Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 12

1. That §§ 18.2-23, 18.2-80, 18.2-81, 18.2-95 through 18.2-97, 18.2-102, 18.2-103, 18.2-108.01, 13 18.2-145.1, 18.2-150, 18.2-152.3, 18.2-162, 18.2-181, 18.2-181.1, 18.2-182, 18.2-186, 18.2-186.3, 14 18.2-187.1, 18.2-188, 18.2-195, 18.2-195.2, 18.2-197, 18.2-340.37, 19.2-289, 19.2-290, 19.2-386.16, and 15

16 29.1-553 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 18.2-23. Conspiring to trespass or commit larceny. 17

A. If any person shall conspire, confederate or combine with another or others in the Commonwealth 18 19 to go upon or remain upon the lands, buildings or premises of another, or any part, portion or area 20 thereof, having knowledge that any of them have been forbidden, either orally or in writing, to do so by 21 the owner, lessee, custodian or other person lawfully in charge thereof, or having knowledge that any of 22 them have been forbidden to do so by a sign or signs posted on such lands, buildings, premises or part, 23 portion or area thereof at a place or places where it or they may reasonably be seen, he shall be deemed 24 guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.

25 B. If any person shall conspire, confederate or combine with another or others in the Commonwealth 26 to commit larceny or counsel, assist, aid or abet another in the performance of a larceny, where the 27 aggregate value of the goods or merchandise involved is more than \$200 \$500 or more, he is guilty of a 28 felony punishable by confinement in a state correctional facility for not less than one year nor more than 29 20 years. The willful concealment of goods or merchandise of any store or other mercantile 30 establishment, while still on the premises thereof, shall be prima facie evidence of an intent to convert and defraud the owner thereof out of the value of the goods or merchandise. A violation of this 31 subsection constitutes a separate and distinct felony. 32

33 C. Jurisdiction for the trial of any person charged under this section shall be in the county or city 34 wherein any part of such conspiracy is planned, or in the county or city wherein any act is done toward 35 the consummation of such plan or conspiracy. 36

§ 18.2-80. Burning or destroying any other building or structure.

37 If any person maliciously, or with intent to defraud an insurance company or other person, burn, or 38 by the use of any explosive device or substance, maliciously destroy, in whole or in part, or cause to be 39 burned or destroyed, or aid, counsel or procure the burning or destruction of any building, bridge, lock, 40 dam or other structure, whether the property of himself or of another, at a time when any person is 41 therein or thereon, the burning or destruction whereof is not punishable under any other section of this chapter, he shall be guilty of a Class 3 felony. If he commits such offense at a time when no person is 42 in such building, or other structure, and such building, or other structure, with the property therein, be of 43 44 the value of $\frac{200}{500}$, 500 or more, he shall be guilty of a Class 4 felony, and if it and the property therein be of less value, he shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 45

§ 18.2-81. Burning or destroying personal property, standing grain, etc.

47 If any person maliciously, or with intent to defraud an insurance company or other person, set fire to 48 or burn or destroy by any explosive device or substance, or cause to be burned, or destroyed by any 49 explosive device or substance, or aid, counsel, or procure the burning or destroying by any explosive device or substance, of any personal property, standing grain or other crop, he shall, if the thing burnt or 50 51 destroyed, be of the value of $\frac{200}{500}$ or more, be guilty of a Class 4 felony; and if the thing burnt or 52 destroyed be of less value, he shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 53

§ 18.2-95. Grand larceny defined; how punished.

54 Any person who (i) commits larceny from the person of another of money or other thing of value of 55 \$5 or more, (ii) commits simple larceny not from the person of another of goods and chattels of the value of \$200 \$500 or more, or (iii) commits simple larceny not from the person of another of any 56 firearm, regardless of the firearm's value, shall be guilty of grand larceny, punishable by imprisonment 57 58 in a state correctional facility for not less than one nor more than twenty 20 years or, in the discretion

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59 of the jury or court trying the case without a jury, be confined in jail for a period not exceeding twelve 60 12 months or fined not more than \$2,500, either or both.

61 § 18.2-96. Petit larceny defined; how punished.

