That §§ 23.1-203, 23.1-907, 23.1-908, 23.1-2904, 23.1-2906.1, 23.1-3136, and 23.1-3137 of the 10 Code of Virginia are amended as follows: 11 § 23.1-203. Duties of Council. 12 13 The Council shall: 14 1. Develop a statewide strategic plan that (i) reflects the goals set forth in subsection A of 15 § 23.1-1002 or (ii) once adopted, reflects the goals and objectives developed pursuant to subdivision B 5 16 of § 23.1-309 for higher education in the Commonwealth, identifies a coordinated approach to such state and regional goals, and emphasizes the future needs for higher education in the Commonwealth at both 17 18 the undergraduate and the graduate levels and the mission, programs, facilities, and location of each of the existing institutions of higher education, each public institution's six-year plan, and such other 19 20 matters as the Council deems appropriate. The Council shall revise such plan at least once every six 21 years and shall submit such recommendations as are necessary for the implementation of the plan to the 22 Governor and the General Assembly. 23 2. Review and approve or disapprove any proposed change in the statement of mission of any public 24 institution of higher education and define the mission of all newly created public institutions of higher 25 education. The Council shall report such approvals, disapprovals, and definitions to the Governor and the General Assembly at least once every six years. No such actions shall become effective until 30 26 27 days after adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of such a 28 report. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to authorize the Council to modify any mission 29 statement adopted by the General Assembly or empower the Council to affect, either directly or 30 indirectly, the selection of faculty or the standards and criteria for admission of any public institution of higher education, whether relating to academic standards, residence, or other criteria. Faculty selection 31 and student admission policies shall remain a function of the individual public institutions of higher 32 33 education. 34 3. Study any proposed escalation of any public institution of higher education to a degree-granting 35 level higher than that level to which it is presently restricted and submit a report and recommendation to 36 the Governor and the General Assembly relating to the proposal. The study shall include the need for 37 and benefits or detriments to be derived from the escalation. No such institution shall implement any 38 such proposed escalation until the Council's report and recommendation have been submitted to the 39 General Assembly and the General Assembly approves the institution's proposal. 40 4. Review and approve or disapprove all enrollment projections proposed by each public institution 41 of higher education. The Council's projections shall be organized numerically by level of enrollment and shall be used solely for budgetary, fiscal, and strategic planning purposes. The Council shall develop 42 estimates of the number of degrees to be awarded by each public institution of higher education and 43 44 include those estimates in its reports of enrollment projections. The student admissions policies for such 45 institutions and their specific programs shall remain the sole responsibility of the individual governing boards but all baccalaureate public institutions of higher education shall adopt dual admissions policies 46 47 with comprehensive community colleges as required by § 23.1-907. 5. Review and approve or disapprove all new undergraduate or graduate academic programs that any 48 49 public institution of higher education proposes. 6. Review and require the discontinuance of any undergraduate or graduate academic program that is 50 51 presently offered by any public institution of higher education when the Council determines that such 52 academic program is (i) nonproductive in terms of the number of degrees granted, the number of 53 students served by the program, the program's effectiveness, and budgetary considerations or (ii) supported by state funds and unnecessarily duplicative of academic programs offered at other public 54 55 institutions of higher education. The Council shall make a report to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect to the discontinuance of any such academic program. No such discontinuance 56 57 shall become effective until 30 days after the adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next 58 following the filing of such report.

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7. Review and approve or disapprove the establishment of any department, school, college, branch, division, or extension of any public institution of higher education that such institution proposes to establish, whether located on or off the main campus of such institution. If any organizational change is determined by the Council to be proposed solely for the purpose of internal management and the institution's curricular offerings remain constant, the Council shall approve the proposed change. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to authorize the Council to disapprove the establishment of any such department, school, college, branch, division, or extension established by the General Assembly.

8. Review the proposed closure of any academic program in a high demand or critical shortage area, as defined by the Council, by any public institution of higher education and assist in the development of an orderly closure plan, when needed.

