4	A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-253.13:4 of the Code of Virginia, relating to high school
5	graduation requirements; verified units of credit; satisfactory score on the PSAT examination.

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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 22.1-253.13:4 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12 13	§ 22.1-253.13:4. Standard 4. Student achievement and graduation requirements.A. Each local school board shall award diplomas to all secondary school students, including students
13 14	who transfer from nonpublic schools or from home instruction, who meet the requirements prescribed by
15	the Board of Education and meet such other requirements as may be prescribed by the local school
16	board and approved by the Board of Education. Provisions shall be made to facilitate the transfer and
17	appropriate grade placement of students from other public secondary schools, from nonpublic schools, or
18	from home instruction as outlined in the standards for accreditation. The standards for accreditation shall
19	include provisions relating to the completion of graduation requirements through Virtual Virginia.
20 21	Further, reasonable accommodation to meet the requirements for diplomas shall be provided for
21	otherwise qualified students with disabilities as needed. In addition, each local school board may devise, vis-a-vis the award of diplomas to secondary school
$\frac{12}{23}$	students, a mechanism for calculating class rankings that takes into consideration whether the student has
24	taken a required class more than one time and has had any prior earned grade for such required class
25	expunged.
26	Each local school board shall notify the parents of rising eleventh and twelfth grade students of (i)
27 28	the requirements for graduation pursuant to the standards for accreditation and (ii) the requirements that have yet to be completed by the individual student.
20 29	B. Students identified as disabled who complete the requirements of their individualized education
3 0	programs and meet certain requirements prescribed by the Board pursuant to regulations but do not meet
31	the requirements for any named diploma shall be awarded Applied Studies diplomas by local school
32	boards.
33	Each local school board shall notify the parent of such students with disabilities who have an
34 35	individualized education program and who fail to meet the graduation requirements of the student's right to a free and appropriate education to age 21, inclusive, pursuant to Article 2 (§ 22.1-213 et seq.) of
36	Chapter 13.
37	C. Students who have completed a prescribed course of study as defined by the local school board
38	shall be awarded certificates of program completion by local school boards if they are not eligible to
39	receive a Board of Education-approved diploma.
40 41	Each local school board shall provide notification of the right to a free public education for students
41	who have not reached 20 years of age on or before August 1 of the school year, pursuant to Chapter 1 (§ 22.1-1 et seq.), to the parent of students who fail to graduate or who have failed to achieve
43	graduation requirements as provided in the standards for accreditation. If such student who does not
44	graduate or complete such requirements is a student for whom English is a second language, the local
45	school board shall notify the parent of the student's opportunity for a free public education in accordance
46	with § 22.1-5.
47 48	D. (For expiration date, see Acts 2016, cc. 720 and 750) In establishing course and credit requirements for a high school diploma, the Board shall:
4 9	1. Provide for the selection of integrated learning courses meeting the Standards of Learning and
50	approved by the Board to satisfy graduation credit requirements, which shall include Standards of
51	Learning testing, as necessary.
52	2. Establish the requirements for a standard and an advanced studies high school diploma, which
53 54	shall each include at least one credit in fine or performing arts or career and technical education and one credit in United States and Virginia history. The requirements for a standard high school diplome shall
54 55	credit in United States and Virginia history. The requirements for a standard high school diploma shall, however, include at least two sequential electives chosen from a concentration of courses selected from a
56	variety of options that may be planned to ensure the completion of a focused sequence of elective
57	courses. Such focused sequence of elective courses shall provide a foundation for further education or
58	training or preparation for employment. The advanced studies diploma shall be the recommended

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59 diploma for students pursuing baccalaureate study. Both the standard and the advanced studies diploma shall prepare students for post-secondary education and the career readiness required by the 60 Commonwealth's economy. 61

