WHEREAS, Wilford Taylor later served as head chef of Vic Zodda's Restaurant, earning accolades for his delicious, authentic Italian cuisine; after his well-earned retirement, he continued to serve the community as a volunteer in the Hampton Visitor Center; and

WHEREAS, believing strongly in the importance of a good education, Wilford Taylor worked hard to put his children through college and helped his wife achieve a college degree; and

WHEREAS, a man of deep and abiding faith, Wilford Taylor enjoyed fellowship and worship with the community as a member of First Baptist Church of Hampton; and

WHEREAS, Wilford Taylor will be fondly remembered and greatly missed by his wife of nearly 67 years, Zenobia; children, Wilford, Jr., James, Jill, and Michelle, and their families; and numerous other family members and friends; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly hereby note with great sadness the loss of Wilford Taylor, Sr., an admired member of the Hampton community; and, be it
