AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Finance
on January 24, 2017)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator McDougle)

A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 58.1-3700.1 and 58.1-3703 of the Code of Virginia, relating to local license taxes; exemption for certain defense production businesses.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:**1. That §§ 58.1-3700.1 and 58.1-3703 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:****§ 58.1-3700.1. Definitions.**

For the purposes of this chapter and any local ordinances adopted pursuant to this chapter, unless otherwise required by the context:

"Affiliated group" means:

1. One or more chains of corporations subject to inclusion connected through stock ownership with a common parent corporation which is a corporation subject to inclusion if:

a. Stock possessing at least eighty percent of the voting power of all classes of stock and at least eighty percent of each class of the nonvoting stock of each of the corporations subject to inclusion, except the common parent corporation, is owned directly by one or more of the other corporations subject to inclusion; and

b. The common parent corporation directly owns stock possessing at least eighty percent of the voting power of all classes of stock and at least eighty percent of each class of the nonvoting stock of at least one of the other subject to inclusion corporations. As used in this subdivision, the term "stock" does not include nonvoting stock which is limited and preferred as to dividends; the phrase "corporation subject to inclusion" means any corporation within the affiliated group irrespective of the state or country of its incorporation; and the term "receipts" includes gross receipts and gross income.

2. Two or more corporations if five or fewer persons who are individuals, estates or trusts own stock possessing:

a. At least eighty percent of the total combined voting power of all classes of stock entitled to vote or at least eighty percent of the total value of shares of all classes of the stock of each corporation; and

b. More than fifty percent of the total combined voting power of all classes of stock entitled to vote or more than fifty percent of the total value of shares of all classes of stock of each corporation, taking into account the stock ownership of each such person only to the extent such stock ownership is identical with respect to each such corporation.

When one or more of the corporations subject to inclusion, including the common parent corporation, is a nonstock corporation, the term "stock" as used in this subdivision shall refer to the nonstock corporation membership or membership voting rights, as is appropriate to the context.

3. Two or more entities if such entities satisfy the requirements in subdivision 1 or 2 of this definition as if they were corporations and the ownership interests therein were stock.

"Assessment" means a determination as to the proper rate of tax, the measure to which the tax rate is applied, and ultimately the amount of tax, including additional or omitted tax, that is due. An assessment shall include a written assessment made pursuant to notice by the assessing official or a self-assessment made by a taxpayer upon the filing of a return or otherwise not pursuant to notice. Assessments shall be deemed made by an assessing official when a written notice of assessment is delivered to the taxpayer by the assessing official or an employee of the assessing official, or mailed to the taxpayer at his last known address. Self-assessments shall be deemed made when a return is filed, or if no return is required, when the tax is paid. A return filed or tax paid before the last day prescribed by ordinance for the filing or payment thereof shall be deemed to be filed or paid on the last day specified for the filing of a return or the payment of tax, as the case may be.

"Base year" means the calendar year preceding the license year, except for contractors subject to the provisions of § 58.1-3715 or unless the local ordinance provides for a different period for measuring the gross receipts of a business, such as for beginning businesses or to allow an option to use the same fiscal year as for federal income tax purposes.

"Business" means a course of dealing which requires the time, attention and labor of the person so engaged for the purpose of earning a livelihood or profit. It implies a continuous and regular course of dealing, rather than an irregular or isolated transaction. A person may be engaged in more than one business. The following acts shall create a rebuttable presumption that a person is engaged in a business: (i) advertising or otherwise holding oneself out to the public as being engaged in a particular business or (ii) filing tax returns, schedules and documents that are required only of persons engaged in a trade or

61 *"Defense production business" means a business engaged in the design, development, or production*
62 *of materials, components, or equipment required to meet the needs of national defense.*

63 "Definite place of business" means an office or a location at which occurs a regular and continuous
64 course of dealing for thirty consecutive days or more. A definite place of business for a person engaged
65 in business may include a location leased or otherwise obtained from another person on a temporary or
66 seasonal basis and real property leased to another. A person's residence shall be deemed to be a definite
67 place of business if there is no definite place of business maintained elsewhere and the person is not
68 subject to licensure as a peddler or itinerant merchant.

