10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 16.1-288 and 63.2-100 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 11 12 § 16.1-228. Definitions.

- 13 When used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
- 14 "Abused or neglected child" means any child:

15 1. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates or inflicts, threatens to create or inflict, or allows to be created or inflicted upon such child a physical or mental injury by other than 16 accidental means, or creates a substantial risk of death, disfigurement or impairment of bodily or mental 17 functions, including, but not limited to, a child who is with his parent or other person responsible for his 18 19 care either (i) during the manufacture or attempted manufacture of a Schedule I or II controlled 20 substance, or (ii) during the unlawful sale of such substance by that child's parents or other person 21 responsible for his care, where such manufacture, or attempted manufacture or unlawful sale would 22 constitute a felony violation of § 18.2-248;

2. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care neglects or refuses to provide care 23 24 necessary for his health; however, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual 25 means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or religious 26 denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be an abused or neglected child; 27

3. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care abandons such child;

28 4. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care commits or allows to be committed any 29 sexual act upon a child in violation of the law; 30

5. Who is without parental care or guardianship caused by the unreasonable absence or the mental or physical incapacity of the child's parent, guardian, legal custodian, or other person standing in loco parentis;

33 6. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates a substantial risk of physical or 34 mental injury by knowingly leaving the child alone in the same dwelling, including an apartment as 35 defined in § 55-79.2, with a person to whom the child is not related by blood or marriage and who the 36 parent or other person responsible for his care knows has been convicted of an offense against a minor 37 for which registration is required as a violent sexual offender pursuant to § 9.1-902; or

38 7. Who has been identified as a victim of sex trafficking or severe forms of trafficking as defined in 39 the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, 22 U.S.C § 7102 et seq., and in the Justice for Victims 40 of Trafficking Act of 2015, 42 U.S.C. § 5101 et seq.

If a civil proceeding under this chapter is based solely on the parent having left the child at a 41 42 hospital or emergency medical services agency, it shall be an affirmative defense that such parent safely delivered the child to a hospital that provides 24-hour emergency services or to an attended emergency 43 44 medical services agency that employs emergency medical services personnel, within 14 days of the child's birth. For purposes of terminating parental rights pursuant to § 16.1-283 and placement for 45 adoption, the court may find such a child is a neglected child upon the ground of abandonment. 46

"Adoptive home" means the place of residence of any natural person in which a child resides as a 47 48 member of the household and in which he has been placed for the purposes of adoption or in which he 49 has been legally adopted by another member of the household.

50 "Adult" means a person 18 years of age or older.

51 "Ancillary crime" or "ancillary charge" means any delinquent act committed by a juvenile as a part 52 of the same act or transaction as, or which constitutes a part of a common scheme or plan with, a 53 delinquent act which would be a felony if committed by an adult.

"Boot camp" means a short term secure or nonsecure juvenile residential facility with highly 54 55 structured components including, but not limited to, military style drill and ceremony, physical labor, education and rigid discipline, and no less than six months of intensive aftercare. 56

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"Child," "juvenile," or "minor" means a person less than 18 years of age. 57

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58 "Child in need of services" means (i) a child whose behavior, conduct or condition presents or results 59 in a serious threat to the well-being and physical safety of the child or (ii) a child under the age of 14 60 whose behavior, conduct or condition presents or results in a serious threat to the well-being and 61 physical safety of another person; however, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or 62 63 religious denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be a child in need of services, nor 64 shall any child who habitually remains away from or habitually deserts or abandons his family as a result of what the court or the local child protective services unit determines to be incidents of physical, 65 emotional or sexual abuse in the home be considered a child in need of services for that reason alone. 66

67 However, to find that a child falls within these provisions, (i) the conduct complained of must 68 present a clear and substantial danger to the child's life or health or to the life or health of another 69 person, (ii) the child or his family is in need of treatment, rehabilitation or services not presently being 70 received, and (iii) the intervention of the court is essential to provide the treatment, rehabilitation or 71 services needed by the child or his family.

