1. **Bill Number:** SB 726ER

House of Origin Introduced Substitute Engrossed
Second House In Committee Substitute Enrolled

2. **Patron:** Dunnavant

3. **Committee:** Passed both Houses.

4. **Title:** CBD oil and THC-A oil; certification for use; dispensing.

5. **Summary:** Provides that a practitioner may issue a written certification for the use of cannabidiol (CBD) oil or THC-A oil for the treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of any diagnosed condition or disease determined by the practitioner to benefit from such use. Under current law, a practitioner may only issue such certification for the treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of intractable epilepsy. The bill increases the supply of CBD oil or THC-A oil a pharmaceutical processor may dispense from a 30-day supply to a 90-day supply. The bill reduces the minimum amount of cannabidiol or tetrahydrocannabinol acid per milliliter for a dilution of the Cannabis plant to fall under the definition of CBD oil or THC-A oil, respectively. As introduced, this bill was a recommendation of the Joint Commission on Health Care. The bill contains an emergency clause. This bill incorporates SB 597, SB 788, and SB 795 and is identical to HB 1251.

8. **Fiscal Implications:** The expansion of the use of cannabidiol oil and THC-A oil to include any disease or condition will require registration of an increased number of patients and physicians by the Board of Pharmacy. The current authority is only for patients with intractable epilepsy and neurologists who certify their need for the oil. Fees will be set at a level sufficient to cover the costs of registration.

11. **Other Comments:** HB 1251, introduced by Delegate Cline, is a companion bill.