69 9. Develop a uniform, comprehensive data information system designed to gather all information necessary to the performance of the Council's duties. The system shall include information on 70 admissions, enrollment, self-identified students with documented disabilities, personnel, programs, 71 financing, space inventory, facilities, and such other areas as the Council deems appropriate. When 72 73 consistent with the Government Data Collection and Dissemination Practices Act (§ 2.2-3800 et seq.), 74 the Virginia Unemployment Compensation Act (§ 60.2-100 et seq.), and applicable federal law, the 75 Council, acting solely or in partnership with the Virginia Department of Education or the Virginia Employment Commission, may contract with private entities to create de-identified student records in 76 77 which all personally identifiable information has been removed for the purpose of assessing the 78 performance of institutions and specific programs relative to the workforce needs of the Commonwealth.

10. In cooperation with public institutions of higher education, develop guidelines for the assessment
of student achievement. Each such institution shall use an approved program that complies with the
guidelines of the Council and is consistent with the institution's mission and educational objectives in
the development of such assessment. The Council shall report each institution's assessment of student
achievement in the revisions to the Commonwealth's statewide strategic plan for higher education.

84 11. In cooperation with the appropriate state financial and accounting officials, develop and establish
85 uniform standards and systems of accounting, recordkeeping, and statistical reporting for public
86 institutions of higher education.

87 12. Review biennially and approve or disapprove all changes in the inventory of educational and
88 general space that any public institution of higher education proposes and report such approvals and
89 disapprovals to the Governor and the General Assembly. No such change shall become effective until 30
90 days after the adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of such
91 report.

92 13. Visit and study the operations of each public institution of higher education at such times as the
93 Council deems appropriate and conduct such other studies in the field of higher education as the Council deems appropriate or as may be requested by the Governor or the General Assembly.

95 14. Provide advisory services to each accredited nonprofit private institution of higher education
96 whose primary purpose is to provide collegiate or graduate education and not to provide religious
97 training or theological education on academic, administrative, financial, and space utilization matters.
98 The Council may review and advise on joint activities, including contracts for services between public
99 institutions of higher education and such private institutions of higher education or between such private
100 institutions of higher education and any agency or political subdivision of the Commonwealth.

101 15. Adopt such policies and regulations as the Council deems necessary to implement its duties
 102 established by state law. Each public institution of higher education shall comply with such policies and
 103 regulations.

104 16. Issue guidelines consistent with the provisions of the federal Family Educational Rights and
 105 Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. § 1232g), requiring public institutions of higher education to release a student's academic and disciplinary record to a student's parent.

107 17. Require each institution of higher education formed, chartered, or established in the 108 Commonwealth after July 1, 1980, to ensure the preservation of student transcripts in the event of 109 institutional closure or revocation of approval to operate in the Commonwealth. An institution may 110 ensure the preservation of student transcripts by binding agreement with another institution of higher 111 education with which it is not corporately connected or in such other way as the Council may authorize by regulation. In the event that an institution closes or has its approval to operate in the Commonwealth 112 113 revoked, the Council, through its director, may take such action as is necessary to secure and preserve the student transcripts until such time as an appropriate institution accepts all or some of the transcripts. 114 115 Nothing in this subdivision shall be deemed to interfere with the right of a student to his own transcripts 116 or authorize disclosure of student records except as may otherwise be authorized by law.

117 18. Require the development and submission of articulation, dual admissions, and guaranteed
 118 admissions agreements between associate-degree-granting and baccalaureate public institutions of higher
 119 education.

120 19. Provide periodic updates of base adequacy funding guidelines adopted by the Joint Subcommittee

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121 Studying Higher Education Funding Policies for each public institution of higher education.

122 20. In consultation with each public institution of higher education, develop Develop, pursuant to the 123 provisions of § 23.1-907, guidelines for a one-year uniform certificate of general studies program 124 Uniform Certificate of General Studies Program to be offered at each comprehensive community 125 college. Such program shall ensure that a comprehensive community college student who completes the 126 one-year certificate program is eligible to transfer all credits earned in academic subject coursework to a 127 baccalaureate public institution of higher education upon acceptance to such baccalaureate institution. 128 and a Passport Program. The guidelines developed pursuant to this subdivision shall be developed in 129 consultation with all public institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth and shall ensure 130 standardization, quality, and transparency in the implementation of the programs at each comprehensive 131 community college. At the discretion of the Council, private institutions of higher education eligible for

132 tuition assistance grants may also be consulted.

