**4. Title: Stalking**

**5. Summary:**

Under current law, stalking is a Class 1 misdemeanor. The offense is elevated to a Class 6 felony if:

- An offender is convicted of a second offense occurring within five years of a prior stalking conviction and a conviction within the same five years of (i) of any one of several specified assault offenses and the victim of the assault offense was also the victim of the stalking activity, (ii) assault and battery on a family member, or (iii) violating a protective order; or
- A third or subsequent conviction occurring within five years of a prior stalking conviction.

The proposed legislation would make any second offense occurring within five years of a prior conviction of stalking a Class 6 felony.

**6. Budget Amendment Necessary:** Yes. Item 394. The House included funding for the fiscal impact of this legislation in its amendments to the budget bill. The Senate did not include funding in its budget amendments for this fiscal impact.

**8. Fiscal Implications:**

For someone convicted of a Class 6 felony, a judge has the option of sentencing him to up to one year in jail, or 1 to 5 years in prison. Therefore, this proposal could result in an increase in the number of persons sentenced to jail or prison.

The Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission has projected that the proposed legislation would have only a minimal impact on the jail population.

Pursuant to §30-19.1:4 of the Code of Virginia, the Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission estimates a fiscal impact of \$81,941 (the highest annual cost over the next six years). The amount is based on the projection that the legislation will result in three additional inmates being incarcerated in prison.