69 "Entity" means a business organization, other than a sole proprietorship, that is a corporation, limited
70 liability company, limited partnership, or limited liability partnership duly organized under the laws of
71 the Commonwealth or another state.

72 "Financial services" means the buying, selling, handling, managing, investing, and providing of
73 advice regarding money, credit, securities, or other investments.

74 "Fuel sale" or "fuel sales" shall mean retail sales of alternative fuel, blended fuel, diesel fuel,
75 gasohol, or gasoline, as such terms are defined in § 58.1-2201.

76 "Gas retailer" means a person or entity engaged in business as a retailer offering to sell at retail on a
77 daily basis alternative fuel, blended fuel, diesel fuel, gasohol, or gasoline, as such terms are defined in
78 § 58.1-2201.

79 "Gross receipts" means the whole, entire, total receipts, without deduction.

80 "Independent registered representative" means an independent contractor registered with the United
81 States Securities and Exchange Commission.

82 "License year" means the calendar year for which a license is issued for the privilege of engaging in
83 business.

84 "Professional services" means services performed by architects, attorneys-at-law, certified public
85 accountants, dentists, engineers, land surveyors, surgeons, veterinarians, and practitioners of the healing
86 arts (the arts and sciences dealing with the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure or alleviation of
87 human physical or mental ailments, conditions, diseases, pain or infirmities) and such occupations, and
88 no others, as the Department of Taxation may list in the BPOL guidelines promulgated pursuant to
89 § 58.1-3701. The Department shall identify and list each occupation or vocation in which a professed
90 knowledge of some department of science or learning, gained by a prolonged course of specialized
91 instruction and study, is used in its practical application to the affairs of others, either advising, guiding,
92 or teaching them, and in serving their interests or welfare in the practice of an art or science founded on
93 it. The word "profession" implies attainments in professional knowledge as distinguished from mere
94 skill, and the application of knowledge to uses for others rather than for personal profit.

95 "Purchases" means all goods, wares and merchandise received for sale at each definite place of
96 business of a wholesale merchant. The term shall also include the cost of manufacture of all goods,
97 wares and merchandise manufactured by any wholesale merchant and sold or offered for sale. A
98 wholesale merchant may elect to report the gross receipts from the sale of manufactured goods, wares
99 and merchandise if it cannot determine the cost of manufacture or chooses not to disclose the cost of
100 manufacture.

101 "Real estate services" means providing a service with respect to the purchase, sale, lease, rental, or
102 appraisal of real property.

103 "Security broker" means a "broker" as such term is defined under the Securities Exchange Act of
104 1934 (15 U.S.C. § 78a et seq.), or any successor law to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, who is
105 registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission.

106 "Security dealer" means a "dealer" as such term is defined under the Securities Exchange Act of
107 1934 (15 U.S.C. § 78a et seq.), or any successor law to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, who is
108 registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission.

109 **§ 58.1-3703. Counties, cities and towns may impose local license taxes and fees; limitation of**
110 **authority.**

111 A. The governing body of any county, city or town may charge a fee for issuing a license in an
112 amount not to exceed \$100 for any locality with a population greater than 50,000, \$50 for any locality
113 with a population of 25,000 but no more than 50,000 and \$30 for any locality with a population smaller
114 than 25,000. For purposes of this section, population may be based on the most current final population
115 estimates of the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the University of Virginia. Such governing
116 body may levy and provide for the assessment and collection of county, city or town license taxes on
117 businesses, trades, professions, occupations and callings and upon the persons, firms and corporations
118 engaged therein within the county, city or town subject to the limitations in (i) subsection C and (ii)
119 subsection A of § 58.1-3706, provided such tax shall not be assessed and collected on any amount of
120 gross receipts of each business upon which a license fee is charged. Any county, city or town with a
121 population greater than 50,000 shall reduce the fee to an amount not to exceed \$50 by January 1, 2000.