133 21. Cooperate with the Board of Education in matters of interest to both public elementary and 134 secondary schools and public institutions of higher education, particularly in connection with 135 coordination of the college admission requirements, coordination of teacher training programs with the 136 public school programs, and the Board of Education's Six-Year Educational Technology Plan for 137 Virginia. The Council shall encourage public institutions of higher education to design programs that 138 include the skills necessary for the successful implementation of such Plan.

139 22. Advise and provide technical assistance to the Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship **140** Committee in the implementation and administration of the Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship 141 Program pursuant to Chapter 34.1 (§ 30-231.01 et seq.) of Title 30.

142 23. Insofar as possible, seek the cooperation and utilize the facilities of existing state departments, 143 institutions, and agencies in carrying out its duties. 144

24. Serve as the coordinating council for public institutions of higher education.

145 25. Serve as the planning and coordinating agency for all postsecondary educational programs for all 146 health professions and occupations and make recommendations, including those relating to financing, for 147 providing adequate and coordinated educational programs to produce an appropriate supply of properly 148 trained personnel. The Council may conduct such studies as it deems appropriate in furtherance of the 149 requirements of this subdivision. All state departments and agencies shall cooperate with the Council in 150 the execution of its responsibilities under this subdivision.

151 26. Carry out such duties as the Governor may assign to it in response to agency designations 152 requested by the federal government.

153 27. Insofar as practicable, preserve the individuality, traditions, and sense of responsibility of each 154 public institution of higher education in carrying out its duties.

155 28. Insofar as practicable, seek the assistance and advice of each public institution of higher 156 education in fulfilling its duties and responsibilities.

157 29. Develop the Commonwealth Research and Technology Strategic Roadmap pursuant to the 158 provisions of § 23.1-3134 to be submitted to the Virginia Research Investment Committee for approval, 159 and otherwise assist the Virginia Research Investment Committee with the administration of the Virginia 160 Research Investment Fund consistent with the provisions of Article 8 (§ 23.1-3130 et seq.) of Chapter 161 31.

162 30. Administer the Virginia Longitudinal Data System as a multiagency partnership for the purposes 163 of developing educational, health, social service, and employment outcome data; improving the efficacy 164 of state services; and aiding decision making.

165 § 23.1-907. Articulation, dual admissions, and guaranteed admissions agreements; admission of 166 certain comprehensive community college graduates.

167 A. The board of visitors of each baccalaureate public institution of higher education shall develop, 168 consistent with Council guidelines and the institution's six-year plan as set forth in § 23.1-306, 169 articulation, dual admissions, and guaranteed admissions agreements with each associate-degree-granting 170 public institution of higher education.

171 B. The Council and each public institution of higher education System, in cooperation with the 172 Council and each public institution of higher education and consistent with the guidelines developed 173 pursuant to subdivision 20 of § 23.1-203, shall develop establish a passport credit program, including 174 any necessary guidelines for such program Passport Program. In developing the program, the Council 175 and each public institution of higher education shall establish competencies and standards for each 176 passport credit course. Any course that does not meet or exceed the standards developed under the 177 program shall not be deemed a passport credit course. Such passport credit program shall require that it 178 is the responsibility of the course provider to ensure that a passport credit course meets the standards of 179 the program The Passport Program shall consist of 15 course credit hours and be delivered as a component of the Certificate of General Studies Program set forth in subsection C. Each passport credit 180 Passport Program course shall satisfy a lower division general education requirement at any public 181

182 institution of higher education.

183 C. 1. The System, in consultation with the Council and each public institution of higher education 184 and consistent with the guidelines developed pursuant to subdivision 20 of § 23.1-203, shall develop a 185 one-year uniform certificate of general studies program as set forth in subdivision 20 of § 23.1-203 186 Uniform Certificate of General Studies, consisting of at least 30 course credit hours. All credits earned 187 in academic subject coursework by students attending an associate-degree-granting public institution of 188 higher education who complete the one-year uniform certificate of general studies program are 189 transferrable to a baccalaureate public institution of higher education in accordance with Council 190 guidelines The Certificate Program shall be available at each comprehensive community college.

191 2. The System shall endeavor to develop the content and curriculum of the additional courses beyond
192 the Passport Program courses that comprise the Uniform Certificate of General Studies Program in
193 such a way that each course in the Program shall be eligible for transfer to a baccalaureate public
194 institution of higher education and shall fulfill a course set forth in following a career education
195 pathway developed pursuant to subsection D.

