Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 8 9 1. That §§ 19.2-392.02, 63.2-1715, and 63.2-1716 of the Code of Virginia are amended and 10 reenacted as follows: 11 § 19.2-392.02. National criminal background checks by businesses and organizations regarding 12 employees or volunteers providing care to children or the elderly or disabled. 13 A. 51 description of the barrier crime or offenses for which the person has been arrested or has been 52 convicted, the disposition of the charge, and any other information that may be useful in identifying 53 persons arrested for or convicted of a barrier crime. 54 "Care" means the provision of care, treatment, education, training, instruction, supervision, or

55 recreation to children or the elderly or disabled. 56

"Department" means the Department of State Police.

"Employed by" means any person who is employed by, volunteers for, seeks to be employed by, or 57 seeks to volunteer for a qualified entity. 58

59 "Identification document" means a document made or issued by or under the authority of the United SB539H1

60 States government, a state, a political subdivision of a state, a foreign government, political subdivision 61 of a foreign government, an international governmental or an international quasi-governmental organization that, when completed with information concerning a particular individual, is of a type 62 63 intended or commonly accepted for the purpose of identification of individuals.

"Provider" means a person who (i) is employed by a qualified entity and has, seeks to have, or may 64 65 have unsupervised access to a child or to an elderly or disabled person to whom the qualified entity 66 provides care; (ii) is a volunteer of a qualified entity and has, seeks to have, or may have unsupervised access to a child to whom the qualified entity provides care; or (iii) owns, operates, or seeks to own or 67 68 operate a qualified entity.

69 "Qualified entity" means a business or organization that provides care to children or the elderly or 70 disabled, whether governmental, private, for profit, nonprofit, or voluntary, except organizations exempt 71 pursuant to subdivision A 10 7 of § 63.2-1715.

72 B. A qualified entity may request the Department of State Police to conduct a national criminal background check on any provider who is employed by such entity. No qualified entity may request a 73 74 national criminal background check on a provider until such provider has: 75

1. Been fingerprinted; and

76 2. Completed and signed a statement, furnished by the entity, that includes (i) his name, address, and 77 date of birth as it appears on a valid identification document; (ii) a disclosure of whether or not the 78 provider has ever been convicted of or is the subject of pending charges for a criminal offense within or 79 outside the Commonwealth, and if the provider has been convicted of a crime, a description of the crime 80 and the particulars of the conviction; (iii) a notice to the provider that the entity may request a background check; (iv) a notice to the provider that he is entitled to obtain a copy of any background 81 check report, to challenge the accuracy and completeness of any information contained in any such report, and to obtain a prompt determination as to the validity of such challenge before a final 82 83 84 determination is made by the Department; and (v) a notice to the provider that prior to the completion 85 of the background check the qualified entity may choose to deny the provider unsupervised access to children or the elderly or disabled for whom the qualified entity provides care. 86

87 C. Upon receipt of (i) a qualified entity's written request to conduct a background check on a provider, (ii) the provider's fingerprints, and (iii) a completed, signed statement as described in 88 89 subsection B, the Department shall make a determination whether the provider has been convicted of or 90 is the subject of charges of a barrier crime. To conduct its determination regarding the provider's barrier 91 crime information, the Department shall access the national criminal history background check system, 92 which is maintained by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and is based on fingerprints and other 93 methods of identification, and shall access the Central Criminal Records Exchange maintained by the Department. If the Department receives a background report lacking disposition data, the Department 94 95 shall conduct research in whatever state and local recordkeeping systems are available in order to obtain 96 complete data. The Department shall make reasonable efforts to respond to a qualified entity's inquiry 97 within 15 business days.

98 D. Any background check conducted pursuant to this section for a provider employed by a private 99 entity shall be screened by the Department of State Police. If the provider has been convicted of or is 100 under indictment for a barrier crime, the qualified entity shall be notified that the provider is not qualified to work or volunteer in a position that involves unsupervised access to children or the elderly 101 102 or disabled.