62 Any person who:

63 1. Commits larceny from the person of another of money or other thing of value of less than \$5, or

64 2. Commits simple larceny not from the person of another of goods and chattels of the value of less 65 than \$200 \$500, except as provided in subdivision clause (iii) of § 18.2-95, shall be deemed guilty of petit larceny, which shall be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor. 66 67

§ 18.2-96.1. Identification of certain personalty.

68 A. The owner of personal property may permanently mark such property, including any part thereof, 69 for the purpose of identification with the social security number of the owner, preceded by the letters 70 "VA.'

B. [Repealed.]

72 C. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove, alter, deface, destroy, conceal, or otherwise obscure the manufacturer's serial number or marks, including personalty marked with a social security number 73 preceded by the letters "VA," from such personal property or any part thereof, without the consent of 74 75 the owner, with intent to render it or other property unidentifiable.

D. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess such personal property or any part thereof, without 76 77 the consent of the owner, knowing that the manufacturer's serial number or any other distinguishing 78 identification number or mark, including personalty marked with a social security number preceded by 79 the letters "VA," has been removed, altered, defaced, destroyed, concealed, or otherwise obscured with 80 the intent to violate the provisions of this section.

E. A person in possession of such property which is otherwise in violation of this section may apply 81 in writing to the Bureau of Criminal Investigation, Virginia State Police, for assignment of a number for 82 83 the personal property providing he can show that he is the lawful owner of the property. If a number is issued in conformity with the provisions of this section, then the person to whom it was issued and any 84 85 person to whom the property is lawfully disposed of shall not be in violation of this section. This subsection shall apply only when the application has been filed by a person prior to arrest or 86 87 authorization of a warrant of arrest for that person by a court.

88 F. Any person convicted of an offense under this section, when the value of the personalty is less 89 than $\frac{200}{500}$, shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor and, when the value of the personalty is $\frac{200}{500}$ 90 \$500 or more, shall be guilty of a Class 5 felony. 91

§ 18.2-97. Larceny of certain animals and poultry.

92 Any person who shall be guilty of the larceny of a dog, horse, pony, mule, cow, steer, bull, or calf shall be guilty of a Class 5 felony; and any person who shall be guilty of the larceny of any poultry of 93 the value of \$5 dollars or more, but of the value of less than \$200 \$500, or of a sheep, lamb, swine, or 94 95 goat, of the value of less than \$200 \$500, shall be guilty of a Class 6 felony.

§ 18.2-102. Unauthorized use of animal, aircraft, vehicle or boat; consent; accessories or 96 97 accomplices.

98 Any person who shall take, drive or use any animal, aircraft, vehicle, boat or vessel, not his own, 99 without the consent of the owner thereof and in the absence of the owner, and with intent temporarily to deprive the owner thereof of his possession thereof, without intent to steal the same, shall be guilty of a 100 101 Class 6 felony;, provided, however, that if the value of such animal, aircraft, vehicle, boat or vessel shall be less than $\frac{200}{500}$, such person shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. The consent of the 102 103 owner of an animal, aircraft, vehicle, boat or vessel to its taking, driving or using shall not in any case 104 be presumed or implied because of such owner's consent on a previous occasion to the taking, driving or 105 using of such animal, aircraft, vehicle, boat or vessel by the same or a different person. Any person who assists in, or is a party or accessory to, or an accomplice in, any such unauthorized taking, driving or 106 107 using shall be subject to the same punishment as if he were the principal offender.

§ 18.2-103. Concealing or taking possession of merchandise; altering price tags; transferring 108 109 goods from one container to another; counseling, etc., another in performance of such acts.

Whoever, without authority, with the intention of converting goods or merchandise to his own or 110 111 another's use without having paid the full purchase price thereof, or of defrauding the owner of the value of the goods or merchandise, (i) willfully conceals or takes possession of the goods or 112 113 merchandise of any store or other mercantile establishment, or (ii) alters the price tag or other price 114 marking on such goods or merchandise, or transfers the goods from one container to another, or (iii) counsels, assists, aids or abets another in the performance of any of the above acts, when the value of 115 the goods or merchandise involved in the offense is less than \$200 \$500, shall be guilty of petit larceny 116 and, when the value of the goods or merchandise involved in the offense is $\frac{200}{500}$ or more, shall be 117 guilty of grand larceny. The willful concealment of goods or merchandise of any store or other 118 119 mercantile establishment, while still on the premises thereof, shall be prima facie evidence of an intent to convert and defraud the owner thereof out of the value of the goods or merchandise. 120

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121 § 18.2-108.01. Larceny with intent to sell or distribute; sale of stolen property; penalty.