196 D. 1. The Council shall develop guidelines for associate-degree-granting and baccalaureate public 197 institutions of higher education to use in mapping career education pathways for the completion of 198 credits in particular programs of study, including the courses recommended to be taken in a dual 199 enrollment, community college, and four-year public institution setting in order to prepare for a specific 200 career path. Such guidelines shall define the elements of a pathway and identify the standard content that shall be included in each pathway. The guidelines shall also identify the specific programs of study 201 and career paths for which pathways shall be developed, based on the most commonly used transfer 202 203 paths. Initial guidelines adopted for the mapping career education pathways shall establish a multi-year schedule for the identification, development, and implementation of the individual pathways. 204

205 2. Each baccalaureate public institution of higher education, in cooperation and consultation with 206 the System, shall develop career education pathway maps for transfer pathways consistent with the guidelines established pursuant to subdivision 1. Such program maps shall clearly set forth the classes 207 208 that a student at a comprehensive community college is encouraged to complete as part of a General 209 Education Certificate and additional electives prior to transferring to the baccalaureate institution. The 210 goal of the career education pathway maps shall be to assist students in achieving optimal efficiencies 211 in the time and cost of completing a degree program. Such program map shall also clearly state which 212 classes from the Passport Program the baccalaureate institution has received a waiver pursuant to 213 § 23.1-908 from transfer for a particular career education pathway.

214 E. 1. The Council shall prepare an annual report on the pertinent aspects of the pipeline of students transferring from comprehensive community colleges to baccalaureate public institutions of higher 215 education. Beginning with the 2019-2020 academic year, such report shall annually identify the degree 216 of success of each transfer pathway. For purposes of the report, "degree of success" shall be a 217 218 comparative measure of all transfer pathways based on completion rates, time to degree, the number of 219 credits accumulated, and grade point averages. The Council shall identify those academic courses 220 offered at comprehensive community colleges that baccalaureate public institutions of higher education 221 routinely do not accept credit from a transfer student, including those courses for which a waiver has 222 been granted pursuant to § 23.1-908. The report shall be made available at the end of each academic year and shall be shared with the Chancellor of the Virginia Community College System, each 223 224 individual comprehensive community college, and each baccalaureate public institution of higher 225 education.

226 2. To assist in the preparation of the report required by this subsection, each baccalaureate public 227 institution of higher education shall report annually to the Council, in a format determined by the 228 Council and in accordance with guidelines established by the Council, data concerning transfer students 229 and academic outcomes. Such report shall include, at a minimum, student grade point averages in the 230 first year after a transfer from a comprehensive community college, graduation rates, time to degree completion, and the number of credits at degree completion. Data shall be reported in such a manner 231 232 as to provide details regarding the outcomes of transfer students from individual comprehensive 233 community colleges compared with outcomes of college students who have enrolled solely at the 234 baccalaureate public institution of higher education and dual enrollment students at the baccalaureate 235 public institution of higher education.

236 E. F. The Council, consistent with its responsibility to facilitate the development of articulation, dual
237 admissions, and guaranteed admissions agreements set forth in §§ 23.1-203 and 23.1-908, shall develop
238 guidelines for such agreements.

E. G. Each comprehensive community college shall develop agreements for postsecondary degree attainment with the public high schools in the school divisions that such comprehensive community college serves specifying the options for students to complete an associate degree or a one-year Uniform Certificate of General Studies, Passport Program, or Uniform Certificate of General Studies concurrent with a high school diploma. Such agreements shall specify the credit available for dual enrollment

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244 courses and Advanced Placement courses with qualifying exam scores of three or higher. 245

[H. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the Virginia Military Institute.]

§ 23.1-908. State Transfer Tool.

A. The Council shall develop, in cooperation with the System and each public institution of higher 247 248 education, a State Transfer Tool that designates each general education course that is offered in an 249 associate degree program at an associate-degree-granting public institution of higher education and 250 transferable for course credit to a baccalaureate public institution of higher education. All courses offered 251 as a part of the Passport Program established pursuant to § 23.1-907 shall be transferrable to a 252 baccalaureate public institution of higher education, unless a waiver is granted pursuant to subsection 253 С.

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In developing the State Transfer Tool, the Council shall also seek the participation of private 255 institutions of higher education.