103 E. Any background check conducted pursuant to this section for a provider employed by a 104 governmental entity shall be provided to that entity.

F. In the case of a provider who desires to volunteer at a qualified entity and who is subject to a 105 national criminal background check, the Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation may each 106 charge the provider the lesser of \$18 or the actual cost to the entity of the background check conducted 107 108 with the fingerprints.

109 G. The failure to request a criminal background check pursuant to subsection B shall not be 110 considered negligence per se in any civil action. 111

## § 63.2-1715. Exemptions from licensure.

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A. The following *programs are not* child day programs *and* shall not be required to be licensed:

1. A child day center that has obtained an exemption pursuant to § 63.2-1716.

114 2. A program where, by written policy given to and signed by a parent or guardian, school-aged children are free to enter and leave the premises without permission or supervision, regardless of (i) 115 such program's location or the number of days per week of its operation; (ii) the provision of 116 transportation services, including drop-off and pick-up times; or (iii) the scheduling of breaks for snacks, 117 homework, or other activities. A program that would qualify for this exemption except that it assumes 118 119 responsibility for the supervision, protection and well-being of several children with disabilities who are 120 mainstreamed shall not be subject to licensure.

121 3. A program of instructional experience in a single focus, such as, but not limited to, computer

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122 science, archaeology, sport clinics, or music, if children under the age of six do not attend at all and if 123 no child is allowed to attend for more than 25 days in any three-month period commencing with 124 enrollment. This exemption does not apply if children merely change their enrollment to a different 125 focus area at a site offering a variety of activities and such children's attendance exceeds 25 days in a 126 three-month period.

127 4. 2. Programs of instructional or recreational activities wherein no child under age six attends for 128 more than six hours weekly with no class or activity period to exceed one and one-half hours, and no 129 child six years of age or above attends for more than six hours weekly when school is in session or 12 130 hours weekly when school is not in session. Competition, performances and exhibitions related to the 131 instructional or recreational activity shall be excluded when determining the hours of program operation.

132 5. A program that operates no more than a total of 20 program days in the course of a calendar year 133 provided that programs serving children under age six operate no more than two consecutive weeks 134 without a break of at least a week.

135 6. 3. Instructional programs offered by private schools that serve school-age children and that satisfy 136 compulsory attendance laws or *provide services under* the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as 137 amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests 138 such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

139 7. 4. Instructional programs offered by public schools that serve preschool-age children or that, 140 satisfy compulsory attendance laws, or *provide services under* the Individuals with Disabilities Education 141 Act, as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single 142 interests such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

8. 5. Early intervention programs for children eligible under Part C of the Individuals with 143 144 Disabilities Education Act, as amended, wherein no child attends for more than a total of six hours per 145 week.

146 9. 6. Practice or competition in organized competitive sports leagues.

147 10. 7. Programs of religious instruction, such as Sunday schools, vacation Bible schools, and Bar 148 Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah classes, and child-minding services provided nurseries offered by religious 149 institutions and provided for the duration of specified religious services or related activities to allow 150 parents or guardians or their designees who are on site to attend such religious worship or instructional 151 services and activities.

152 11. Child-minding services that are not available for more than three hours per day for any individual 153 child offered on site in commercial or recreational establishments if the parent or guardian (i) is not an 154 on-duty employee, except for part-time employees working less than two hours per day, (ii) can be 155 contacted and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes, and (iii) is 156 receiving or providing services or participating in activities offered by the establishment.

157 12. A certified preschool or nursery school program operated by a private school that is accredited 158 by an accrediting organization recognized by the State Board of Education pursuant to § 22.1-19 and 159 complies with the provisions of § 63.2-1717.

160 13. A program of recreational activities offered by local governments, staffed by local government 161 employees, and attended by school-age children. Such programs shall be subject to safety and 162 supervisory standards established by local governments.