122 A. Any person who commits larceny of property with a value of $\frac{200}{500}$ or more with the intent 123 to sell or distribute such property is guilty of a felony punishable by confinement in a state correctional facility for not less than two years nor more than 20 years. The larceny of more than one item of the 124 125 same product is prima facie evidence of intent to sell or intent to distribute for sale.

126 B. Any person who sells, attempts to sell or possesses with intent to sell or distribute any stolen property with an aggregate value of \$200 \$500 or more where he knew or should have known that the 127 128 property was stolen is guilty of a Class 5 felony. 129

- C. A violation of this section constitutes a separate and distinct offense. 130
 - § 18.2-145.1. Damaging or destroying research farm product; penalty; restitution.

131 A. Any person or entity that (i) maliciously damages or destroys any farm product, as defined in 132 § 3.2-4709, and (ii) knows the product is grown for testing or research purposes in the context of 133 product development in conjunction or coordination with a private research facility or a baccalaureate institution of higher education or any federal, state, or local government agency is guilty of a Class 1 134 135 misdemeanor if the value of the farm product was less than $\frac{200}{500}$, or a Class 6 felony if the value 136 of the farm product was \$200 \$500 or more.

137 B. The court shall order the defendant to make restitution in accordance with § 19.2-305.1 for the 138 damage or destruction caused. For the purpose of awarding restitution under this section, the court shall 139 determine the market value of the farm product prior to its damage or destruction and, in so doing, shall 140 include the cost of: (i) production, (ii) research, (iii) testing, (iv) replacement, and (v) product 141 development directly related to the product damaged or destroyed. 142

§ 18.2-150. Willfully destroying vessel, etc.

143 If any person willfully scuttle, cast away or otherwise dispose of, or in any manner destroy, except 144 as otherwise provided, a ship, vessel or other watercraft, with intent to injure or defraud any owner 145 thereof or of any property on board the same, or any insurer of such ship, vessel or other watercraft, or 146 any part thereof, or of any such property on board the same, if the same be of the value of $\frac{200}{500}$ 147 or more, he shall be guilty of a Class 4 felony, but if it be of less value than \$200, he shall be 148 guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

149 § 18.2-152.3. Computer fraud; penalty.

- 150 Any person who uses a computer or computer network, without authority and:
- 151 1. Obtains property or services by false pretenses;
- 152 2. Embezzles or commits larceny; or
- 153 3. Converts the property of another:
- 154 is guilty of the crime of computer fraud.

155 If the value of the property or services obtained is 200 \$500 or more, the crime of computer fraud 156 shall be punishable as a Class 5 felony. Where the value of the property or services obtained is less than 157 200 500, the crime of computer fraud shall be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor.

158 § 18.2-162. Damage or trespass to public services or utilities.

159 Any person who shall intentionally destroy or damage any facility which is used to furnish oil, 160 telegraph, telephone, electric, gas, sewer, wastewater or water service to the public, shall be guilty of a 161 Class 4 felony, provided that in the event *that* the destruction or damage may be remedied or repaired 162 for \$200 or less than \$500 such act shall constitute a Class 3 misdemeanor. On electric generating 163 property marked with no trespassing signs, the security personnel of a utility may detain a trespasser for 164 a period not to exceed one hour pending arrival of a law-enforcement officer.

165 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this title, any person who shall intentionally destroy or 166 damage, or attempt to destroy or damage, any such facility, equipment or material connected therewith, 167 the destruction or damage of which might, in any manner, threaten the release of radioactive materials 168 or ionizing radiation beyond the areas in which they are normally used or contained, shall be guilty of a 169 Class 4 felony, provided that in the event the destruction or damage results in the death of another due 170 to exposure to radioactive materials or ionizing radiation, such person shall be guilty of a Class 2 171 felony; provided further, that in the event the destruction or damage results in injury to another, such 172 person shall be guilty of a Class 3 felony.

§ 18.2-181. Issuing bad checks, etc., larceny.

