date of this application for a concealed handgun 377 permit.

378 5. An individual who is subject to a restraining order, or to a protective order and prohibited by 379 § 18.2-308.1:4 from purchasing or transporting a firearm.

380 6. An individual who is prohibited by § 18.2-308.2 from possessing or transporting a firearm, except 381 that a permit may be obtained in accordance with subsection C of that section.

382 7. An individual who has been convicted of two or more misdemeanors within the five-year period 383 immediately preceding the application, if one of the misdemeanors was a Class 1 misdemeanor, but the 384 judge shall have the discretion to deny a permit for two or more misdemeanors that are not Class 1. 385 Traffic infractions and misdemeanors set forth in Title 46.2 shall not be considered for purposes of this 386 disqualification.

387 8. An individual who is addicted to, or is an unlawful user or distributor of, marijuana, synthetic 388 cannabinoids, or any controlled substance.

389 9. An individual who has been convicted of a violation of § 18.2-266 or a substantially similar local 390 ordinance, or of public drunkenness, or of a substantially similar offense under the laws of any other 391 state, the District of Columbia, the United States, or its territories within the three-year period 392 immediately preceding the application, or who is a habitual drunkard as determined pursuant to 393 § 4.1-333.

394 10. An alien other than an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence in the United States.

395 11. An individual who has been discharged from the armed forces of the United States under 396 dishonorable conditions. 397

12. An individual who is a fugitive from justice.

398 13. An individual who the court finds, by a preponderance of the evidence, based on specific acts by 399 the applicant, is likely to use a weapon unlawfully or negligently to endanger others. The sheriff, chief 400 of police, or attorney for the Commonwealth may submit to the court a sworn, written statement 401 indicating that, in the opinion of such sheriff, chief of police, or attorney for the Commonwealth, based 402 upon a disqualifying conviction or upon the specific acts set forth in the statement, the applicant is likely to use a weapon unlawfully or negligently to endanger others. The statement of the sheriff, chief 403 **404** of police, or the attorney for the Commonwealth shall be based upon personal knowledge of such 405 individual or of a deputy sheriff, police officer, or assistant attorney for the Commonwealth of the 406 specific acts, or upon a written statement made under oath before a notary public of a competent person 407 having personal knowledge of the specific acts.

408 14. An individual who has been convicted of any assault, assault and battery, sexual battery, 409 discharging of a firearm in violation of § 18.2-280 or 18.2-286.1 or brandishing of a firearm in 410 violation of § 18.2-282 within the three-year period immediately preceding the application.

411 15. An individual who has been convicted of stalking.

412 16. An individual whose previous convictions or adjudications of delinquency were based on an 413 offense that would have been at the time of conviction a felony if committed by an adult under the laws of any state, the District of Columbia, the United States or its territories. For purposes of this 414 415 disqualifier, only convictions occurring within 16 years following the later of the date of (i) the 416 conviction or adjudication or (ii) release from any incarceration imposed upon such conviction or 417 adjudication shall be deemed to be "previous convictions."

418 17. An individual who has a felony charge pending or a charge pending for an offense listed in 419 subdivision 14 or 15.

420 18. An individual who has received mental health treatment or substance abuse treatment in a 421 residential setting within five years prior to the date of his application for a concealed handgun permit.

422 19. An individual not otherwise ineligible pursuant to this article, who, within the three-year period 423 immediately preceding the application for the permit, was found guilty of any criminal offense set forth 424 in Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) or former § 18.2-248.1:1 or of a criminal offense of illegal possession 425 or distribution of marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, or any controlled substance, under the laws of any state, the District of Columbia, or the United States or its territories. 426

427 20. An individual, not otherwise ineligible pursuant to this article, with respect to whom, within the HB997

428 three-year period immediately preceding the application, upon a charge of any criminal offense set forth 429 in Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) or former § 18.2-248.1:1 or upon a charge of illegal possession or 430 distribution of marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, or any controlled substance under the laws of any 431 state, the District of Columbia, or the United States or its territories, the trial court found that the facts 432 of the case were sufficient for a finding of guilt and disposed of the case pursuant to § 18.2-251 or the 433 substantially similar law of any other state, the District of Columbia, or the United States or its 434 territories or who was subject to a civil penalty for a violation of § 18.2-250.1. 435