163 14. 8. A program of instructional or athletic experience operated during the summer months by, and 164 as an extension of, an accredited private elementary, middle, or high school program as set forth in 165 § 22.1-19 and administered by the Virginia Council for Private Education. 166

B. The following child day programs shall not be required to be licensed:

167 1. A child day program or child day center that has obtained an exemption pursuant to § 63.2-1716.

168 2. A program where, by written policy given to and signed by a parent or guardian, school-age 169 children are free to enter and leave the premises without permission. A program that would qualify for 170 this exemption except that it assumes responsibility for the supervision, protection, and well-being of 171 several children with disabilities who are mainstreamed shall not be subject to licensure.

172 3. A program that operates no more than a total of 20 program days in the course of a calendar year, provided that programs serving children under age six operate no more than two consecutive 173 174 weeks without a break of at least a week.

175 4. Child-minding services that are not available for more than three hours per day for any individual 176 child offered on site in commercial or recreational establishments if the parent or guardian (i) can be 177 contacted and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes and (ii) is 178 receiving or providing services or participating in activities offered by the establishment.

5. A certified preschool or nursery school program operated by a private school that is accredited by 179 180 an accrediting organization recognized by the State Board of Education pursuant to § 22.1-19 and 181 complies with the provisions of § 63.2-1717.

182 6. A program of recreational activities offered by local governments, staffed by local government 210

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183 employees, and attended by school-age children. Such programs shall be subject to safety and 184 supervisory standards established by the local government offering the program.

185 7. A program offered by a local school division, operated for no more than four hours per day, staffed by local school division employees, and attended by school-age children who are enrolled in 186 187 public school within such school division. Such programs shall be subject to safety and supervisory 188 standards established by the local school division offering the program.

189 C. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day 190 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1 or 5, shall:

1. File with the Commissioner annually and prior to beginning operation of a child day program a 191 statement indicating the intent to operate a child day program, identifying the specific provision of this 192 193 section relied upon for exemption from licensure, and certifying that the child day program has 194 disclosed in writing to the parents or guardians of the children in the program the fact that it is exempt 195 from licensure;

196 2. Report to the Commissioner all incidents involving serious physical injury to or death of children 197 attending the child day program. Reports of serious physical injuries, which shall include any physical 198 injuries that require an emergency referral to an offsite health care professional or treatment in a 199 hospital, shall be submitted annually. Reports of deaths shall be submitted no later than one business 200 day after the death occurred: and

201 3. Post in a visible location on the premises notice that the child day program is operating as a 202 program exempt from licensure with basic health and safety requirements but has no direct oversight by 203 the Department.

204 D. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day 205 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1, 5, 6, or 7 shall:

206 1. Have a person trained and certified in first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation present at the 207 child day program whenever children are present or at any other location in which children attending 208 the child day program are present; 209

2. Maintain daily attendance records that document the arrival and departure of all children;

3. Have an emergency preparedness plan in place;

4. Comply with all applicable laws and regulations governing transportation of children; and

5. Comply with all safe sleep guidelines recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

213 E. The Commissioner shall inspect child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to 214 subsection B to determine compliance with the provisions of this section only upon receipt of a 215 complaint, except as otherwise provided by law.

216 Family day homes that are members of a licensed family day system shall not be required to obtain 217 a license from the Commissioner.

218 C. F. Officers, employees, or agents of the Commonwealth, or of any county, city, or town acting 219 within the scope of their authority as such, who serve as or maintain a child-placing agency shall not be 220 required to be licensed. 221

§ 63.2-1716. Child day center operated by religious institution exempt from licensure; annual 222 statement and documentary evidence required; enforcement; injunctive relief.