256 B. The Council shall develop guidelines to govern the development and implementation of 257 articulation, dual admissions, and guaranteed admissions agreements between associate-degree-granting 258 public institutions of higher education and baccalaureate public institutions of higher education. Dual 259 admissions agreements shall set forth (i) the obligations of each student accepted to such a program, 260 including grade point average requirements, acceptable associate degree majors, and completion 261 timetables, and (ii) the extent to which each student accepted to such a program may access the 262 privileges of enrollment at both institutions while he is enrolled at either institution. Such agreements are 263 subject to the admissions requirements of the baccalaureate public institutions of higher education.

264 C. The Council shall develop and make available to the public information identifying all passport 265 credit courses and other general education courses offered at associate-degree-granting public institutions 266 of higher education and designating those that are transferable for course credit at baccalaureate public institutions of higher education and baccalaureate private institutions of higher education A 267 268 baccalaureate public institution of higher education may seek a waiver from the Council from accepting 269 for transfer credit a course that is part of the Passport Program. The Council shall establish procedures 270 to request such waivers and shall adopt guidelines regarding the criteria used to review and issue 271 decisions regarding the waiver requests. A waiver shall not be granted allowing a baccalaureate public 272 institution to (i) generally reject the transfer of all coursework that is a part of the Passport Program or 273 (ii) generally reject a course from the Passport Program in all mapped career education pathways. An 274 application for a waiver shall identify with particularity the course the institution is seeking to waive 275 from the transfer requirement and the particular education pathway to which the waiver would apply 276 and shall provide justification for the waiver. Once a waiver is approved, notice of the waiver shall be 277 included in the online repository maintained by the System pursuant to subsection D.

278 D. Each baccalaureate public institution of higher education shall update its transfer agreements 279 annually and shall send a copy of its updated agreement and any other transfer-related documents and 280 resources, including any course transfer waivers approved by the Council pursuant to subsection C, to 281 the System. The Council shall also send to the System a copy of any transfer-related guidelines and 282 resources that it possesses. The System shall maintain a single, online repository of all such agreements, 283 documents, and resources. The repository shall include course-equivalency tools and shall identify all 284 courses labeled as Passport Program courses and any additional courses offered at 285 associate-degree-granting public institutions of higher education that are transferrable for course credit 286 at baccalaureate public institutions of higher education. Such online repository shall be available to the 287 public on the website of the Council and each baccalaureate public institution of higher education.

§ 23.1-2904. State Board; duties.

In addition to the duties of governing boards of public institutions of higher education set forth in 289 290 Chapter 13 (§ 23.1-1300 et seq.), the State Board shall:

291 1. Be the state agency with primary responsibility for coordinating workforce training at the 292 postsecondary through the associate degree level, exclusive of the career and technical education 293 programs provided through and administered by the public school system. This responsibility shall not 294 preclude other agencies from also providing such services as appropriate, but these activities shall be 295 coordinated with the comprehensive community colleges;

296 2. Report on actions that comprehensive community colleges have taken to meet the requirements of 297 § 23.1-2906 in its annual report to the General Assembly on workforce development activities required 298 by the general appropriation act;

299 3. Prepare and administer a plan providing standards and policies for the establishment, development, 300 and administration of comprehensive community colleges under its authority. It shall determine the need 301 for comprehensive community colleges and develop a statewide plan for their location and a time 302 schedule for their establishment. In the development of such plan, a principal objective is to provide and 303 maintain a system of comprehensive community colleges, as that term is defined in § 23.1-100 to make 304 appropriate educational opportunities and programs available throughout the Commonwealth. In

305 providing these offerings, the State Board shall recognize the need for excellence in all curricula and 306 shall endeavor to establish and maintain standards appropriate to the various purposes the respective 307 programs are designed to serve;

308 4. Establish policies providing for the creation of a local community college board for each 309 comprehensive community college established under this chapter and the procedures and regulations 310 under which such local boards shall operate. These boards shall assist in ascertaining educational needs 311 and enlisting community involvement and support and shall perform such other duties as may be 312 prescribed by the State Board;

313 5. Adhere to the policies of the Council for the coordination of higher education as required by law; 314 and

315 6. Develop a mental health referral policy directing comprehensive community colleges to designate 316 at least one individual at each college to serve as a point of contact with an emergency services system 317 clinician at a local community services board, or another qualified mental health services provider, for 318 the purposes of facilitating screening and referral of students who may have emergency or urgent mental 319 health needs and of assisting the college in carrying out the duties specified by §§ 23.1-802 and 320 23.1-805. Each comprehensive community college may establish relationships with community services 321 boards or other mental health providers for referral and treatment of persons with less serious mental 322 health needs.

