16105812D **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 184** 1 2 Offered March 1, 2016 3 Commending the Virginia Urological Society. 4 Patron—Dunnavant 5 6 Referred to Committee on Rules 7 8 WHEREAS, the Virginia Urological Society seeks to promote the highest standards of urological 9 clinical care through education and research and inform patients through its established public awareness 10 campaigns; and WHEREAS, thousands of Virginians are affected by bladder diseases and conditions, including 11 urinary incontinence, overactive bladder, underactive bladder, interstitial cystitis, nocturia, urinary tract 12 13 infections, bladder cancer, urotrauma, and neurogenic bladder; and WHEREAS, the Virginia Urological Society works tirelessly to treat patients throughout the 14 15 Commonwealth who suffer from these bladder diseases and conditions; bladder diseases and conditions 16 result in costs estimated at over \$70 billion annually in the United States; and WHEREAS, bladder diseases and conditions have a significant impact on health and quality of life, 17 contributing to depression, social isolation, falls, loss of self-esteem, hospitalizations, nursing home 18 19 admissions, and even death; and 20 WHEREAS, bladder problems are highly stigmatized, and open dialogue generated by awareness and 21 education can reduce stigma and empower providers and patients to have much-needed conversations 22 about bladder health: and 23 WHEREAS, the need for increased medical and behavioral research to better understand and 24 maintain bladder health and treat bladder diseases is critical, yet poorly recognized; and 25 WHEREAS, bladder diseases and conditions are common in military veterans; one in three young women veterans report overactive bladder, stress urinary incontinence, or other painful bladder 26 27 symptoms; and 28 WHEREAS, more than three-quarters of veterans with spinal cord injuries suffer from neurogenic 29 bladder, and bladder cancer is the fourth most commonly diagnosed cancer among Veterans Health 30 Administration patients; and 31 WHEREAS, more than one in 10 military service members injured in Afghanistan and Iraq have 32 urotrauma injuries (damage to the urinary tract or reproductive organs), and while urotrauma may not be 33 as visible as amputations or as widely discussed as post-traumatic stress disorder, it is no less physically 34 and psychologically debilitating; and 35 WHEREAS, the Virginia Urological Society is the leading voice on bladder health in the 36 Commonwealth, working to educate and treat patients and collaborate with other providers to emphasize 37 the importance of early identification and the availability of treatment options; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the General Assembly hereby 38 39 commend the Virginia Urological Society; and, be it 40 RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the Senate prepare a copy of this resolution for 41 presentation to the Virginia Urological Society as an expression of the General Assembly's admiration for the organization's work to help raise awareness and educate patients throughout the Commonwealth 42 on the importance of bladder health. 43

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
