**3. Committee:** Passed Both Houses

**4. Title:** Weekend jail time

**5. Summary:** Allows courts, for good cause and absent of objection by the Commonwealth, to impose nonconsecutive or weekend jail time for defendants convicted of a misdemeanor, traffic offense or felony that is not an act of violence provided that the active portion of the sentence remaining to be served is 45 days or less.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** The state reimburses localities a portion of the cost of housing offenders in local and regional jails through a per diem payment for each offender. The proposed legislation would not change the per diem amount or affect the total number of days any offender would be housed in a local or regional jail. Therefore, it would not have any fiscal impact on the state.
