4	Continuing the Joint Subcommittee to Formulate Recommendations for the Development of a
5	Comprehensive and Coordinated Planning Effort to Address Recurrent Flooding as the joint
6	subcommittee on coastal flooding. Report.

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11	WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution No. 16 (2014) and Senate Joint Resolution No. 3 (2014)
12	established the Joint Subcommittee to Formulate Recommendations for the Development of a
13	Comprehensive and Coordinated Planning Effort to Address Recurrent Flooding (the Joint
14	Subcommittee); and
15 16	WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution No. 50 (2012) and Senate Joint Resolution No. 76 (2012) directed the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS) to study strategies for adaptation to prevent
17	recurrent flooding in Tidewater and Eastern Shore Virginia localities; and
18	WHEREAS, the resulting VIMS report, entitled "Recurrent Flooding Study for Tidewater Virginia,"
19	published as Senate Document 3 (2013), stated that recurrent flooding impacts all localities in Virginia's
20	coastal zone and is predicted to become worse over reasonable planning horizons (20 to 50 years); and
21	WHEREAS, VIMS offered several recommendations, including that the Commonwealth, working
22	with its coastal localities, (i) begin comprehensive and coordinated planning efforts; (ii) initiate
23	identification, collection, and analysis of data needed to support effective planning for response efforts;
24 25	and (iii) take a lead role in addressing recurrent flooding in Virginia for the following reasons: (a) accessing relevant federal resources for planning and mitigation may be enhanced through state
23 26	mediation, (b) flooding problems are linked to water bodies and therefore often transcend locality
27	boundaries, and (c) prioritizing flood management actions must be based in part on risk and, therefore,
28	the Commonwealth must oversee the necessary studies to determine adaptation strategies as well as
29	implementation of the agreed-upon strategies; and
30	WHEREAS, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) study mandated by House
31 32	Joint Resolution 132 (2012) and presented on October 15, 2013, entitled "Review of Disaster Preparedness Planning in Virginia," stated: "The state generally has strong disaster response plans, but
33	deficiencies in evacuation and shelter plans may compromise the safety of the Hampton Roads
34	population during a catastrophic disaster"; and
35	WHEREAS, the JLARC study further noted that if four key assumptions in the state's current
36	evacuation plan do not hold, "timely hurricane evacuations could be compromised," placing citizens at
37	risk after the storm; and
38 39	WHEREAS, the Virginia Housing Commission studied this issue through its Housing and Environmental Standards Work Group and found that zoning, building codes, and planning issues will
<b>40</b>	all be affected by recurrent flooding; and
41	WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution 16 (2014) and Senate Joint Resolution 3 (2014) established the
42	Joint Subcommittee as recommended by the VIMS report; and
43	WHEREAS, the Joint Subcommittee met four times during the 2014 interim to collect information
44 45	from federal agencies, state agencies, localities, and stakeholders and to carry out its work; and WHEREAS, the Joint Subcommittee filed an Executive Summary with the General Assembly prior to
<b>4</b> 5 <b>4</b> 6	the 2015 Session that included five initial recommendations to increase public awareness, improve local
47	and state government agency resiliency coordination, and address floodplain management; and
<b>48</b>	WHEREAS, recommendations made by the Joint Subcommittee during the 2014 interim resulted in
<b>49</b>	six bills passing the General Assembly during the 2015 Session, all with bipartisan support; and
50	WHEREAS, the Joint Subcommittee met four times during the 2015 interim to collect information
51 52	from federal agencies, state agencies, localities, and stakeholders and to carry out its work; and WHEREAS recommendations made by the Joint Subcommittee during the 2015 interim resulted in
52 53	WHEREAS, recommendations made by the Joint Subcommittee during the 2015 interim resulted in additional recommendations that are both legislative in nature and require additional coordination
53 54	between federal agencies, state agencies, and higher education; and
55	WHEREAS, the members of the full Joint Subcommittee concurred that the Joint Subcommittee
56	should be continued for two more years in order to keep the Commonwealth on the path of advancing
57	Virginia as the coastal states leader in advancing resiliency strategies and, most importantly, protecting
58	its citizens and business assets; and

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59 WHEREAS, to more accurately reflect its mission, the Joint Subcommittee would be more 60 appropriately named the joint subcommittee on coastal flooding; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Joint Subcommittee to 61 62 Formulate Recommendations for the Development of a Comprehensive and Coordinated Planning Effort 63 to Address Recurrent Flooding be continued as the joint subcommittee on coastal flooding. The joint 64 subcommittee shall have a total membership of 11 members that shall consist of five members of the 65 House of Delegates appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; three 66 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; two nonlegislative citizen 67 members, one of whom shall be a business leader and one of whom shall be a representative of the 68 environmental community, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and one nonlegislative 69 citizen member who is a local official representing Virginia's flood-prone communities appointed by the 70 71 Senate Committee on Rules. Nonlegislative citizen members of the joint subcommittee shall be citizens 72 of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The current members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates shall be subject to reappointment. The current members appointed by the Senate Committee 73 74 on Rules shall continue to serve until replaced. Vacancies shall be filled by the original appointing 75 authority. Unless otherwise approved in writing by the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk, nonlegislative citizen members shall only be reimbursed for travel originating and 76 77 ending within the Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of attending meetings. If a companion 78 joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both Clerks shall be required. 79 The joint subcommittee shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership, who shall 80 be members of the General Assembly.

81 In conducting its review, the joint subcommittee shall recommend short-term and long-term strategies82 for minimizing the impact of recurrent flooding and coastal storms.

Administrative staff support shall be provided by the Office of the Clerk of the Senate. Legal,
research, policy analysis, and other services as requested by the joint subcommittee shall be provided by
the Division of Legislative Services. Technical assistance shall be provided by Virginia college and
university faculty with expertise in the subject matter. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide
assistance to the joint subcommittee for this review, upon request.

88 The joint subcommittee shall be limited to four meetings for the 2016 interim and four meetings for 89 the 2017 interim, and the direct costs of this subcommittee shall not exceed \$17,440 for each year 90 without approval as set out in this resolution. Approval for unbudgeted nonmember-related expenses 91 shall require the written authorization of the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective 92 Clerk. If a companion joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both 93 Clerks shall be required.

94 No recommendation of the joint subcommittee shall be adopted if a majority of the House members
95 or a majority of the Senate members appointed to the joint subcommittee (i) vote against the
96 recommendation and (ii) vote for the recommendation to fail notwithstanding the majority vote of the
97 joint subcommittee.

98 The joint subcommittee shall complete its meetings for the first year by November 30, 2016, and for 99 the second year by November 30, 2017, and the chairman shall submit to the Division of Legislative 100 Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and recommendations no later than the first 101 day of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for each year. Each executive summary shall 102 state whether the joint subcommittee intends to submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a 103 report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a House or Senate document. The executive summaries and reports shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of 104 Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be 105 106 posted on the General Assembly's website.

107 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint
108 Rules Committee. The Committee may approve or disapprove expenditures for the joint subcommittee's
109 review, extend or delay the period for the conduct of the review, or authorize additional meetings during
110 the 2016 and 2017 interims.