"Child in need of supervision" means:

1. A child who, while subject to compulsory school attendance, is habitually and without justification absent from school, and (i) the child has been offered an adequate opportunity to receive the benefit of any and all educational services and programs that are required to be provided by law and which meet the child's particular educational needs, (ii) the school system from which the child is absent or other appropriate agency has made a reasonable effort to effect the child's regular attendance without success, and (iii) the school system has provided documentation that it has complied with the provisions of § 22.1-258; or

2. A child who, without reasonable cause and without the consent of his parent, lawful custodian or
placement authority, remains away from or deserts or abandons his family or lawful custodian on more
than one occasion or escapes or remains away without proper authority from a residential care facility in
which he has been placed by the court, and (i) such conduct presents a clear and substantial danger to
the child's life or health, (ii) the child or his family is in need of treatment, rehabilitation or services not
presently being received, and (iii) the intervention of the court is essential to provide the treatment,
rehabilitation or services needed by the child or his family.

87 "Child welfare agency" means a child-placing agency, child-caring institution or independent foster
88 home as defined in § 63.2-100.

89 "The court" or the "juvenile court" or the "juvenile and domestic relations court" means the juvenile90 and domestic relations district court of each county or city.

91 "Delinquent act" means (i) an act designated a crime under the law of the Commonwealth, or an 92 ordinance of any city, county, town, or service district, or under federal law, (ii) a violation of § 18.2-308.7, or (iii) a violation of a court order as provided for in § 16.1-292, but shall not include an 94 act other than a violation of § 18.2-308.7, which is otherwise lawful, but is designated a crime only if 95 committed by a child. For purposes of §§ 16.1-241 and 16.1-278.9, the term shall include a refusal to 96 take a breath test in violation of § 18.2-268.2 or a similar ordinance of any county, city, or town.

97 "Delinquent child" means a child who has committed a delinquent act or an adult who has committed
98 a delinquent act prior to his 18th birthday, except where the jurisdiction of the juvenile court has been terminated under the provisions of § 16.1-269.6.

"Department" means the Department of Juvenile Justice and "Director" means the administrative head
 in charge thereof or such of his assistants and subordinates as are designated by him to discharge the
 duties imposed upon him under this law.

"Family abuse" means any act involving violence, force, or threat that results in bodily injury or
places one in reasonable apprehension of death, sexual assault, or bodily injury and that is committed by
a person against such person's family or household member. Such act includes, but is not limited to, any
forceful detention, stalking, criminal sexual assault in violation of Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of
Chapter 4 of Title 18.2, or any criminal offense that results in bodily injury or places one in reasonable
apprehension of death, sexual assault, or bodily injury.

109 "Family or household member" means (i) the person's spouse, whether or not he or she resides in the 110 same home with the person, (ii) the person's former spouse, whether or not he or she resides in the same home with the person, (iii) the person's parents, stepparents, children, stepchildren, brothers, sisters, 111 half-brothers, half-sisters, grandparents and grandchildren, regardless of whether such persons reside in 112 the same home with the person, (iv) the person's mother-in-law, father-in-law, sons-in-law, 113 daughters-in-law, brothers-in-law and sisters-in-law who reside in the same home with the person, (v) 114 any individual who has a child in common with the person, whether or not the person and that 115 individual have been married or have resided together at any time, or (vi) any individual who cohabits 116 or who, within the previous 12 months, cohabited with the person, and any children of either of them 117 then residing in the same home with the person. 118

119 "Foster care services" means the provision of a full range of casework, treatment and community

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120 services for a planned period of time to a child who is abused or neglected as defined in § 63.2-100 or 121 in need of services as defined in this section and his family when the child (i) has been identified as 122 needing services to prevent or eliminate the need for foster care placement, (ii) has been placed through 123 an agreement between the local board of social services or a public agency designated by the 124 community policy and management team and the parents or guardians where legal custody remains with 125 the parents or guardians, (iii) has been committed or entrusted to a local board of social services or 126 child welfare agency, or (iv) has been placed under the supervisory responsibility of the local board 127 pursuant to § 16.1-293.

128 "Independent living arrangement" means placement of (i) a child at least 16 years of age who is in the custody of a local board or licensed child-placing agency and has been placed by the local board or licensed child-placing agency or (ii) a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement by the Department of Juvenile Justice, in a living arrangement in which he such child or person does not have daily substitute parental supervision.