122 The ordinance imposing such license fees and levying such license taxes shall include the provisions of
123 § 58.1-3703.1.

124 B. Any county, city or town by ordinance may exempt in whole or in part from the license tax (i)
125 the design, development or other creation of computer software for lease, sale or license and (ii) private
126 businesses and industries entering into agreements for the establishment, installation, renovation,
127 remodeling, or construction of satellite classrooms for grades kindergarten through three on a site owned
128 by the business or industry and leased to the school board at no costs pursuant to § 22.1-26.1.

129 C. No county, city, or town shall impose a license fee or levy any license tax:

130 1. On any public service corporation or any motor carrier, common carrier, or other carrier of
131 passengers or property formerly certified by the Interstate Commerce Commission or presently registered
132 for insurance purposes with the Surface Transportation Board of the United States Department of
133 Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, except as provided in § 58.1-3731 or as permitted by
134 other provisions of law;

135 2. For selling farm or domestic products or nursery products, ornamental or otherwise, or for the
136 planting of nursery products, as an incident to the sale thereof, outside of the regular market houses and
137 sheds of such county, city or town, provided such products are grown or produced by the person
138 offering them for sale;

139 3. Upon the privilege or right of printing or publishing any newspaper, magazine, newsletter or other
140 publication issued daily or regularly at average intervals not exceeding three months, provided the
141 publication's subscription sales are exempt from state sales tax, or for the privilege or right of operating
142 or conducting any radio or television broadcasting station or service;

143 4. On a manufacturer for the privilege of manufacturing and selling goods, wares and merchandise at
144 wholesale at the place of manufacture. *For purposes of this subdivision, this shall include a*
145 *manufacturer that is also a defense production business selling manufacturing, rebuilding, repair, and*
146 *maintenance services at the place of manufacture (i) to the United States or (ii) for which consent of the*
147 *United States is required;*

148 5. On a person engaged in the business of severing minerals from the earth for the privilege of
149 selling the severed mineral at wholesale at the place of severance, except as provided in §§ 58.1-3712
150 and 58.1-3713;

151 6. Upon a wholesaler for the privilege of selling goods, wares and merchandise to other persons for
152 resale unless such wholesaler has a definite place of business or store in such county, city or town. This
153 subdivision shall not be construed as prohibiting any county, city or town from imposing a local license
154 tax on a peddler at wholesale pursuant to § 58.1-3718;

155 7. Upon any person, firm or corporation for engaging in the business of renting, as the owner of
156 such property, real property other than hotels, motels, motor lodges, auto courts, tourist courts, travel
157 trailer parks, campgrounds, bed and breakfast establishments, lodging houses, rooming houses, and
158 boardinghouses; however, any county, city or town imposing such a license tax on January 1, 1974,
159 shall not be precluded from the levy of such tax by the provisions of this subdivision;

160 8. [Repealed.]

161 9. On or measured by receipts for management, accounting, or administrative services provided on a
162 group basis under a nonprofit cost-sharing agreement by a corporation which is an agricultural
163 cooperative association under the provisions of Article 2 (§ 13.1-312 et seq.) of Chapter 3 of Title 13.1,
164 or a member or subsidiary or affiliated association thereof, to other members of the same group. This
165 exemption shall not exempt any such corporation from such license or other tax measured by receipts
166 from outside the group;

167 10. On or measured by receipts or purchases by an entity which is a member of an affiliated group
168 of entities from other members of the same affiliated group. This exclusion shall not exempt affiliated
169 entities from such license or other tax measured by receipts or purchases from outside the affiliated
170 group. This exclusion also shall not preclude a locality from levying a wholesale merchant's license tax
171 on an affiliated entity on those sales by the affiliated entity to a nonaffiliated entity, notwithstanding the
172 fact that the wholesale merchant's license tax would be based upon purchases from an affiliated entity.
173 Such tax shall be based on the purchase price of the goods sold to the nonaffiliated entity. As used in
174 this subdivision, the term "sales by the affiliated entity to a nonaffiliated entity" means sales by the
175 affiliated entity to a nonaffiliated entity where goods sold by the affiliated entity or its agent are
176 manufactured or stored in the Commonwealth prior to their delivery to the nonaffiliated entity;

