4.	Title:	Health insurance; mandated coverage for autism spectrum disorder.		

- 5. Summary: Requires health insurers, health care subscription plans, and health maintenance organizations to provide coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of autism spectrum disorder in individuals of any age. Currently, such coverage is required to be provided for individuals from age two through age 10. The provision applies with respect to insurance policies, subscription contracts, and healthcare plans delivered, issued for delivery, reissued, or extended on or after January 1, 2018.

- 7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Preliminary. See Item 8.

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- **8. Fiscal Implications:** There are no fiscal implications on the State Corporation Commission. However, according to the Department of Human Resource Management (DHRM), House Bill 1369 will have an estimated fiscal impact of \$237,000, which is an increase of 21.5% over the state health plan's FY 2017 spending for the diagnosis and treatment for autism spectrum disorder. The DHRM did note that individuals with autism have less need for applied behavioral analysis treatment as they grow older.
- **9. Specific agency or political subdivisions affected:** State Corporation Commission Bureau of Insurance; Department of Human Resource Management
- 10. Technical amendment necessary: No
- **11. Other comments:** The autism health insurance mandate was enacted in 2011, creating § 38.2-3418.17 to provide coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of autism spectrum disorder in individuals from 2 to 6 years old. In 2015, the original mandate expanded the age range from ages 2 to 6 to ages 2 to 10. House Bill 1311 (and the identical Senate Bill 593) would extend the coverage to provision from ages 2 to 10 to any age with respect to insurance policies, subscription contracts, and healthcare plans delivered, issued for delivery, reissued, or extended on or after January 1, 2019. House Bill 1369 extends the coverage provision from ages 2 to 10 to any age effective January 1, 2018.