223 A. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter, a child day center, including a child day 224 center that is a child welfare agency operated or conducted under the auspices of a religious institution, 225 shall be exempt from the licensure requirements of this subtitle, but shall comply with the provisions of 226 this section unless it chooses to be licensed. If such religious institution chooses not to be licensed, it 227 shall file with the Commissioner, prior to beginning operation of a child day center and thereafter 228 annually, a statement of intent to operate a child day center, certification that the child day center has 229 disclosed in writing to the parents or guardians of the children in the center the fact that it is exempt 230 from licensure and has posted the fact that it is exempt from licensure in a visible location on the 231 premises, the qualifications of the personnel employed therein, and documentary evidence that:

232 1. Such religious institution has tax exempt status as a nonprofit religious institution in accordance with § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or that the real property owned and 233 234 exclusively occupied by the religious institution is exempt from local taxation.

235 2. Within the prior 90 days for the initial exemption and within the prior 180 days for exemptions 236 thereafter, the local health department and local fire marshal or Office of the State Fire Marshal, 237 whichever is appropriate, have inspected the physical facilities of the child day center and have 238 determined that the center is in compliance with applicable laws and regulations with regard to food 239 service activities, health and sanitation, water supply, building codes, and the Statewide Fire Prevention 240 Code or the Uniform Statewide Building Code.

241 3. The child day center employs supervisory personnel according to the following ratio of staff to 242 children:

243 a. One staff member to four children from ages zero to twenty-four 16 months.

b. One staff member to five children from ages 16 months to 24 months. 244

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- 245 c. One staff member to ten eight children from ages twenty four 24 months to six years 36 months.
- 246 e. d. One staff member to 10 children from ages 36 months to five years.
- 247 e. One staff member to 20 children from ages five years to nine years.
- 248 f. One staff member to twenty-five 25 children from ages six nine years and older to 12 years.

249 Staff shall be counted in the required staff-to-children ratios only when they are directly supervising 250 children. In each grouping of children, at least one adult staff member shall be regularly present. 251 However, during designated daily rest periods and designated sleep periods of evening and overnight 252 care programs, for children ages 24 16 months to six years, only one staff member shall be required to 253 be present with the children under supervision. In such cases, at least one staff member shall be 254 physically present in the same space as the children under supervision at all times. Other staff members 255 counted for purposes of the staff-to-child ratio need not be physically present in the same space as the 256 resting or sleeping children, but shall be present on the same floor as the resting or sleeping children 257 and shall have no barrier to their immediate access to the resting or sleeping children. The staff member 258 who is physically present in the same space as the sleeping children shall be able to summon additional 259 staff counted in the staff-to-child ratio without leaving the space in which the resting or sleeping 260 children are located.

261 Staff members shall be at least 16 years of age. Staff members under 18 years of age shall be under 262 the supervision of an adult staff member. Adult staff members shall supervise no more than two staff 263 members under 18 years of age at any given time.

264 4. Each person in a supervisory position has been certified by a practicing physician or physician 265 assistant to be free from any disability which would prevent him from caring for children under his 266 supervision.

- 267 5. The center is in compliance with the requirements of: 268
  - a. This section.