177 11. On any insurance company subject to taxation under Chapter 25 (§ 58.1-2500 et seq.) of this title
178 or on any agent of such company;

179 12. On any bank or trust company subject to taxation in Chapter 12 (§ 58.1-1200 et seq.) of this
180 title;

181 13. Upon a taxicab driver, if the locality has imposed a license tax upon the taxicab company for
182 which the taxicab driver operates;

183 14. On any blind person operating a vending stand or other business enterprise under the jurisdiction
184 of the Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired, or a nominee of the Department, as set forth in
185 § 51.5-98;

186 15. [Expired.]

187 16. [Repealed.]

188 17. On an accredited religious practitioner in the practice of the religious tenets of any church or
189 religious denomination. "Accredited religious practitioner" shall be defined as one who is engaged solely
190 in praying for others upon accreditation by such church or religious denomination;

191 18. a. On or measured by receipts of a nonprofit organization described in Internal Revenue Code
192 § 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(19) except to the extent the organization has receipts from an unrelated trade or
193 business the income of which is taxable under Internal Revenue Code § 511 et seq. For the purpose of
194 this subdivision, "nonprofit organization" means an organization that is described in Internal Revenue
195 Code § 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(19), and to which contributions are deductible by the contributor under
196 Internal Revenue Code § 170, except that educational institutions exempt from federal income tax under
197 Internal Revenue Code § 501(c)(3) shall be limited to schools, colleges, and other similar institutions of
198 learning.

199 b. On or measured by gifts, contributions, and membership dues of a nonprofit organization.
200 Activities conducted for consideration that are similar to activities conducted for consideration by
201 for-profit businesses shall be presumed to be activities that are part of a business subject to licensure.
202 For the purpose of this subdivision, "nonprofit organization" means an organization exempt from federal
203 income tax under Internal Revenue Code § 501 other than the nonprofit organizations described in
204 subdivision a;

205 19. On any venture capital fund or other investment fund, except commissions and fees of such
206 funds. Gross receipts from the sale and rental of real estate and buildings remain taxable by the locality
207 in which the real estate is located provided the locality is otherwise authorized to tax such businesses
208 and rental of real estate;

209 20. On total assessments paid by condominium unit owners for common expenses. "Common
210 expenses" and "unit owner" have the same meanings as in § 55-79.41; or

211 21. On or measured by receipts of a qualifying transportation facility directly or indirectly owned or
212 title to which is held by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof or by the United States
213 as described in § 58.1-3606.1 and developed and/or operated pursuant to a concession under the
214 Public-Private Transportation Act of 1995 (§ 33.2-1800 et seq.) or similar federal law.

215 D. Any county, city or town may establish by ordinance a business license incentive program for
216 "qualifying businesses." For purposes of this subsection, a "qualifying business" is a business that locates
217 for the first time in the locality adopting such ordinance. A business shall not be deemed to locate in
218 such locality for the first time based on merger, acquisition, similar business combination, name change,
219 or a change in business form. Any incentive established pursuant to this subsection may extend for a
220 period not to exceed two years from the date the business locates in such locality. The business license
221 incentive program may include (i) an exemption, in whole or in part, of license taxes for any qualifying
222 business; (ii) a refund or rebate, in whole or in part, of license taxes paid by a qualifying business; or
223 (iii) other relief from license taxes for a qualifying business not prohibited by state or federal law.

224 E. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2012, any locality may exempt, by ordinance,
225 license fees or license taxes on any business that does not have an after-tax profit for the taxable year
226 and offers the income tax return of the business as proof to the local commissioner of the revenue.
227 Eligibility for this exemption shall be determined annually and it shall be the obligation of the business
228 owner to submit the applicable income tax return to the local commissioner of the revenue.