"Independent living services" means services and activities provided to a child in foster care 14 years 134 135 of age or older and who has been committed or entrusted to a local board of social services, child 136 welfare agency, or private child-placing agency. "Independent living services" may also mean services 137 and activities provided to a person who (i) was in foster care on his 18th birthday and has not yet 138 reached the age of 21 years; (ii) is between the ages of 18 and 21 and who, immediately prior to his 139 commitment to the Department of Juvenile Justice, was in the custody of a local board of social 140 services; or (iii) is a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was 141 in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement in an independent 142 living arrangement. Such services shall include counseling, education, housing, employment, and money management skills development and access to essential documents and other appropriate services to help 143 144 children or persons prepare for self-sufficiency.

"Intake officer" means a juvenile probation officer appointed as such pursuant to the authority of thischapter.

147 ^{*}Jail" or "other facility designed for the detention of adults" means a local or regional correctional 148 facility as defined in § 53.1-1, except those facilities utilized on a temporary basis as a court holding 149 cell for a child incident to a court hearing or as a temporary lock-up room or ward incident to the 150 transfer of a child to a juvenile facility.

151 "The judge" means the judge or the substitute judge of the juvenile and domestic relations district 152 court of each county or city.

153 "This law" or "the law" means the Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court Law embraced in154 this chapter.

155 "Legal custody" means (i) a legal status created by court order which vests in a custodian the right to 156 have physical custody of the child, to determine and redetermine where and with whom he shall live, 157 the right and duty to protect, train and discipline him and to provide him with food, shelter, education 158 and ordinary medical care, all subject to any residual parental rights and responsibilities or (ii) the legal 159 status created by court order of joint custody as defined in § 20-107.2.

160 "Permanent foster care placement" means the place of residence in which a child resides and in 161 which he has been placed pursuant to the provisions of §§ 63.2-900 and 63.2-908 with the expectation 162 and agreement between the placing agency and the place of permanent foster care that the child shall 163 remain in the placement until he reaches the age of majority unless modified by court order or unless 164 removed pursuant to § 16.1-251 or 63.2-1517. A permanent foster care placement may be a place of 165 residence of any natural person or persons deemed appropriate to meet a child's needs on a long-term 166 basis.

"Residual parental rights and responsibilities" means all rights and responsibilities remaining with the
parent after the transfer of legal custody or guardianship of the person, including but not limited to the
right of visitation, consent to adoption, the right to determine religious affiliation and the responsibility
for support.

171 "Secure facility" or "detention home" means a local, regional or state public or private locked
 172 residential facility that has construction fixtures designed to prevent escape and to restrict the movement
 173 and activities of children held in lawful custody.

- 174 "Shelter care" means the temporary care of children in physically unrestricting facilities.
- 175 "State Board" means the State Board of Juvenile Justice.
- 176 "Status offender" means a child who commits an act prohibited by law which would not be criminal177 if committed by an adult.
- 178 "Status offense" means an act prohibited by law which would not be an offense if committed by an adult.
- 180 "Violent juvenile felony" means any of the delinquent acts enumerated in subsection B or C of

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181 § 16.1-269.1 when committed by a juvenile 14 years of age or older.

182 § 63.2-100. Definitions.

183 As used in this title, unless the context requires a different meaning:

184 "Abused or neglected child" means any child less than 18 years of age:

185 1. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates or inflicts, threatens to create or 186 inflict, or allows to be created or inflicted upon such child a physical or mental injury by other than 187 accidental means, or creates a substantial risk of death, disfigurement, or impairment of bodily or mental 188 functions, including, but not limited to, a child who is with his parent or other person responsible for his 189 care either (i) during the manufacture or attempted manufacture of a Schedule I or II controlled 190 substance, or (ii) during the unlawful sale of such substance by that child's parents or other person 191 responsible for his care, where such manufacture, or attempted manufacture or unlawful sale would 192 constitute a felony violation of § 18.2-248;

