(Effective until July 1, 2018) Exceptions. 13 14 This chapter shall not apply to: 15 1. The owner of an animal and the owner's full-time, regular employee caring for and treating the 16 animal belonging to such owner, except where the ownership of the animal was transferred for the purpose of circumventing the requirements of this chapter; 17 2. Veterinarians licensed in other states called in actual consultation with veterinarians licensed in the 18 19 Commonwealth who do not open an office or appoint a place to practice within the Commonwealth; 20 3. Veterinarians employed by the United States or by the Commonwealth while actually engaged in 21 the performance of their official duties; 22 4.