62 Beginning with first-time ninth grade students in the 2013-2014 school year, requirements for the 63 standard diploma shall include a requirement to earn a career and technical education credential that has 64 been approved by the Board, except when a career and technical education credential in a particular 65 subject area is not readily available or appropriate or does not adequately measure student competency, in which case the student shall receive satisfactory competency-based instruction in the subject area to 66 satisfy the standard diploma requirements. The career and technical education credential, when required, 67 68 could include the successful completion of an industry certification, a state licensure examination, a national occupational competency assessment, or the Virginia workplace readiness skills assessment. 69

Beginning with first-time ninth grade students in the 2016-2017 school year, requirements for the 70 71 standard and advanced diplomas shall include a requirement to be trained in emergency first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the use of automated external defibrillators, including hands-on 72 73 practice of the skills necessary to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

74 The Board shall make provision in its regulations for students with disabilities to earn a standard 75 diploma.

3. Provide, in the requirements to earn a standard or advanced studies diploma, the successful 76 77 completion of one virtual course. The virtual course may be a noncredit-bearing course.

78 4. Provide, in the requirements for the verified units of credit stipulated for obtaining the standard or 79 advanced studies diploma, that students completing elective classes into which the Standards of Learning 80 for any required course have been integrated may take the relevant Standards of Learning test for the relevant required course and receive, upon achieving a satisfactory score on the specific Standards of 81 Learning assessment, a verified unit of credit for such elective class that shall be deemed to satisfy the 82 83 Board's requirement for verified credit for the required course.

5. Establish a procedure to facilitate the acceleration of students that allows qualified students, with 84 85 the recommendation of the division superintendent, without completing the 140-hour class, to obtain credit for such class upon demonstration of mastery of the course content and objectives. Having 86 87 received credit for the course, the student shall be permitted to sit for the relevant Standards of Learning 88 assessment and, upon receiving a passing score, shall earn a verified credit. Nothing in this section shall 89 preclude relevant school division personnel from enforcing compulsory attendance in public schools.

90 6. Provide for the award of verified units of credit for passing scores on industry certifications, state licensure examinations, and national occupational competency assessments approved by the Board of 91 92 Education.

93 School boards shall report annually to the Board of Education the number of Board-approved 94 industry certifications obtained, state licensure examinations passed, national occupational competency 95 assessments passed, Virginia workplace readiness skills assessments passed, and the number of career and technical education completers who graduated. These numbers shall be reported as separate 96 categories on the School Performance Report Card. 97

98 For the purposes of this subdivision, "career and technical education completer" means a student who 99 has met the requirements for a career and technical concentration or specialization and all requirements 100 for high school graduation or an approved alternative education program. 101

In addition, the Board may:

102 a. For the purpose of awarding verified units of credit, approve the use of additional or substitute tests for the correlated Standards of Learning assessment, such as academic achievement tests, industry 103 104 certifications or state licensure examinations; and

b. Permit students completing career and technical education programs designed to enable such 105 students to pass such industry certification examinations or state licensure examinations to be awarded, 106 107 upon obtaining satisfactory scores on such industry certification or licensure examinations, the 108 appropriate verified units of credit for one or more career and technical education classes into which 109 relevant Standards of Learning for various classes taught at the same level have been integrated. Such industry certification and state licensure examinations may cover relevant Standards of Learning for 110 111 various required classes and may, at the discretion of the Board, address some Standards of Learning for 112 several required classes.

113 7. Provide for the waiver of certain graduation requirements (i) upon the Board's initiative or (ii) at the request of a local school board. Such waivers shall be granted only for good cause and shall be 114 115 considered on a case-by-case basis.

8. Consider all computer science course credits earned by students to be science course credits, 116 mathematics course credits, or career and technical education credits. The Board of Education shall 117 118 develop guidelines addressing how computer science courses can satisfy graduation requirements.

119 9. Permit local school divisions to waive the requirement for students to receive 140 clock hours of instruction to earn a standard unit of credit upon providing the Board with satisfactory proof, based on 120

121 Board guidelines, that the students for whom such requirements are waived have learned the content and 122 skills included in the relevant Standards of Learning.

123 10. Provide for the award of verified units of credit for a satisfactory score on the Preliminary SAT 124 (PSAT) examination.