193 2. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care neglects or refuses to provide care 194 necessary for his health. However, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual 195 means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or religious 196 denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be an abused or neglected child. Further, a 197 decision by parents who have legal authority for the child or, in the absence of parents with legal 198 authority for the child, any person with legal authority for the child, who refuses a particular medical 199 treatment for a child with a life-threatening condition shall not be deemed a refusal to provide necessary 200 care if (i) such decision is made jointly by the parents or other person with legal authority and the child; (ii) the child has reached 14 years of age and is sufficiently mature to have an informed opinion on the 201 202 subject of his medical treatment; (iii) the parents or other person with legal authority and the child have 203 considered alternative treatment options; and (iv) the parents or other person with legal authority and the 204 child believe in good faith that such decision is in the child's best interest. Nothing in this subdivision 205 shall be construed to limit the provisions of § 16.1-278.4;

3. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care abandons such child;

4. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care commits or allows to be committed any actof sexual exploitation or any sexual act upon a child in violation of the law;

5. Who is without parental care or guardianship caused by the unreasonable absence or the mental or
 physical incapacity of the child's parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco
 parentis;

6. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates a substantial risk of physical or mental injury by knowingly leaving the child alone in the same dwelling, including an apartment as defined in § 55-79.2, with a person to whom the child is not related by blood or marriage and who the parent or other person responsible for his care knows has been convicted of an offense against a minor for which registration is required as a violent sexual offender pursuant to § 9.1-902; or

7. Who has been identified as a victim of sex trafficking or severe forms of trafficking as defined in
the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, 22 U.S.C § 7102 et seq., and in the Justice for Victims
of Trafficking Act of 2015, 42 U.S.C. § 5101 et seq.

If a civil proceeding under this title is based solely on the parent having left the child at a hospital or emergency medical services agency, it shall be an affirmative defense that such parent safely delivered the child to a hospital that provides 24-hour emergency services or to an attended emergency medical services agency that employs emergency medical services providers, within 14 days of the child's birth. For purposes of terminating parental rights pursuant to § 16.1-283 and placement for adoption, the court may find such a child is a neglected child upon the ground of abandonment.

226 "Adoptive home" means any family home selected and approved by a parent, local board or a227 licensed child-placing agency for the placement of a child with the intent of adoption.

"Adoptive placement" means arranging for the care of a child who is in the custody of a child-placing agency in an approved home for the purpose of adoption.

230 "Adult abuse" means the willful infliction of physical pain, injury or mental anguish or unreasonable231 confinement of an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603.

232 "Adult day care center" means any facility that is either operated for profit or that desires licensure 233 and that provides supplementary care and protection during only a part of the day to four or more aged, 234 infirm or disabled adults who reside elsewhere, except (i) a facility or portion of a facility licensed by 235 the State Board of Health or the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, and (ii) 236 the home or residence of an individual who cares for only persons related to him by blood or marriage. 237 Included in this definition are any two or more places, establishments or institutions owned, operated or 238 controlled by a single entity and providing such supplementary care and protection to a combined total 239 of four or more aged, infirm or disabled adults.

240 "Adult exploitation" means the illegal, unauthorized, improper, or fraudulent use of an adult as
241 defined in § 63.2-1603 or his funds, property, benefits, resources, or other assets for another's profit,
242 benefit, or advantage, including a caregiver or person serving in a fiduciary capacity, or that deprives the

243 adult of his rightful use of or access to such funds, property, benefits, resources, or other assets. "Adult 244 exploitation" includes (i) an intentional breach of a fiduciary obligation to an adult to his detriment or 245 an intentional failure to use the financial resources of an adult in a manner that results in neglect of such adult; (ii) the acquisition, possession, or control of an adult's financial resources or property 246 247 through the use of undue influence, coercion, or duress; and (iii) forcing or coercing an adult to pay for 248 goods or services or perform services against his will for another's profit, benefit, or advantage if the 249 adult did not agree, or was tricked, misled, or defrauded into agreeing, to pay for such goods or services 250 or to perform such services.

"Adult foster care" means room and board, supervision, and special services to an adult who has a
 physical or mental condition. Adult foster care may be provided by a single provider for up to three
 adults.

254 "Adult neglect" means that an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603 is living under such circumstances 255 that he is not able to provide for himself or is not being provided services necessary to maintain his 256 physical and mental health and that the failure to receive such necessary services impairs or threatens to 257 impair his well-being. However, no adult shall be considered neglected solely on the basis that such adult is receiving religious nonmedical treatment or religious nonmedical nursing care in lieu of medical 259 care, provided that such treatment or care is performed in good faith and in accordance with the 260 religious practices of the adult and there is a written or oral expression of consent by that adult.