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174 Any person who, with intent to defraud, shall make or draw or utter or deliver any check, draft, or 175 order for the payment of money, upon any bank, banking institution, trust company, or other depository, 176 knowing, at the time of such making, drawing, uttering or delivering, that the maker or drawer has not 177 sufficient funds in, or credit with, such bank, banking institution, trust company, or other depository, for 178 the payment of such check, draft or order, although no express representation is made in reference 179 thereto, shall be guilty of larceny; and, if this check, draft, or order has a represented value of \$200 180 \$500 or more, such person shall be guilty of a Class 6 felony. In cases in which such value is less than 181 \$200 \$500, the person shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

182 The word "credit" as used herein, shall be construed to mean any arrangement or understanding with 183 the bank, trust company, or other depository for the payment of such check, draft or order.

184 Any person making, drawing, uttering or delivering any such check, draft or order in payment as a 185 present consideration for goods or services for the purposes set out in this section shall be guilty as 186 provided herein. 187

§ 18.2-181.1. Issuance of bad checks.

188 It shall be a Class 6 felony for any person, within a period of ninety 90 days, to issue two or more 189 checks, drafts or orders for the payment of money in violation of § 18.2-181, which that have an aggregate represented value of $\frac{200}{500}$ or more and which that (i) are drawn upon the same account 190 191 of any bank, banking institution, trust company or other depository and (ii) are made payable to the 192 same person, firm or corporation.

193 § 18.2-182. Issuing bad checks on behalf of business firm or corporation in payment of wages; 194 penalty.

195 Any person who shall make, draw, or utter, or deliver any check, draft, or order for the payment of 196 money, upon any bank, banking institution, trust company or other depository on behalf of any business 197 firm or corporation, for the purpose of paying wages to any employee of such firm or corporation, or for the purpose of paying for any labor performed by any person for such firm or corporation, knowing, 198 199 at the time of such making, drawing, uttering or delivering, that the account upon which such check, 200 draft or order is drawn has not sufficient funds, or credit with, such bank, banking institution, trust 201 company or other depository, for the payment of such check, draft or order, although no express representation is made in reference thereto, shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor; except that if this 202 check, draft, or order has a represented value of \$200 \$500 or more, such person shall be guilty of a 203 204 Class 6 felony.

The word "credit," as used herein, shall be construed to mean any arrangement or understanding with 205 206 the bank, banking institution, trust company, or other depository for the payment of such check, draft or 207 order.

208 In addition to the criminal penalty set forth herein, such person shall be personally liable in any civil 209 action brought upon such check, draft or order. 210

§ 18.2-186. False statements to obtain property or credit.

A. A person shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor if he makes, causes to be made or conspires to 211 212 make directly, indirectly or through an agency, any materially false statement in writing, knowing it to 213 be false and intending that it be relied upon, concerning the financial condition or means or ability to 214 pay of himself, or of any other person for whom he is acting, or any firm or corporation in which he is 215 interested or for which he is acting, for the purpose of procuring, for his own benefit or for the benefit of such person, firm or corporation, the delivery of personal property, the payment of cash, the making 216 of a loan or credit, the extension of a credit, the discount of an account receivable, or the making, 217 218 acceptance, discount, sale or endorsement of a bill of exchange or promissory note.

B. Any person who knows that a false statement has been made in writing concerning the financial 219 220 condition or ability to pay of himself or of any person for whom he is acting, or any firm or corporation in which he is interested or for which he is acting and who, with intent to defraud, procures, upon the 221 222 faith thereof, for his own benefit, or for the benefit of the person, firm or corporation in which he is 223 interested or for which he is acting, any such delivery, payment, loan, credit, extension, discount 224 making, acceptance, sale or endorsement, shall, if the value of the thing or the amount of the loan, 225 credit or benefit obtained is \$200 \$500 or more, be guilty of grand larceny or, if the value is less than 226 \$200 \$500, be guilty of petit larceny.

227 C. Venue for the trial of any person charged with an offense under this section may be in the county 228 or city in which (i) any act was performed in furtherance of the offense, or (ii) the person charged with 229 the offense resided at the time of the offense.

