3. Committee: Commerce and Labor

4. Title: Workers' compensation; presumption of compensability for certain diseases.

5. Summary: Adds colorectal cancer and testicular cancer to, and removes rectal cancer from, the list of cancers that are presumed to be an occupational disease compensable under the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act if contracted by certain firefighters and certain other employees who have had contact with a toxic substance in the line of duty.

6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No.

7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Indeterminate – see Item 8.

8. Fiscal Implications: According to the Workers' Compensation Program (Program) at the Department of Human Resource Management, the Program does not have the claim experience to determine the cost for adding colorectal and testicular cancer to the list of cancers that are presumed to be an occupation disease compensable under the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act. However, if a workers' compensation claim was filed and found to be compensable, it would likely be costly due to the cost of medical care in cancer claims as well as the potential for the claim to convert to a death claim. The increase in claims costs may also result in higher workers' compensation premiums for the employing agency.

The proposed legislation is also expected to impact the state's Line of Duty Program; however, the estimated fiscal impact for the Line of Duty Program cannot be determined.

9. Specific Agency or Political Subdivisions Affected: Workers' Compensation Commission, Department of Human Resource Management, Department of Emergency Management, Department of State Police, Department of Motor Vehicles, and Department of Accounts.

10. Technical Amendment Necessary: No.

11. Other Comments: This bill is similar to SB524 (McPike).