323 7. Develop and implement, in coordination with the Virginia Department of Education, a plan to 324 establish and maintain standards to ensure quality in all dual enrollment courses offered at local school 325 divisions pursuant to § 23.1-2906.1. Such standards shall meet the same standards regarding quality and 326 consistency as are required for other courses taught in the System and shall subject dual enrollment 327 courses to the same level of evaluation and review as all other courses.

328 8. Prepare and administer a plan to standardize the courses offered, and the quality and content of 329 such courses, offered across all comprehensive community colleges, as well as to standardize the 330 application and registration process at all comprehensive community colleges. Such plan shall allow for 331 a comprehensive community college to provide additional courses, beyond the standard class content 332 offered across the System, that meet specific regional interests and needs. Regional courses shall be 333 subject to the standards of quality applied to all courses offered in the System.

334 9. Develop and implement accountability measures to review the performance of each comprehensive 335 community college at least once annually to ensure that all standards established by the Board are 336 being met, with a goal of ensuring a consistent quality of education and opportunity across the System. 337 If it is found that such standards are not being met at a particular, the Board shall develop a plan for 338 corrective action specific to the issues presented at that institution. 339

§ 23.1-2906.1. Dual enrollment; high school equivalency; workforce training.

340 A. Each comprehensive community college shall enter into agreements with the local school divisions 341 it serves to facilitate dual enrollment of eligible students into a Career Pathways program preparing 342 students to pass a high school equivalency examination offered by the local school division and a 343 postsecondary credential, certification, or license attainment program offered by the comprehensive 344 community college. The school system and comprehensive community college offering a dual enrollment 345 course shall clearly specify on any website, literature, or other materials describing or advertising the course whether the course meets the standards to be eligible for credit (i) towards a Uniform Certificate 346 347 of General Studies, (ii) as a Passport Program course, or (iii) as a general elective credit, or whether 348 the course is not likely to transfer as college credit. The equivalent non-dual enrollment course shall 349 also be specified. Dual enrollment courses may also be included in the mapping of education pathways 350 required by § 23.1-907.

351 B. The System shall maintain a database that includes information on all dual enrollment courses 352 offered in the Commonwealth, including (i) a description of each course, and (ii) the specific academic, 353 career, or technical programs in the System that will accept the course credit and which specific 354 community colleges offer such programs. 355

§ 23.1-3136. Board of Trustees.

356 A. The Authority shall be governed by a Board of Trustees (the Board) that has a total membership 357 of 15 17 members that shall consist of four members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the 358 Speaker of the House of Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional representation 359 contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; three members of the Senate to be appointed by the 360 Senate Committee on Rules; three nonlegislative citizen members to be appointed by the Governor; one nonlegislative citizen member to be appointed by the board of visitors of George Mason University; one 361 nonlegislative citizen member to be appointed by the board of visitors of Old Dominion University; one 362 nonlegislative citizen member to be appointed by the State Board; and three four members who shall 363 364 serve ex officio with voting privileges, consisting of the President of George Mason University or his designee, the President of Old Dominion University or his designee, the Chancellor of the Virginia 365 Community College System, and the Director of the Council. Nonlegislative citizen members of the 366

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367 Authority shall be citizens of the Commonwealth.

368 B. Legislative and ex officio members of the Board shall serve terms coincident with their terms of 369 office.

370 C. Appointments to fill vacancies, other than by expiration of a term, shall be for the unexpired 371 terms. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments. All members may be 372 reappointed.

373 D. After the initial staggering of terms, nonlegislative citizen members shall be appointed for a term 374 of four years.

375 E. No House member shall serve more than four consecutive two-year terms, no Senate member 376 shall serve more than two consecutive four-year terms, and no nonlegislative citizen member shall serve 377 more than two consecutive four-year terms. The remainder of any term to which a member is appointed 378 to fill a vacancy shall not constitute a term in determining the member's eligibility for reappointment.

379 F. The Board shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership. A majority of 380 the members shall constitute a quorum. The meetings of the Board shall be held at the call of the 381 chairman or whenever the majority of the members so request.