261 "Adult protective services" means services provided by the local department that are necessary to
 262 protect an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603 from abuse, neglect or exploitation.

"Assisted living care" means a level of service provided by an assisted living facility for adults who
 may have physical or mental impairments and require at least a moderate level of assistance with
 activities of daily living.

266 "Assisted living facility" means any congregate residential setting that provides or coordinates 267 personal and health care services, 24-hour supervision, and assistance (scheduled and unscheduled) for 268 the maintenance or care of four or more adults who are aged, infirm or disabled and who are cared for 269 in a primarily residential setting, except (i) a facility or portion of a facility licensed by the State Board 270 of Health or the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, but including any 271 portion of such facility not so licensed; (ii) the home or residence of an individual who cares for or 272 maintains only persons related to him by blood or marriage; (iii) a facility or portion of a facility 273 serving infirm or disabled persons between the ages of 18 and 21, or 22 if enrolled in an educational 274 program for the handicapped pursuant to § 22.1-214, when such facility is licensed by the Department as 275 a children's residential facility under Chapter 17 (§ 63.2-1700 et seq.), but including any portion of the 276 facility not so licensed; and (iv) any housing project for persons 62 years of age or older or the disabled 277 that provides no more than basic coordination of care services and is funded by the U.S. Department of 278 Housing and Urban Development, by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, or by the Virginia Housing 279 Development Authority. Included in this definition are any two or more places, establishments or 280 institutions owned or operated by a single entity and providing maintenance or care to a combined total of four or more aged, infirm or disabled adults. Maintenance or care means the protection, general 281 282 supervision and oversight of the physical and mental well-being of an aged, infirm or disabled 283 individual.

284 "Auxiliary grants" means cash payments made to certain aged, blind or disabled individuals who
285 receive benefits under Title XVI of the Social Security Act, as amended, or would be eligible to receive
286 these benefits except for excess income.

287 "Birth family" or "birth sibling" means the child's biological family or biological sibling.

"Birth parent" means the child's biological parent and, for purposes of adoptive placement, means parent(s) by previous adoption.

290 "Board" means the State Board of Social Services.

291 "Child" means any natural person under 18 years of age.

"Child day center" means a child day program offered to (i) two or more children under the age of
13 in a facility that is not the residence of the provider or of any of the children in care or (ii) 13 or
more children at any location.

295 "Child day program" means a regularly operating service arrangement for children where, during the
296 absence of a parent or guardian, a person or organization has agreed to assume responsibility for the
297 supervision, protection, and well-being of a child under the age of 13 for less than a 24-hour period.

"Child-placing agency" means any person who places children in foster homes, adoptive homes or independent living arrangements pursuant to § 63.2-1819 or a local board that places children in foster homes or adoptive homes pursuant to §§ 63.2-900, 63.2-903, and 63.2-1221. Officers, employees, or agents of the Commonwealth, or any locality acting within the scope of their authority as such, who serve as or maintain a child-placing agency, shall not be required to be licensed.

303 "Child-protective services" means the identification, receipt and immediate response to complaints

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304 and reports of alleged child abuse or neglect for children under 18 years of age. It also includes 305 assessment, and arranging for and providing necessary protective and rehabilitative services for a child 306 and his family when the child has been found to have been abused or neglected or is at risk of being 307 abused or neglected.

308 "Child support services" means any civil, criminal or administrative action taken by the Division of 309 Child Support Enforcement to locate parents; establish paternity; and establish, modify, enforce, or 310 collect child support, or child and spousal support.

"Child-welfare agency" means a child day center, child-placing agency, children's residential facility, 311 312 family day home, family day system, or independent foster home.