230 D. As used in this section, "in writing" shall include information transmitted by computer, facsimile, 231 e-mail, Internet, or any other electronic medium, and shall not include information transmitted by any 232 such medium by voice transmission. 233

§ 18.2-186.3. Identity theft; penalty; restitution; victim assistance.

234 A. It shall be unlawful for any person, without the authorization or permission of the person or 235 persons who are the subjects of the identifying information, with the intent to defraud, for his own use 236 or the use of a third person, to:

237 1. Obtain, record, or access identifying information which is not available to the general public that 238 would assist in accessing financial resources, obtaining identification documents, or obtaining benefits of 239 such other person;

240 2. Obtain money, credit, loans, goods, or services through the use of identifying information of such 241 other person:

242 3. Obtain identification documents in such other person's name; or

243 4. Obtain, record, or access identifying information while impersonating a law-enforcement officer or

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244 an official of the government of the Commonwealth.

245 B. It shall be unlawful for any person without the authorization or permission of the person who is 246 the subject of the identifying information, with the intent to sell or distribute the information to another 247 to:

248 1. Fraudulently obtain, record, or access identifying information that is not available to the general 249 public that would assist in accessing financial resources, obtaining identification documents, or obtaining 250 benefits of such other person;

251 2. Obtain money, credit, loans, goods, or services through the use of identifying information of such 252 other person; 253

3. Obtain identification documents in such other person's name; or

254 4. Obtain, record, or access identifying information while impersonating a law-enforcement officer or 255 an official of the Commonwealth.

256 B1. It shall be unlawful for any person to use identification documents or identifying information of 257 another person, whether that person is dead or alive, or of a false or fictitious person, to avoid 258 summons, arrest, prosecution, or to impede a criminal investigation.

C. As used in this section, "identifying information" shall include but not be limited to: (i) name; (ii) 259 260 date of birth; (iii) social security number; (iv) driver's license number; (v) bank account numbers; (vi) 261 credit or debit card numbers; (vii) personal identification numbers (PIN); (viii) electronic identification 262 codes; (ix) automated or electronic signatures; (x) biometric data; (xi) fingerprints; (xii) passwords; or 263 (xiii) any other numbers or information that can be used to access a person's financial resources, obtain 264 identification, act as identification, or obtain money, credit, loans, goods, or services.

265 D. Violations of this section shall be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor. Any violation resulting 266 in financial loss of greater than \$200 \$500 or more shall be punishable as a Class 6 felony. Any second 267 or subsequent conviction shall be punishable as a Class 6 felony. Any violation of subsection B where 268 five or more persons' identifying information has been obtained, recorded, or accessed in the same 269 transaction or occurrence shall be punishable as a Class 5 felony. Any violation of subsection B where 270 50 or more persons' identifying information has been obtained, recorded, or accessed in the same 271 transaction or occurrence shall be punishable as a Class 4 felony. Any violation resulting in the arrest 272 and detention of the person whose identification documents or identifying information were used to 273 avoid summons, arrest, prosecution, or to impede a criminal investigation shall be punishable as a Class 274 5 felony. In any proceeding brought pursuant to this section, the crime shall be considered to have been 275 committed in any locality where the person whose identifying information was appropriated resides, or 276 in which any part of the offense took place, regardless of whether the defendant was ever actually in 277 such locality.

278 E. Upon conviction, in addition to any other punishment, a person found guilty of this offense shall 279 be ordered by the court to make restitution as the court deems appropriate to any person whose 280 identifying information was appropriated or to the estate of such person. Such restitution may include 281 the person's or his estate's actual expenses associated with correcting inaccuracies or errors in his credit 282 report or other identifying information.

F. Upon the request of a person whose identifying information was appropriated, the Attorney 283 284 General may provide assistance to the victim in obtaining information necessary to correct inaccuracies 285 or errors in his credit report or other identifying information; however, no legal representation shall be 286 afforded such person.

287 § 18.2-187.1. Obtaining or attempting to obtain oil, electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph, 288 cable television or electronic communication service without payment; penalty; civil liability.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person knowingly, with the intent to defraud, to obtain or attempt to 289 290 obtain, for himself or for another, oil, electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph, cable television or 291 electronic communication service by the use of any false information, or in any case where such service 292 has been disconnected by the supplier and notice of disconnection has been given.