125 D. (For effective date, see Acts 2016, cc. 720 and 750) In establishing graduation requirements, the 126 Board shall:

127 1. Develop and implement, in consultation with stakeholders representing elementary and secondary 128 education, higher education, and business and industry in the Commonwealth and including parents, 129 policymakers, and community leaders in the Commonwealth, a Profile of a Virginia Graduate that 130 identifies the knowledge and skills that students should attain during high school in order to be 131 successful contributors to the economy of the Commonwealth, giving due consideration to critical 132 thinking, creative thinking, collaboration, communication, and citizenship. 133

2. Emphasize the development of core skill sets in the early years of high school.

134 3. Establish multiple paths toward college and career readiness for students to follow in the later 135 years of high school. Each such pathway shall include opportunities for internships, externships, and 136 credentialing.

137 4. Provide for the selection of integrated learning courses meeting the Standards of Learning and 138 approved by the Board to satisfy graduation requirements, which shall include Standards of Learning 139 testing, as necessary.

140 5. Require students to complete at least one course in fine or performing arts or career and technical 141 education, one course in United States and Virginia history, and two sequential elective courses chosen 142 from a concentration of courses selected from a variety of options that may be planned to ensure the 143 completion of a focused sequence of elective courses that provides a foundation for further education or 144 training or preparation for employment.

145 6. Graduation requirements shall include a requirement Require that students either (i) complete an 146 Advanced Placement, honors, or International Baccalaureate course or (ii) earn a career and technical 147 education credential that has been approved by the Board, except when a career and technical education 148 credential in a particular subject area is not readily available or appropriate or does not adequately 149 measure student competency, in which case the student shall receive satisfactory competency-based 150 instruction in the subject area to earn credit. The career and technical education credential, when 151 required, could include the successful completion of an industry certification, a state licensure 152 examination, a national occupational competency assessment, or the Virginia workplace readiness skills 153 assessment.

154 7. Beginning with first-time ninth grade students in the 2016-2017 school year, require students to be 155 trained in emergency first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the use of automated external 156 defibrillators, including hands-on practice of the skills necessary to perform cardiopulmonary 157 resuscitation.

158 8. Make provision in its regulations for students with disabilities to earn a diploma.

159 9. Require students to complete one virtual course, which may be a noncredit-bearing course.

160 10. Provide that students who complete elective classes into which the Standards of Learning for any 161 required course have been integrated and achieve a passing score on the relevant Standards of Learning 162 test for the relevant required course receive credit for such elective class.

163 11. Establish a procedure to facilitate the acceleration of students that allows qualified students, with 164 the recommendation of the division superintendent, without completing the 140-hour class, to obtain 165 credit for such class upon demonstrating mastery of the course content and objectives and receiving a passing score on the relevant Standards of Learning assessment. Nothing in this section shall preclude 166 167 relevant school division personnel from enforcing compulsory attendance in public schools.

168 12. Provide for the award of credit for passing scores on industry certifications, state licensure 169 examinations, and national occupational competency assessments approved by the Board of Education.

170 School boards shall report annually to the Board of Education the number of Board-approved 171 industry certifications obtained, state licensure examinations passed, national occupational competency 172 assessments passed, Virginia workplace readiness skills assessments passed, and the number of career 173 and technical education completers who graduated. These numbers shall be reported as separate 174 categories on the School Performance Report Card.

175 For the purposes of this subdivision, "career and technical education completer" means a student who 176 has met the requirements for a career and technical concentration or specialization and all requirements 177 for high school graduation or an approved alternative education program.

178 In addition, the Board may:

179 a. For the purpose of awarding credit, approve the use of additional or substitute tests for the 180 correlated Standards of Learning assessment, such as academic achievement tests, industry certifications 181 or state licensure examinations; and

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b. Permit students completing career and technical education programs designed to enable such
students to pass such industry certification examinations or state licensure examinations to be awarded,
upon obtaining satisfactory scores on such industry certification or licensure examinations, appropriate
credit for one or more career and technical education classes into which relevant Standards of Learning
for various classes taught at the same level have been integrated. Such industry certification and state
licensure examinations may cover relevant Standards of Learning for various required classes and may,
at the discretion of the Board, address some Standards of Learning for several required classes.