"Children's residential facility" means any facility, child-caring institution, or group home that is 313 314 maintained for the purpose of receiving children separated from their parents or guardians for full-time care, maintenance, protection and guidance, or for the purpose of providing independent living services 315 316 to persons between 18 and 21 years of age who are in the process of transitioning out of foster care. Children's residential facility shall not include: 317

318 1. A licensed or accredited educational institution whose pupils, in the ordinary course of events, return annually to the homes of their parents or guardians for not less than two months of summer 319 320 vacation;

2. An establishment required to be licensed as a summer camp by § 35.1-18; and

3. A licensed or accredited hospital legally maintained as such.

323 "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department, his designee or authorized 324 representative. 325

"Department" means the State Department of Social Services.

326 "Department of Health and Human Services" means the Department of Health and Human Services 327 of the United States government or any department or agency thereof that may hereafter be designated 328 as the agency to administer the Social Security Act, as amended.

"Disposable income" means that part of the income due and payable of any individual remaining 329 330 after the deduction of any amount required by law to be withheld.

331 "Energy assistance" means benefits to assist low-income households with their home heating and 332 cooling needs, including, but not limited to, purchase of materials or substances used for home heating, 333 repair or replacement of heating equipment, emergency intervention in no-heat situations, purchase or 334 repair of cooling equipment, and payment of electric bills to operate cooling equipment, in accordance 335 with § 63.2-805, or provided under the Virginia Energy Assistance Program established pursuant to the 336 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981 (Title XXVI of Public Law 97-35), as amended.

337 "Family day home" means a child day program offered in the residence of the provider or the home 338 of any of the children in care for one through 12 children under the age of 13, exclusive of the 339 provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, when at least one child receives care 340 for compensation. The provider of a licensed or registered family day home shall disclose to the parents or guardians of children in their care the percentage of time per week that persons other than the 341 provider will care for the children. Family day homes serving five through 12 children, exclusive of the 342 provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, shall be licensed. However, no family 343 day home shall care for more than four children under the age of two, including the provider's own 344 children and any children who reside in the home, unless the family day home is licensed or voluntarily 345 346 registered. However, a family day home where the children in care are all related to the provider by 347 blood or marriage shall not be required to be licensed.

348 "Family day system" means any person who approves family day homes as members of its system; 349 who refers children to available family day homes in that system; and who, through contractual 350 arrangement, may provide central administrative functions including, but not limited to, training of operators of member homes; technical assistance and consultation to operators of member homes; 351 352 inspection, supervision, monitoring, and evaluation of member homes; and referral of children to 353 available health and social services.

354 "Foster care placement" means placement of a child through (i) an agreement between the parents or 355 guardians and the local board where legal custody remains with the parents or guardians or (ii) an 356 entrustment or commitment of the child to the local board or licensed child-placing agency.

357 "Foster home" means the place of residence of any natural person in which any child, other than a 358 child by birth or adoption of such person, resides as a member of the household.

359 "General relief" means money payments and other forms of relief made to those persons mentioned in § 63.2-802 in accordance with the regulations of the Board and reimbursable in accordance with § 360 63.2-401. 361

"Independent foster home" means a private family home in which any child, other than a child by 362 birth or adoption of such person, resides as a member of the household and has been placed therein 363 independently of a child-placing agency except (i) a home in which are received only children related by 364 365 birth or adoption of the person who maintains such home and children of personal friends of such **366** person and (ii) a home in which is received a child or children committed under the provisions of subdivision A 4 of § 16.1-278.2, subdivision 6 of § 16.1-278.4, or subdivision A 13 of § 16.1-278.8.

368 "Independent living" means a planned program of services designed to assist a child age 16 and over and persons who are former foster care children *or were formerly in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice and are* between the ages of 18 and 21 in transitioning to self-sufficiency.

"Independent living arrangement" means placement of (i) a child at least 16 years of age who is in
the custody of a local board or licensed child-placing agency and has been placed by the local board or
licensed child-placing agency or (ii) a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18
and 21 who was in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement by
the Department of Juvenile Justice, in a living arrangement in which he such child or person does not
have daily substitute parental supervision.

377 "Independent living services" means services and activities provided to a child in foster care 14 years 378 of age or older who was committed or entrusted to a local board of social services, child welfare agency, or private child-placing agency. "Independent living services" may also mean services and 379 380 activities provided to a person who (i) was in foster care on his 18th birthday and has not yet reached 381 the age of 21 years or; (ii) is at least 18 years of age but who has not yet reached 21 years of age 382 between the ages of 18 and 21 and who, immediately prior to his commitment to the Department of 383 Juvenile Justice, was in the custody of a local board of social services; or (iii) is a child at least 16 384 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was in the custody of the Department of 385 Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement in an independent living arrangement. Such services 386 shall include counseling, education, housing, employment, and money management skills development, 387 access to essential documents, and other appropriate services to help children or persons prepare for 388 self-sufficiency.

