4. Title: Larceny

5. Summary:

Under current law, taking goods or merchandise from a store without paying for them, altering the price tags or other price markings on goods or merchandise, or aiding or abetting another person in the performance of such acts, when the value of the goods involved is less than \$200, is a Class 1 misdemeanor, punishable by a sentence of up to 12 months in jail.

The proposed legislation would impose a mandatory minimum term of confinement of 10 days in jail if such acts involving goods valued at less than \$200 occurred within three days after the occurrence of a disaster, emergency, or major disaster that resulting in the declaration of a state of emergency by the Governor or the President.

8. Fiscal Implications:

The state reimburses local and regional jails \$4.00 per day for housing offenders convicted of misdemeanor offenses. Because the proposed legislation would impose a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 days in jail for certain offenses, it may result in an increase in state per diem payments to local and regional jails. However, because of the lack of data, it is not possible to develop a projection of any additional costs.