293 B. It shall be unlawful for any person to obtain or attempt to obtain oil, electric, gas, water, 294 telephone, telegraph, cable television or electronic communication service by the use of any scheme, 295 device, means or method, or by a false application for service with intent to avoid payment of lawful 296 charges therefor.

297 B1. It shall be unlawful for any person to obtain, or attempt to obtain, electronic communication 298 service as defined in § 18.2-190.1 by the use of an unlawful electronic communication device as defined 299 in § 18.2-190.1.

300 C. The word "notice" as used in subsection A shall be notice given in writing to the person to whom 301 the service was assigned. The sending of a notice in writing by registered or certified mail in the United 302 States mail, duly stamped and addressed to such person at his last known address, requiring delivery to 303 the addressee only with return receipt requested, and the actual signing of the receipt for such mail by 304 the addressee, shall be prima facie evidence that such notice was duly received.

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305 D. Any person who violates any provisions of this section, if the value of service, credit or benefit procured is \$200 \$500 or more, shall be guilty of a Class 6 felony; or if the value is less than \$200 306 307 \$500, shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. In addition, the court may order restitution for the value 308 of the services unlawfully used and for all costs. Such costs shall be limited to actual expenses, 309 including the base wages of employees acting as witnesses for the Commonwealth, and suit costs. 310 However, the total amount of allowable costs granted hereunder shall not exceed \$250, excluding the 311 value of the service.

312 E. Any party providing oil, electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph, cable television or electronic communication service who is aggrieved by a violation of this section may, in a civil proceeding in any 313 court of competent jurisdiction, seek both injunctive and equitable relief, and an award of damages, 314 315 including attorney's attorney fees and costs. In addition to any other remedy provided by law, the party aggrieved may recover an award of actual damages or \$500, whichever is greater, for each action. 316 317

§ 18.2-188. Defrauding hotels, motels, campgrounds, boardinghouses, etc.

318 It shall be unlawful for any person, without paying therefor, and with the intent to cheat or defraud 319 the owner or keeper to: 320

1. Put up at a hotel, motel, campground or boardinghouse;

- 2. Obtain food from a restaurant or other eating house;
- 3. Gain entrance to an amusement park; or

323 4. Without having an express agreement for credit, procure food, entertainment or accommodation 324 from any hotel, motel, campground, boardinghouse, restaurant, eating house or amusement park.

325 It shall be unlawful for any person, with intent to cheat or defraud the owner or keeper out of the 326 pay therefor to obtain credit at a hotel, motel, campground, boardinghouse, restaurant or eating house for 327 food, entertainment or accommodation by means of any false show of baggage or effects brought 328 thereto.

329 It shall be unlawful for any person, with intent to cheat or defraud, to obtain credit at a hotel, motel, 330 campground, boardinghouse, restaurant, eating house or amusement park for food, entertainment or 331 accommodation through any misrepresentation or false statement.

332 It shall be unlawful for any person, with intent to cheat or defraud, to remove or cause to be 333 removed any baggage or effects from a hotel, motel, campground, boardinghouse, restaurant or eating 334 house while there is a lien existing thereon for the proper charges due from him for fare and board 335 furnished.

336 Any person who violates any provision of this section shall is, if the value of service, credit or 337 benefit procured or obtained is $\frac{200}{500}$ \$500 or more, be guilty of a Class 5 felony; or is, if the value is 338 less than \$200 \$500, guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 339

§ 18.2-195. Credit card fraud; conspiracy; penalties.

(1) A person is guilty of credit card fraud when, with intent to defraud any person, he:

341 (a) Uses for the purpose of obtaining money, goods, services or anything else of value a credit card or credit card number obtained or retained in violation of § 18.2-192 or a credit card or credit card 342 343 number which he knows is expired or revoked;

344 (b) Obtains money, goods, services or anything else of value by representing (i) without the consent 345 of the cardholder that he is the holder of a specified card or credit card number or (ii) that he is the holder of a card or credit card number and such card or credit card number has not in fact been issued; 346 347

(c) Obtains control over a credit card or credit card number as security for debt; or

348 (d) Obtains money from an issuer by use of an unmanned device of the issuer or through a person 349 other than the issuer when he knows that such advance will exceed his available credit with the issuer 350 and any available balances held by the issuer.