382 G. Legislative members of the Board shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12, and 383 nonlegislative citizen members shall receive such compensation for the performance of their duties as 384 provided in § 2.2-2813. All members shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses 385 incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. Funding for the 386 costs of compensation and expenses of the members shall be provided by the Authority.

387 H. George Mason University and Old Dominion University shall provide staff support to the 388 Authority and the Board. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Board, upon 389 request. 390

§ 23.1-3137. Duties of the Authority.

391 The Authority shall:

392 1. Expand access to affordable higher education in the Commonwealth by establishing the Online 393 Virginia Network (the Network) for the purpose of coordinating the online delivery of courses that 394 facilitate the completion of degrees at George Mason University and, Old Dominion University, and 395 *comprehensive community colleges;*

396 2. Encourage each public institution of higher education and each consortium of public institutions of 397 higher education that offers online courses, online degree programs, or online credential programs to 398 offer any such course, degree program, or credential program through the Network;

399 3. Oversee a process of approval for public institutions of higher education and consortia of such 400 institutions to participate in the Network, with such funds as are appropriated for such purpose and made 401 available to it;

402 4. Serve as a resource for residents of the Commonwealth and disseminate information regarding the 403 opportunities for online learning offered by institutions and consortia that participate in the Network;

404 5. Coordinate the maintenance of an online portal through which potential students may examine and 405 enroll seamlessly in Network offerings;

406 6. Collaborate with institutions and consortia that participate in the Network to ensure that the needs 407 of enrolled students are met before, during, and after enrollment through online student support systems;

408 7. To the extent practicable, ensure that courses and degree programs offered through the Network (i) 409 are accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the U.S. Department of Education or authorized 410 by the Council, as applicable; (ii) expand access to underserved populations based on income, race, 411 geography, and age; (iii) are responsive to the employment demands of the Commonwealth; (iv) employ 412 learning and delivery technologies, which may include competency-based and experiential learning, in an 413 efficient and cost-effective manner to promote flexibility for each student to pursue online courses and programs at his own pace and in his own location throughout the year; (v) minimize student expenses 414 415 and reduce time-to-degree or time-to-credential; and (vi) are offered in collaboration with existing public 416 and private providers of online courses;

417 8. Promote the refinement and implementation of articulation agreements to ensure that credits earned 418 through the Network are transferable to each other public institution of higher education and contribute 419 to on-time degree completion at each such institution;

420 9. Assist in developing processes to help institutions and consortia that participate in the Network to 421 expand their online offerings;

422 10. Ensure that any course identified as a course in the Passport Program, established pursuant to 423 § 23.1-907, is available through the Network and encourage that any course that is part of the Uniform 424 *Certificate of General Studies be made available through the Network;*

425 11. Develop specific goals for meeting the demand in the Commonwealth for affordable and 426 accessible higher education through online learning;

427 11. 12. Review and report annually to the Governor and the General Assembly on the cost structure

of funds allocated to the establishment, maintenance, and expansion of the Network. In addition, the 428 429 Authority shall examine ways to reduce the cost of online education and develop a budget that 430 incorporates estimated expected tuition revenue from online students and its use in supporting the 431 Network and assumes that any financial aid will come from existing financial aid programs; and

432 12. 13. Accept, administer, and account for any state, federal, or private moneys that it may receive. 433 Any moneys, including interest thereon, that have not been expended by the Authority by the end of 434 each fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in the accounts of the Authority.

2. That the State Board for Community Colleges shall develop an initial plan for the 435 standardization of courses offered at all comprehensive community colleges, including a timeline 436 for completion of the standardization and the identification of any resources or funding needing to 437 implement the standardization, to the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia and the 438 Chairmen of the House Committee on Education, the House Committee on Appropriations, the 439 440 Senate Committee on Education and Health, and the Senate Committee on Finance no later than 441 September 1, 2018.

442 3. That Richard Bland College shall offer a Uniform Certificate of General Studies and Passport Program in accordance with the guidelines developed by the State Council of Higher Education 443 for Virginia pursuant to subdivision 20 of sec. 23.1-203 as amended by this act. Baccalaureate 444 public institutions of higher education shall be required to accept the transfer of such credits 445

446 offered by Richard Bland College in the same manner as if such courses were offered at a

447 comprehensive community college, as required by this act.