189 13. Provide for the waiver of certain graduation requirements (i) upon the Board's initiative or (ii) at
190 the request of a local school board. Such waivers shall be granted only for good cause and shall be
191 considered on a case-by-case basis.

192 14. Consider all computer science course credits earned by students to be science course credits,
193 mathematics course credits, or career and technical education credits. The Board of Education shall
194 develop guidelines addressing how computer science courses can satisfy graduation requirements.

195 15. Permit local school divisions to waive the requirement for students to receive 140 clock hours of 196 instruction upon providing the Board with satisfactory proof, based on Board guidelines, that the 197 students for whom such requirements are waived have learned the content and skills included in the 198 relevant Standards of Learning.

199 16. Provide for the award of verified units of credit for a satisfactory score on the Preliminary SAT200 (PSAT) examination.

E. In the exercise of its authority to recognize exemplary performance by providing for diploma seals:

203 1. The Board shall develop criteria for recognizing exemplary performance in career and technical
 204 education programs by students who have completed the requirements for a Board of
 205 Education-approved diploma and shall award seals on the diplomas of students meeting such criteria.

206 2. The Board shall establish criteria for awarding a diploma seal for advanced mathematics and
207 technology for the Board of Education-approved diplomas. The Board shall consider including criteria
208 for (i) technology courses; (ii) technical writing, reading, and oral communication skills; (iii)
209 technology-related training; and (iv) industry, professional, and trade association national certifications.

3. The Board shall establish criteria for awarding a diploma seal for excellence in civics education and understanding of our state and federal constitutions and the democratic model of government for the Board of Education-approved diplomas. The Board shall consider including criteria for (i) successful completion of history, government, and civics courses, including courses that incorporate character education; (ii) voluntary participation in community service or extracurricular activities that includes the types of activities that shall qualify as community service and the number of hours required; and (iii) related requirements as it deems appropriate.

4. The Board shall establish criteria for awarding a diploma seal of biliteracy to any student who 217 218 demonstrates proficiency in English and at least one other language for the Board of Education-approved 219 diplomas. The Board shall consider criteria including the student's (i) score on a College Board 220 Advanced Placement foreign language examination, (ii) score on an SAT II Subject Test in a foreign language, (iii) proficiency level on an ACTFL Assessment of Performance toward Proficiency in 221 222 Languages (AAPPL) measure or another nationally or internationally recognized language proficiency 223 test, or (iv) cumulative grade point average in a sequence of foreign language courses approved by the 224 Board.

225 F. The Board shall establish, by regulation, requirements for the award of a general achievement 226 adult high school diploma for those persons who are not subject to the compulsory school attendance 227 requirements of § 22.1-254 and have (i) achieved a passing score on a high school equivalency 228 examination approved by the Board of Education; (ii) successfully completed an education and training 229 program designated by the Board of Education; (iii) earned a Board of Education-approved career and 230 technical education credential such as the successful completion of an industry certification, a state 231 licensure examination, a national occupational competency assessment, or the Virginia workplace 232 readiness skills assessment; and (iv) satisfied other requirements as may be established by the Board for 233 the award of such diploma.

G. To ensure the uniform assessment of high school graduation rates, the Board shall collect,
 analyze, report, and make available to the public high school graduation and dropout data using a
 formula prescribed by the Board.

H. The Board shall also collect, analyze, report, and make available to the public high school
graduation and dropout data using a formula that excludes any student who fails to graduate because
such student is in the custody of the Department of Corrections, the Department of Juvenile Justice, or
local law enforcement. For the purposes of the Standards of Accreditation, the Board shall use the
graduation rate required by this subsection.

I. The Board may promulgate such regulations as may be necessary and appropriate for the collection, analysis, and reporting of such data required by subsections G and H.
