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## VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact §§ 54.1-2901 and 54.1-2927 of the Code of Virginia, relating to 3 practitioners of the healing arts; temporary authorization to practice.

Approved

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 6

7 1. That §§ 54.1-2901 and 54.1-2927 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 8 § 54.1-2901. Exceptions and exemptions generally. 9

A. The provisions of this chapter shall not prevent or prohibit:

1. Any person entitled to practice his profession under any prior law on June 24, 1944, from continuing such practice within the scope of the definition of his particular school of practice; 10 11

12 2. Any person licensed to practice naturopathy prior to June 30, 1980, from continuing such practice in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Board; 13

3. Any licensed nurse practitioner from rendering care in collaboration and consultation with a 14 15 patient care team physician as part of a patient care team pursuant to § 54.1-2957 when such services are authorized by regulations promulgated jointly by the Board of Medicine and the Board of Nursing; 16

17 4. Any registered professional nurse, licensed nurse practitioner, graduate laboratory technician or other technical personnel who have been properly trained from rendering care or services within the 18 19 scope of their usual professional activities which shall include the taking of blood, the giving of 20 intravenous infusions and intravenous injections, and the insertion of tubes when performed under the 21 orders of a person licensed to practice medicine or osteopathy, a nurse practitioner, or a physician 22 assistant:

23 5. Any dentist, pharmacist or optometrist from rendering care or services within the scope of his 24 usual professional activities;

25 6. Any practitioner licensed or certified by the Board from delegating to personnel supervised by 26 him, such activities or functions as are nondiscretionary and do not require the exercise of professional 27 judgment for their performance and which are usually or customarily delegated to such persons by practitioners of the healing arts, if such activities or functions are authorized by and performed for such 28 29 practitioners of the healing arts and responsibility for such activities or functions is assumed by such 30 practitioners of the healing arts;

31 7. The rendering of medical advice or information through telecommunications from a physician 32 licensed to practice medicine in Virginia or an adjoining state, or from a licensed nurse practitioner, to 33 emergency medical personnel acting in an emergency situation; 34

8. The domestic administration of family remedies;

35 9. The giving or use of massages, steam baths, dry heat rooms, infrared heat or ultraviolet lamps in 36 public or private health clubs and spas;

37 10. The manufacture or sale of proprietary medicines in this Commonwealth by licensed pharmacists 38 or druggists; 39

11. The advertising or sale of commercial appliances or remedies;

40 12. The fitting by nonitinerant persons or manufacturers of artificial eyes, limbs or other apparatus or 41 appliances or the fitting of plaster cast counterparts of deformed portions of the body by a nonitinerant 42 bracemaker or prosthetist for the purpose of having a three-dimensional record of the deformity, when 43 such bracemaker or prosthetist has received a prescription from a licensed physician, licensed nurse 44 practitioner, or licensed physician assistant directing the fitting of such casts and such activities are 45 conducted in conformity with the laws of Virginia;

13. Any person from the rendering of first aid or medical assistance in an emergency in the absence 46 47 of a person licensed to practice medicine or osteopathy under the provisions of this chapter;

14. The practice of the religious tenets of any church in the ministration to the sick and suffering by 48 49 mental or spiritual means without the use of any drug or material remedy, whether gratuitously or for 50 compensation;

15. Any legally qualified out-of-state or foreign practitioner from meeting in consultation with legally 51 52 licensed practitioners in this Commonwealth;

53 16. Any practitioner of the healing arts licensed or certified and in good standing with the applicable 54 regulatory agency in another state or Canada when that practitioner of the healing arts is in Virginia 55 temporarily and such practitioner has been issued a temporary license or certification authorization by 56 the Board from practicing medicine or the duties of the profession for which he is licensed or certified 57 (i) in a summer camp or in conjunction with patients who are participating in recreational activities, (ii) 58 while participating in continuing educational programs prescribed by the Board, or (iii) by rendering at 59 any site any health care services within the limits of his license, voluntarily and without compensation, 60 to any patient of any clinic which is organized in whole or in part for the delivery of health care 61 services without charge as provided in § 54.1-106;

62 17. The performance of the duties of any active duty health care provider in active service in the 63 army, navy, coast guard, marine corps, air force, or public health service of the United States at any 64 public or private health care facility while such individual is so commissioned or serving and in 65 accordance with his official military orders;

66 18. Any masseur, who publicly represents himself as such, from performing services within the scope 67 of his usual professional activities and in conformance with state law;

68 19. Any person from performing services in the lawful conduct of his particular profession or 69 business under state law; 70

20. Any person from rendering emergency care pursuant to the provisions of § 8.01-225;

71 21. Qualified emergency medical services personnel, when acting within the scope of their 72 certification, and licensed health care practitioners, when acting within their scope of practice, from 73 following Durable Do Not Resuscitate Orders issued in accordance with § 54.1-2987.1 and Board of 74 Health regulations, or licensed health care practitioners from following any other written order of a 75 physician not to resuscitate a patient in the event of cardiac or respiratory arrest;

76 22. Any commissioned or contract medical officer of the army, navy, coast guard or air force 77 rendering services voluntarily and without compensation while deemed to be licensed pursuant to 78 § 54.1-106;

79 23. Any provider of a chemical dependency treatment program who is certified as an "acupuncture 80 detoxification specialist" by the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association or an equivalent certifying body, from administering auricular acupuncture treatment under the appropriate supervision of 81 82 a National Acupuncture Detoxification Association certified licensed physician or licensed acupuncturist;

24. Any employee of any assisted living facility who is certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation 83 (CPR) acting in compliance with the patient's individualized service plan and with the written order of 84 85 the attending physician not to resuscitate a patient in the event of cardiac or respiratory arrest;