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- 269 b. Section 63.2-1724 relating to background checks. 270
  - c. Section 63.2-1509 relating to the reporting of suspected cases of child abuse and neglect.
- d. Chapter 3 (§ 46.2-300 et seq.) of Title 46.2 regarding a valid Virginia driver's license or 271 272 commercial driver's license; of Article 21 (§ 46.2-1157 et seq.) of Chapter 10 of Title 46.2, regarding 273 vehicle inspections; ensuring that any vehicle used to transport children is an insured motor vehicle as 274 defined in § 46.2-705; and Article 13 (§ 46.2-1095 et seq.) of Chapter 10 of Title 46.2, regarding child 275 restraint devices.
- 276 6. The following aspects of the child day center's operations are described in a written statement 277 provided to the parents or guardians of the children in the center and made available to the general 278 public: physical facilities, enrollment capacity, food services, health requirements for the staff and public 279 liability insurance.
- 280 7. A person trained and certified in first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) will be 281 present at the child day center whenever children are present or at any other location in which children 282 attending the child day center are present.
- 283 8. The child day center is in compliance with all safe sleep guidelines recommended by the American 284 Academy of Pediatrics.
- 285 B. The center shall establish and implement procedures for:
  - 1. Hand washing by staff and children before eating and after toileting and diapering.
- 287 2. Appropriate supervision of all children in care, including daily intake and dismissal procedures to 288 ensure safety of children.
- 289 3. A daily simple health screening and exclusion of sick children by a person trained to perform such 290 screenings.
- 291 4. Ensuring that a person trained and certified in first aid is present at the center whenever children 292 are present.
- 293 5. Ensuring that all children in the center are in compliance with the provisions of § 32.1-46 294 regarding the immunization of children against certain diseases.
- 295 6. 5. Ensuring that all areas of the premises accessible to children are free of obvious injury hazards, 296 including providing and maintaining sand or other cushioning material under playground equipment.
  - 7. 6. Ensuring that all staff are able to recognize the signs of child abuse and neglect.
- 298 7. Ensuring that all incidents involving serious physical injury to or death of children attending the 299 child day center are reported to the Commissioner. Reports of serious physical injuries, which shall 300 include any physical injuries that require an emergency referral to an offsite health care professional or 301 treatment in a hospital, shall be submitted annually. Reports of deaths shall be submitted no later than 302 one business day after the death occurred.
- 303 C. The Commissioner may perform on-site inspections of religious institutions to confirm compliance 304 with the provisions of this section and to investigate complaints that the religious institution is not in compliance with the provisions of this section. The Commissioner may revoke the exemption for any 305

306 child day center in serious or persistent violation of the requirements of this section. If a religious 307 institution operates a child day center and does not file the statement and documentary evidence required 308 by this section, the Commissioner shall give reasonable notice to such religious institution of the nature 309 of its noncompliance and may thereafter take such action as he determines appropriate, including a suit 310 to enjoin the operation of the child day center.

311 D. Any person who has reason to believe that a child day center falling within the provisions of this 312 section is not in compliance with the requirements of this section may report the same to the local 313 department, the local health department or the local fire marshal, each of which may inspect the child 314 day center for noncompliance, give reasonable notice to the religious institution, and thereafter may take appropriate action as provided by law, including a suit to enjoin the operation of the child day center. 315

316 E. Nothing in this section shall prohibit a child day center operated by or conducted under the auspices of a religious institution from obtaining a license pursuant to this chapter. 317

318 2. That the provisions of this act shall become effective on July 1, 2019.

3. That the Commissioner of Social Services shall develop and establish a process to gather and 319 320 track aggregate data regarding child injuries and deaths that occur at child day programs exempt 321 from licensure.

4. That the Commissioner of Social Services shall prepare a plan to implement the provisions of 322

this act, which shall include the projected costs of implementation of the provisions of this act and 323 324 the availability of funds appropriated to the Department of Social Services to pay such costs, and

shall report such plan to the Chairmen of the House Committee on Appropriations and the Senate 325 326 Committee on Finance by December 1, 2018.

327 5. That, if the Commissioner of Social Services (the Commissioner) determines that implementation of the provisions of this act requires funding in addition to amounts appropriated 328

to the Department of Social Services in the appropriation act, the Commissioner shall cease 329 implementation of the provisions of this act and shall not enforce the requirements of this act until 330

331 an amount necessary to implement the provisions of this act is appropriated by the General 332 Assembly.

333 6. That, notwithstanding the provisions of this act, all child day programs that enter into a 334 contract with the Department of Social Services or a local department of social services to provide child care services funded by the Child Care and Development Block Grant shall comply with all 335 336 applicable requirements imposed by federal law or regulation.

7. That the Commissioner of Social Services shall assess the need for different standards governing 337 338 child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to § 63.2-1716 of the Code of 339 Virginia, as amended by this act, and other child day programs that are exempt from licensure 340 and shall report his findings and conclusions to the Chairmen of the House Committee on Health,

341 Welfare and Institutions and the Senate Committee on Rehabilitation and Social Services by 342 December 1, 2018.