351 (2) A person who is authorized by an issuer to furnish money, goods, services or anything else of 352 value upon presentation of a credit card or credit card number by the cardholder, or any agent or 353 employee of such person, is guilty of a credit card fraud when, with intent to defraud the issuer or the 354 cardholder, he:

355 (a) Furnishes money, goods, services or anything else of value upon presentation of a credit card or credit card number obtained or retained in violation of § 18.2-192, or a credit card or credit card number 356 357 which he knows is expired or revoked;

358 (b) Fails to furnish money, goods, services or anything else of value which he represents or causes to 359 be represented in writing or by any other means to the issuer that he has furnished; or

360 (c) Remits to an issuer or acquirer a record of a credit card or credit card number transaction which is in excess of the monetary amount authorized by the cardholder. 361

362 (3) Conviction of credit card fraud is punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor if the value of all money, 363 goods, services and other things of value furnished in violation of this section, or if the difference between the value of all money, goods, services and anything else of value actually furnished and the 364 value represented to the issuer to have been furnished in violation of this section, does not exceed \$200 365 366 is less than \$500 in any six-month period; conviction of credit card fraud is punishable as a Class 6

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felony if such value exceeds \$200 is \$500 or more in any six-month period. 367

368 (4) Any person who conspires, confederates or combines with another, (i) either within or without 369 the Commonwealth to commit credit card fraud within the Commonwealth or (ii) within the 370 Commonwealth to commit credit card fraud within or without the Commonwealth, is guilty of a Class 6 371 felony. 372

§ 18.2-195.2. Fraudulent application for credit card; penalties.

373 A. A person shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor if he makes, causes to be made or conspires to 374 make, directly, indirectly or through an agency, any materially false statement in writing concerning the 375 financial condition or means or ability to pay of himself or of any other person for whom he is acting 376 or any firm or corporation in which he is interested or for which he is acting, knowing the statement to 377 be false and intending that it be relied upon for the purpose of procuring a credit card. However, if the 378 statement is made in response to an unrequested written solicitation from the issuer or an agent of the 379 issuer to apply for a credit card, he shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor.

380 B. A person who knows that a false statement has been made in writing concerning the financial 381 condition or ability to pay of himself or of any person for whom he is acting or any firm or corporation 382 in which he is interested or for which he is acting and who with intent to defraud, procures a credit 383 card, upon the faith of such false statement, for his own benefit, or for the benefit of the person, firm or 384 corporation in which he is interested or for which he is acting, and obtains by use of the credit card, 385 money, property, services or any thing of value, is guilty of grand larceny if the value of whatever is 386 obtained is \$200 \$500 or more or petit larceny if the value is less than \$200 \$500.

387 C. As used in this section, "in writing" shall include information transmitted by computer, facsimile, 388 e-mail, Internet, or any other electronic medium, and shall not include information transmitted by any 389 such medium by voice transmission. 390

§ 18.2-197. Criminally receiving goods and services fraudulently obtained.

391 A person is guilty of criminally receiving goods and services fraudulently obtained when he receives 392 money, goods, services or anything else of value obtained in violation of subsection (1) of § 18.2-195 393 with the knowledge or belief that the same were obtained in violation of subsection (1) of § 18.2-195. Conviction of criminal receipt of goods and services fraudulently obtained is punishable as a Class 1 394 395 misdemeanor if the value of all money, goods, services and anything else of value, obtained in violation 396 of this section, does not exceed \$200 is less than \$500 in any six-month period; conviction of criminal 397 receipt of goods and services fraudulently obtained is punishable as a Class 6 felony if such value 398 exceeds \$200 is \$500 or more in any six-month period.

§ 18.2-340.37. Criminal penalties.

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400 A. Any person who violates the provisions of this article or who willfully and knowingly files, or 401 causes to be filed, a false application, report or other document or who willfully and knowingly makes a 402 false statement, or causes a false statement to be made, on any application, report or other document 403 required to be filed with or made to the Department shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 404

B. Each day in violation shall constitute a separate offense.

405 C. Any person who converts funds derived from any charitable gaming to his own or another's use, 406 when the amount of funds is less than \$200 \$500, shall be guilty of petit larceny and, when the amount 407 of funds is \$200 \$500 or more, shall be guilty of grand larceny. The provisions of this section shall not 408 preclude the applicability of any other provision of the criminal law of the Commonwealth that may 409 apply to any course of conduct that violates this section.