389 "Independent physician" means a physician who is chosen by the resident of the assisted living
390 facility and who has no financial interest in the assisted living facility, directly or indirectly, as an
391 owner, officer, or employee or as an independent contractor with the residence.

"Intercountry placement" means the arrangement for the care of a child in an adoptive home or foster
care placement into or out of the Commonwealth by a licensed child-placing agency, court, or other
entity authorized to make such placements in accordance with the laws of the foreign country under
which it operates.

"Interstate placement" means the arrangement for the care of a child in an adoptive home, foster care
placement or in the home of the child's parent or with a relative or nonagency guardian, into or out of
the Commonwealth, by a child-placing agency or court when the full legal right of the child's parent or
nonagency guardian to plan for the child has been voluntarily terminated or limited or severed by the
action of any court.

401 "Kinship care" means the full-time care, nurturing, and protection of children by relatives.

402 "Local board" means the local board of social services representing one or more counties or cities.

403 "Local department" means the local department of social services of any county or city in this404 Commonwealth.

405 "Local director" means the director or his designated representative of the local department of the 406 city or county.

407 "Merit system plan" means those regulations adopted by the Board in the development and operation408 of a system of personnel administration meeting requirements of the federal Office of Personnel409 Management.

410 "Parental placement" means locating or effecting the placement of a child or the placing of a child in411 a family home by the child's parent or legal guardian for the purpose of foster care or adoption.

"Public assistance" means Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF); auxiliary grants to the
aged, blind and disabled; medical assistance; energy assistance; food stamps; employment services; child
care; and general relief.

"Qualified assessor" means an entity contracting with the Department of Medical Assistance Services
to perform nursing facility pre-admission screening or to complete the uniform assessment instrument for
a home and community-based waiver program, including an independent physician contracting with the
Department of Medical Assistance Services to complete the uniform assessment instrument for residents
of assisted living facilities, or any hospital that has contracted with the Department of Medical
Assistance Services to perform nursing facility pre-admission screenings.

421 "Registered family day home" means any family day home that has met the standards for voluntary
422 registration for such homes pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board and that has obtained a
423 certificate of registration from the Commissioner.

424 "Residential living care" means a level of service provided by an assisted living facility for adults
425 who may have physical or mental impairments and require only minimal assistance with the activities of
426 daily living. The definition of "residential living care" includes the services provided by independent

427 living facilities that voluntarily become licensed.

428 "Sibling" means each of two or more children having one or more parents in common.

"Social services" means foster care, adoption, adoption assistance, child-protective services, domestic
violence services, or any other services program implemented in accordance with regulations adopted by
the Board. Social services also includes adult services pursuant to Article 4 (§ 51.5-144 et seq.) of
Chapter 14 of Title 51.5 and adult protective services pursuant to Article 5 (§ 51.5-148) of Chapter 14
of Title 51.5 provided by local departments of social services in accordance with regulations and under

434 the supervision of the Commissioner for Aging and Rehabilitative Services.

435 "Special order" means an order imposing an administrative sanction issued to any party licensed
436 pursuant to this title by the Commissioner that has a stated duration of not more than 12 months. A
437 special order shall be considered a case decision as defined in § 2.2-4001.

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" or "TANF" means the program administered by the
Department through which a relative can receive monthly cash assistance for the support of his eligible
children.

441 "Temporary Assistance for Needy Families-Unemployed Parent" or "TANF-UP" means the
442 Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program for families in which both natural or adoptive
443 parents of a child reside in the home and neither parent is exempt from the Virginia Initiative for
444 Employment Not Welfare (VIEW) participation under § 63.2-609.

445 "Title IV-E Foster Care" means a federal program authorized under §§ 472 and 473 of the Social
446 Security Act, as amended, and administered by the Department through which foster care is provided on

447 behalf of qualifying children.
