2. Patron: Habeeb

3. Committee: Commerce and Labor

4. Title: Workers' compensation; injuries presumed to be in course of employment.

5. Summary: Creates the presumption, in the absence of a preponderance of evidence to the contrary, that an injury is work related if the employee dies with there being no evidence that he ever regained consciousness after the accident, dies at the accident location or nearby, or is found dead where he is reasonably expected to be as an employee.

6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No.

7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Indeterminate – see Item 8.

8. Fiscal Implications: The legislation, as amended, expands § 65.2-105, Code of Virginia, to provide for injured workers who are not found dead, but are unconscious and die before regaining consciousness in addition to those employees who are found dead at a location where they were reasonably expected to be as an employee. The legislation may have a fiscal impact to the Commonwealth as it expands the presumption that certain injuries occurred as a result of and during employment; however, the costs cannot be determined.

9. Specific Agency or Political Subdivisions Affected: Department of Human Resource Management and Workers' Compensation Commission.

10. Technical Amendment Necessary: No.

11. Other Comments: The introduced legislation clarified that the employee's inability to testify refers to testimony about how the accident occurred and limited the measure's application to circumstances where the employee's inability to testify is because of injuries from the accident.