410 § 19.2-289. Conviction of petit larceny.

In a prosecution for grand larceny, if it be found that the thing stolen is of less value than $\frac{200}{200}$ 411 412 \$500, the jury may find the accused guilty of petit larceny.

413 § 19.2-290. Conviction of petit larceny though thing stolen worth \$500 or more.

414 In a prosecution for petit larceny, though the thing stolen be of the value of \$200 \$500 or more, the 415 jury may find the accused guilty; and upon a conviction under this section or § 19.2-289 the accused 416 shall be sentenced for petit larceny.

§ 19.2-386.16. Forfeiture of motor vehicles used in commission of certain crimes.

417 A. Any vehicle knowingly used by the owner thereof or used by another with his knowledge of and 418 419 during the commission of, or in an attempt to commit, a second or subsequent offense of § 18.2-346, 420 18.2-347, 18.2-348, 18.2-349, 18.2-355, 18.2-356 or 18.2-357 or of a similar ordinance of any county, 421 city or town or knowingly used for the transportation of any stolen goods, chattels or other property, 422 when the value of such stolen goods, chattels or other property is $\frac{200}{500}$ or more, or any stolen 423 property obtained as a result of a robbery, without regard to the value of the property, shall be forfeited 424 to the Commonwealth. The vehicle shall be seized by any law-enforcement officer arresting the operator 425 of such vehicle for the criminal offense, and delivered to the sheriff of the county or city in which the 426 offense occurred. The officer shall take a receipt therefor.

427 B. Any vehicle knowingly used by the owner thereof or used by another with his knowledge of and 8 of 8

428 during the commission of, or in an attempt to commit, a misdemeanor violation of subsection D of 429 § 18.2-47 or a felony violation of (i) Article 3 (§ 18.2-47 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2 or (ii) 430 § 18.2-357 where the prostitute is a minor, shall be forfeited to the Commonwealth. The vehicle shall be 431 seized by any law-enforcement officer arresting the operator of such vehicle for the criminal offense, 432 and delivered to the sheriff of the county or city in which the offense occurred. The officer shall take a 433 receipt therefor.

434 C. Forfeiture of such vehicle shall be enforced as is provided in Chapter 22.1 (§ 19.2-386.1 et seq.). 435

§ 29.1-553. Selling or offering for sale; penalty.

436 A. Any person who offers for sale, sells, offers to purchase, or purchases any wild bird or wild 437 animal, or any part thereof, or any freshwater fish, except as provided by law, shall be guilty of a Class 438 1 misdemeanor. However, when the aggregate of such sales or purchases or any combination thereof, by 439 any person totals \$200 \$500 or more during any 90-day period, that person shall be guilty of a Class 6 440 felony.

441 B. Whether or not criminal charges have been placed, when any property is taken possession of by a 442 conservation police officer for the purpose of being used as evidence of a violation of this section or for 443 confiscation, the conservation police officer making such seizure shall immediately report the seizure to 444 the Attorney for the Commonwealth.

C. In any prosecution for a violation of this section, photographs of the wild bird, wild animal, or 445 446 any freshwater fish, or any part thereof shall be deemed competent evidence of such wild bird, wild 447 animal, or freshwater fish, or part thereof and shall be admissible in any proceeding, hearing, or trial of the case to the same extent as if such wild bird, wild animal, or any freshwater fish, or part thereof had 448 449 been introduced as evidence. Such photographs shall bear a written description of the wild bird, wild animal, or freshwater fish, or parts thereof, the name of the place where the alleged offense occurred, 450 the date on which the alleged offense occurred, the name of the accused, the name of the arresting 451 452 officer or investigating officer, the date of the photograph, and the name of the photographer. The photographs shall be identified by the signature of the photographer. 453

454 D. Any licensed Virginia auctioneer or licensed auction firm that sells, as a legitimate item of an 455 auction sale, wildlife mounts that have undergone the taxidermy process, shall be exempt from the 456 provisions of this section and subdivision A 11 of § 29.1-521.
