4. Title: Criminal Justice Services Board

5. Summary:

The proposed legislation would increase the size of the Criminal Justices Services Board and its composition. Currently, the board is comprised of 28 members. Sixteen of those members are appointed by the Governor, of which all are required to represent victims, state and local governments, criminal justice systems, or law-enforcement agencies. The proposed legislation would require that one additional gubernatorial appointment represent community interests and it would substitute a representative of the Virginia Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators for the one currently required from the Virginia Crime Prevention Association. Consequently, there would be a net increase of one in board size and in the number to be appointed by the Governor.

In addition, the proposed legislation would change the size and membership of the board's Committee on Training, which is a policy-making board established by statute. The Committee on Training is required to consist of 15 members of the Criminal Justice Services Board. The legislation would increase the size of the committee to 16 members from the board, one of whom would be a representative of community interests.

Finally, the legislation would direct the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security to review the composition of the Criminal Justice Services Board and develop a plan for restructuring the board in order to improve its efficiency.

8. Fiscal Implications:

Citizen members of state agency boards are not entitled to a per diem payment for attending board meetings, but may be reimbursed for their expenses. Assuming that the board member added by the proposed legislation had to stay overnight in Richmond in order to attend a board meeting, it is estimated that his or her reimbursable expenses for each board

meeting would be \$150. State law requires the Criminal Justice Services Board to meet at least four times per year.

The Department of Criminal Justice Services would be able to absorb any additional costs resulting from the legislation.
