16103110D **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37** 1 2 Offered January 13, 2016 3 Prefiled January 4, 2016 4 Encouraging employers in the Commonwealth to pay their employees a living wage. 5 Patrons-Lucas; Delegate: Heretick 6 7 Referred to Committee on Rules 8 9 WHEREAS, there is an ongoing discussion in many areas of the Commonwealth regarding the 10 struggle low-income working families face as they try to survive in an era of rising costs of living and 11 stagnant wages; and WHEREAS, much of this discussion has centered on the extent to which a gap exists between the 12 13 minimum wage and the amount of money needed to cover basic family expenses, including the costs of 14 food, housing, transportation, child care, and health care and federal, state, and local taxes; and 15 WHEREAS, the number of bills introduced in the 2015 Session of the General Assembly seeking to 16 increase the minimum wage illustrates a growing recognition of a need to address the fact that employees compensated at the current federal minimum wage of \$7.25 per hour are often unable to earn 17 wages sufficient to cover basic family expenses; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) has developed a living wage calculator, 20 which may be accessed at http://livingwage.mit.edu/, to estimate the cost of living in many communities 21 around the nation, including over 120 localities and nine metropolitan statistical areas (MSA) in the 22 Commonwealth, as well as the state as a whole; and 23 WHEREAS, the calculator lists typical expenses, the living wage, and typical wages for the selected 24 locality, MSA, or state; and 25 WHEREAS, the MIT calculator reveals that the living wage, expressed as the hourly rate that individuals must earn to support their family if they are the sole provider and are working full time for 26 27 2,080 hours per year, in the Commonwealth for a family of two adults and two children is \$24.91 per 28 hour: and 29 WHEREAS, the MIT calculator further shows that the living wage varies among the 30 Commonwealth's localities, as would be expected in a state where housing costs and other living 31 expenses vary widely; and WHEREAS, the MIT calculator provides public and private employers in localities throughout the 32 33 Commonwealth with information about the hourly wage that would be required in order to provide 34 full-time employees with a living wage; and 35 WHEREAS, paying a living wage to each employee in the Commonwealth, based on the data 36 accessible through the MIT calculator, will allow workers to sustain themselves and their families and 37 lessen their reliance on public assistance programs; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That employers in the 38 39 Commonwealth be encouraged to pay their employees a living wage; and, be it RESOLVED FURTHER. That the Clerk of the Senate transmit a copy of this resolution to the 40 41 Governor, requesting that he further disseminate copies of this resolution to all local governing bodies and that such entities further disseminate copies of this resolution to the private employers within their 42 respective localities so that they may be apprised of the sense of the General Assembly of Virginia in 43 44 this matter.