25. Any person working as a health assistant under the direction of a licensed medical or osteopathic 86 doctor within the Department of Corrections, the Department of Juvenile Justice or local correctional 87 88 facilities;

89 26. Any employee of a school board, authorized by a prescriber and trained in the administration of 90 insulin and glucagon, when, upon the authorization of a prescriber and the written request of the parents 91 as defined in § 22.1-1, assisting with the administration of insulin or administrating glucagon to a 92 student diagnosed as having diabetes and who requires insulin injections during the school day or for 93 whom glucagon has been prescribed for the emergency treatment of hypoglycemia;

27. Any practitioner of the healing arts or other profession regulated by the Board from rendering free health care to an underserved population of Virginia who (i) does not regularly practice his 94 95 96 profession in Virginia, (ii) holds a current valid license or certificate to practice his profession in another 97 state, territory, district or possession of the United States, (iii) volunteers to provide free health care to 98 an underserved area of the Commonwealth under the auspices of a publicly supported all volunteer, 99 nonprofit organization that sponsors the provision of health care to populations of underserved people, (iv) files a copy of the license or certification issued in such other jurisdiction with the Board, (v) 100 notifies the Board at least five business days prior to the voluntary provision of services of the dates and 101 102 location of such service, and (vi) acknowledges, in writing, that such licensure exemption shall only be 103 valid, in compliance with the Board's regulations, during the limited period that such free health care is 104 made available through the volunteer, nonprofit organization on the dates and at the location filed with 105 the Board. The Board may deny the right to practice in Virginia to any practitioner of the healing arts whose license or certificate has been previously suspended or revoked, who has been convicted of a 106 felony or who is otherwise found to be in violation of applicable laws or regulations. However, the 107 108 Board shall allow a practitioner of the healing arts who meets the above criteria to provide volunteer 109 services without prior notice for a period of up to three days, provided the nonprofit organization 110 verifies that the practitioner has a valid, unrestricted license in another state;

111 28. Any registered nurse, acting as an agent of the Department of Health, from obtaining specimens 112 of sputum or other bodily fluid from persons in whom the diagnosis of active tuberculosis disease, as 113 defined in § 32.1-49.1, is suspected and submitting orders for testing of such specimens to the Division 114 of Consolidated Laboratories or other public health laboratories, designated by the State Health Commissioner, for the purpose of determining the presence or absence of tubercle bacilli as defined in 115 116 § 32.1-49.1;

117 29. Any physician of medicine or osteopathy or nurse practitioner from delegating to a registered

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118 nurse under his supervision the screening and testing of children for elevated blood-lead levels when 119 such testing is conducted (i) in accordance with a written protocol between the physician or nurse 120 practitioner and the registered nurse and (ii) in compliance with the Board of Health's regulations 121 promulgated pursuant to §§ 32.1-46.1 and 32.1-46.2. Any follow-up testing or treatment shall be 122 conducted at the direction of a physician or nurse practitioner;

30. Any practitioner of one of the professions regulated by the Board of Medicine who is in good standing with the applicable regulatory agency in another state or Canada from engaging in the practice of that profession when the practitioner is in Virginia temporarily with an out-of-state athletic team or athlete for the duration of the athletic tournament, game, or event in which the team or athlete is competing;

128 31. Any person from performing state or federally funded health care tasks directed by the consumer,
129 which are typically self-performed, for an individual who lives in a private residence and who, by
130 reason of disability, is unable to perform such tasks but who is capable of directing the appropriate
131 performance of such tasks; or

32. Any practitioner of one of the professions regulated by the Board of Medicine who is in good
standing with the applicable regulatory agency in another state from engaging in the practice of that
profession in Virginia with a patient who is being transported to or from a Virginia hospital for care.

B. Notwithstanding any provision of law or regulation to the contrary, a nurse practitioner licensed
by the Boards of Nursing and Medicine in the category of certified nurse midwife may practice without
the requirement for physician supervision while participating in a pilot program approved by the Board
of Health pursuant to § 32.1-11.5.

## \$ 54.1-2927. Applicants from other states without reciprocity; temporary licenses or certificates for certain practitioners of the healing arts.

A. The Board, in its discretion, may issue certificates or licenses to applicants upon endorsement by
boards or other appropriate authorities of other states or territories or the District of Columbia with
which reciprocal relations have not been established if the credentials of such applicants are satisfactory
and the examinations and passing grades required by such other boards are fully equal to those required
by the Virginia Board.

146 The Board may issue certificates or licenses to applicants holding certificates from the national
147 boards of their respective branches of the healing arts if their credentials, schools of graduation and
148 national board examinations and results are acceptable to the Board. The Board shall promulgate
149 regulations in order to carry out the provisions of this section.

150 B. The Board may issue a license or certificate authorization to practice valid for a period not to 151 exceed three months to a practitioner of the healing arts licensed or certified and in good standing with 152 the applicable regulatory agency in the state, District of Columbia, or Canada where the practitioner resides when the practitioner is in Virginia temporarily to practice the healing arts (i) in a summer camp 153 or in conjunction with patients who are participating in recreational activities, (ii) in continuing 154 155 education programs, or (iii) by rendering at any site any health care services within the limits of his 156 license or certificate, voluntarily and without compensation, to any patient of any clinic which that is 157 organized in whole or in part for the delivery of health care services without charge as provided in 158 § 54.1-106. Approval of the credentials of such practitioners and the form of such licenses or certificates 159 shall be governed by regulations promulgated by the Board. A fee not to exceed twenty-five dollars \$25 160 may be charged by the Board for the issuance of a license or certificate authorized by authorization to 161 practice pursuant to the provisions of this subsection.
