## 9 10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

## 1. That §§ 24.2-700 and 24.2-701 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 11 § 24.2-700. Persons entitled to vote by absentee ballot. 12

13 Any registered voter may vote absentee in person in accordance with the provisions of this chapter 14 in any election in which he is qualified to vote without providing one of the reasons listed in 15 subdivisions 1 through 11.

The following registered voters may vote by a mailed absentee ballot in accordance with the 16 17 provisions of this chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:

1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or 18 19 while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to 20vote;

21 2. Any person who is (i) a member of a uniformed service, as defined in § 24.2-452, on active duty, 22 (ii) temporarily residing outside of the United States, or (iii) the spouse or dependent residing with any 23 person listed in clause (i) or (ii), and who will be absent on the day of the election from the county or 24 city in which he is entitled to vote;

25 3. Any student attending a school or institution of learning, or his spouse, who will be absent on the 26 day of election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote; 27

4. Any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy;

29 5. Any person who is confined while awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, 30 provided that the trial or release date is scheduled on or after the third day preceding the election. Any person who is awaiting trial and is a resident of the county or city where he is confined shall, on his 31 32 request, be taken to the polls to vote on election day if his trial date is postponed and he did not have 33 an opportunity to vote absentee; 34

6. Any person who is a member of an electoral board, registrar, officer of election, or custodian of voting equipment;

36 7. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because he is primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who 38 is confined at home; 39

8. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of an obligation occasioned by his religion;

9. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will 41 be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 11 or more hours 42 of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603; 43

10. Any person who is a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in 44 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in 45 § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1; or 46

11. Any person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or candidate in 47 48 a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on the day of 49 the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639. 50

## § 24.2-701. Application for absentee ballot.

51 A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for 52 official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

53 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications 54 shall be in a form approved by the State Board. 55

Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in 56 57 which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i)

58 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to 59 the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

60 An application that is completed in person at the same time that the applicant registers to vote shall be held and processed no sooner than the fifth day after the date that the applicant registered to vote; 61 however, this requirement shall not be applicable to any person who is qualified to vote absentee under 62 63 subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700.

64 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 65 printed ballots for the election are available.

For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight 66 hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately 67 68 preceding all general elections, except May general elections, and on the Saturday immediately preceding any primary election, May general election, or special election. 69

Unless the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant 70 who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to 71 72 the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that 73 he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the 74 applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address. 75 76

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

77 1. An application completed in person shall be made not less than three days prior to the election in 78 which the applicant offers to vote and completed only in the office of the general registrar. The 79 applicant shall sign the application in the presence of a registrar. The applicant shall provide one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. Any applicant who does not show one of 80 the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot 81 82 under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the general registrar for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 83 84 § 24.2-653 and this section.

85 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a 86 87 device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the registrar or, if made under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a federal postcard application prescribed pursuant to 52 U.S.C. § 20301(b)(2). The federal postcard application may be accepted the 88 89 90 later of (i) 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month 91 prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to the 92 appropriate registrar no later than 5:00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the 93 applicant offers to vote. 94

C. Applications for *mailed* absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

95 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election; 96

97 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide 98 99 the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to 100 him. Any person who makes application under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered voter 101 may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

102 3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the 103 application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be 104 (i) the address of the applicant on file in the registration records; (ii) the address at which he will be 105 106 located while absent from his county or city; or (iii) the address at which he will be located while 107 temporarily confined due to a disability or illness. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other 108 person; and

109 4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active duty as a 110 member of the uniformed services as defined in § 24.2-452, the branch of service to which he or the 111 spouse belongs: or

112 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of 113 learning, the name of the school or institution of learning; or

114 6. In the case of any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable 115 to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy, 116 that he is a person with a disability, illness, or pregnancy; or

7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a 117 misdemeanor, the name of the institution of confinement; or 118

119 8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of his

120 employer or business; or

9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

123 10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is 124 primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at 125 home, his relationship to the family member; or

126 11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of an obligation occasioned by his religion, that he has an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

128 12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 11 or more hours of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his business or employer and hours he will be at the workplace and commuting on election day; or

132 13. In the case of a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in § 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, that he is a first responder; or

136 14. In the case of a person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or
137 candidate in a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on
138 the day of the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639, the fact that he is so
139 designated.

140 D. A registered voter who intends to vote absentee in person shall not be required to provide the
141 information specified in subsection C. The application for an absentee ballot to be cast in person shall
142 require the voter to provide the following information:

143 1. His printed name and the last four digits of his social security number; and

144 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and that includes145 his residence address in such county or city.

**146** The State Board may provide a special application for purposes of this subsection for use by the **147** general registrars and applicants.