#### § 18.2-460. Obstructing justice; penalty.

436 A. If any person without just cause knowingly obstructs a judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney 437 for the Commonwealth, witness, any law-enforcement officer, or animal control officer employed 438 pursuant to § 3.2-6555 in the performance of his duties as such or fails or refuses without just cause to 439 cease such obstruction when requested to do so by such judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the 440 Commonwealth, witness, law-enforcement officer, or animal control officer employed pursuant to § 441 3.2-6555, he shall be is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

442 B. Except as provided in subsection C, any person who, by threats or force, knowingly attempts to 443 intimidate or impede a judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, any 444 law-enforcement officer, or an animal control officer employed pursuant to § 3.2-6555 lawfully engaged 445 in his duties as such, or to obstruct or impede the administration of justice in any court, is guilty of a 446 Class 1 misdemeanor.

447 C. If any person by threats of bodily harm or force knowingly attempts to intimidate or impede a 448 judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, any law-enforcement officer, 449 lawfully engaged in the discharge of his duty, or to obstruct or impede the administration of justice in any court relating to a violation of or conspiracy to violate § 18.2-248 or subdivision (a) (3), B 4 or 450 subsection (b) or (c) C or D of § 18.2-248.1, or § 18.2-46.2 or § 18.2-46.3, or relating to the violation 451 452 of or conspiracy to violate any violent felony offense listed in subsection C of § 17.1-805, he shall be is 453 guilty of a Class 5 felony.

454 D. Any person who knowingly and willfully makes any materially false statement or representation 455 to a law-enforcement officer or an animal control officer employed pursuant to § 3.2-6555 who is in the 456 course of conducting an investigation of a crime by another is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

#### 457 § 19.2-386.22. Seizure of property used in connection with or derived from illegal drug 458 transactions.

459 A. The following property shall be subject to lawful seizure by any officer charged with enforcing the provisions of Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2: (i) all money, medical 460 461 equipment, office equipment, laboratory equipment, motor vehicles, and all other personal and real property of any kind or character, used in substantial connection with (a) the illegal manufacture, sale or 462 463 distribution of controlled substances or possession with intent to sell or distribute controlled substances 464 in violation of § 18.2-248, (b) the sale or distribution of marijuana or possession with intent to distribute 465 more than one pound of marijuana in violation of subdivisions (a)(2), (a)(3) and (c) of § 18.2-248.1, or (c) a drug-related offense in violation of § 18.2-474.1; (ii) everything of value furnished, or intended to 466 be furnished, in exchange for a controlled substance in violation of § 18.2-248 or for marijuana in 467 468 violation of § 18.2-248.1 or for a controlled substance or marijuana in violation of § 18.2-474.1; and (iii) 469 all moneys or other property, real or personal, traceable to such an exchange, together with any interest 470 or profits derived from the investment of such money or other property. Under the provisions of clause 471 (i), real property shall not be subject to lawful seizure unless the minimum prescribed punishment for 472 the violation is a term of not less than five years.

473 B. All seizures and forfeitures under this section shall be governed by the procedures contained in 474 Chapter 22.1 (§ 19.2-386.1 et seq.). 475

## § 46.2-390.1. Required revocation for drug offenses or deferral of proceedings.

476 A. Except as otherwise ordered pursuant to § 18.2-259.1, the Commissioner shall forthwith revoke, 477 and not thereafter reissue for six months from the later of (i) the date of conviction, date of judgment 478 for a violation of § 18.2-250.1 by a juvenile, or deferral of proceedings under § 18.2-251 or (ii) the next 479 date of eligibility to be licensed, the driver's license, registration card, and license plates of any resident 480 or nonresident on receiving notification of (i) (a) his conviction, (ii) or a judgment for a violation of 481 § 18.2-250.1 by a minor, (b) his having been found guilty in the case of a juvenile, or (iii) (c) the 482 deferral of further proceedings against him under § 18.2-251 for any violation of any provisions of 483 Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2, or of any state or federal law or valid county, 484 city, or town ordinance, or a law of any other state substantially similar to provisions of such Virginia 485 laws. Such license revocation shall be in addition to and shall run consecutively with any other license 486 suspension, revocation, or forfeiture in effect against such person.

B. Any person whose license has been revoked pursuant to this section and § 18.2-259.1 shall be 487 488 subject to the provisions of §§ 46.2-370 and 46.2-414 and shall be required to pay a reinstatement fee as 489 provided in § 46.2-411 in order to have his license restored.
