That §§ 4.1-204 and 4.1-212.1 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 11 § 4.1-204. Records of licensees; inspection of records and places of business. 12 13 A. Manufacturers, bottlers or wholesalers. — Every licensed manufacturer, bottler or wholesaler shall keep complete, accurate and separate records in accordance with Board regulations of all alcoholic 14 15 beverages purchased, manufactured, bottled, sold or shipped by him, and the applicable tax required by 16 § 4.1-234 or 4.1-236, if any. B. Retailers. — Every retail licensee shall keep complete, accurate and separate records, in 17 accordance with Board regulations, of all purchases of alcoholic beverages, the prices charged such 18 licensee therefor, and the names and addresses of the persons from whom purchased. Every retail 19 20 licensee shall also preserve all invoices showing his purchases for a period as specified by Board regulations. He shall also keep an accurate account of daily sales, showing quantities of alcoholic 21 22 beverages sold and the total price charged by him therefor. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 23 D, such account need not give the names or addresses of the purchasers thereof, except as may be 24 required by Board regulation for the sale of alcoholic beverages in kegs. In the case of persons holding 25 retail licenses which require sales of food to determine their qualifications for such licenses, the records 26 shall also include purchases and sales of food and nonalcoholic beverages. 27 Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection F, electronic records of retail licensees may be stored 28 off site, provided that such records are readily retrievable and available for electronic inspection by the 29 Board or its special agents at the licensed premises. However, in the case that such electronic records 30 are not readily available for electronic inspection on the licensed premises, the retail licensee may obtain 31 Board approval, for good cause shown, to permit the retail licensee to provide the records to a special agent of the Board within three business days or less, as determined by the Board, after a request is 32 33 made to inspect the records. C. Common carriers. — Common carriers of passengers by train, boat, or airplane shall keep records 34 35 of purchases and sales of alcoholic beverages and food as required by Board regulation. 36 D. Wine shippers and beer shippers. — Every wine shipper licensee and every beer shipper licensee 37 shall keep complete, accurate, and separate records in accordance with Board regulations of all 38 shipments of wine or beer to persons in the Commonwealth. Such licensees shall also remit on a 39 monthly basis an accurate account stating whether any wine, farm wine, or beer products were sold and 40 shipped and, if so, stating the total quantities of wine and beer sold and the total price charged for such 41 wine and beer. Such records shall include the names and addresses of the purchasers to whom the wine 42 and beer is shipped. 43 E. Delivery permittees. — Every holder of a delivery permit issued pursuant to § 4.1-212.1 shall keep complete, accurate, and separate records for a period of at least two years in accordance with 44 Board regulations of all deliveries of wine or beer to persons in the Commonwealth. Such permittees 45 46 shall also remit on a monthly basis an accurate account that sets forth records shall include (i) the 47 brands of wine and beer sold, (ii) the total quantities of wine and beer sold and, (iii) the total price charged for such wine and beer. Such records shall include, and (iv) the names and, addresses, and 48 49 signatures of the purchasers to whom the wine and beer is delivered. If no wine or beer was sold and delivered in any month, the permittee shall not be required to submit a report to the Board for that 50 51 month; however, every permittee must submit a report to the Board no less frequently than once every 52 12 months even if no sales or deliveries have been made in the preceding 12 months. Such purchaser 53 signatures may be in an electronic format. Permittees shall remit such records on a monthly basis for any month during which the permittee makes a delivery for which the permittee is required to collect 54 55 and remit taxes due to the Commonwealth pursuant to subsection D of § 4.1-212.1. F. Inspection. — The Board and its special agents shall be allowed free access during reasonable 56 hours to every place in the Commonwealth and to the premises of both (i) every wine shipper licensee 57 58 and beer shipper licensee and (ii) every delivery permittee wherever located where alcoholic beverages

59 are manufactured, bottled, stored, offered for sale or sold, for the purpose of examining and inspecting

60 such place and all records, invoices and accounts therein. The Board may engage the services of alcoholic beverage control authorities in any state to assist with the inspection of the premises of a wine 61 62 shipper licensee, a beer shipper licensee, or delivery permittee, or any applicant for such license or 63 permit.

For purposes of a Board inspection of the records of any retail licensees, "reasonable hours" means 64 65 the hours between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.; however, if the licensee generally is not open to the public substantially during the same hours, "reasonable hours" shall mean the business hours when the licensee 66 is open to the public. At any other time of day, if the retail licensee's records are not available for 67 68 inspection, the retailer shall provide the records to a special agent of the Board within 24 hours after a 69 request is made to inspect the records. 70

§ 4.1-212.1. Permits; delivery of wine and beer; regulations of Board.

71 A. Any brewery, winery, or farm winery located within or outside the Commonwealth that is 72 authorized to engage in the retail sale of wine or beer for off-premises consumption may apply to the 73 Board for issuance of a delivery permit that shall authorize the delivery of the brands of beer, wine, and 74 farm wine produced by the same brewery, winery, or farm winery in closed containers to consumers 75 within the Commonwealth for personal consumption.

B. Any person located within or outside the Commonwealth who is authorized to sell wine or beer at 76 77 retail for off-premises consumption in their state of domicile, and who is not a brewery, winery, or farm 78 winery, may apply for a delivery permit that shall authorize the delivery of any brands of beer, wine, 79 and farm wine it is authorized to sell in its state of domicile, in closed containers, to consumers within 80 the Commonwealth for personal consumption.

81 C. All such deliveries shall be to consumers within the Commonwealth for personal consumption only, and not for resale. All such deliveries of beer, wine, or farm wine shall be performed by *either* (i) 82 83 the owner or any agent, officer, director, shareholder or employee of the permittee or (ii) an independent contractor of the permittee, provided that the permittee has entered into a written agreement with the 84 85 independent contractor establishing that the permittee shall be vicariously liable for any violations of 86 this section committed by the independent contractor relating to any deliveries of beer, wine, or farm 87 wine made on behalf of the permittee. No more than four cases of wine nor more than four cases of 88 beer may be delivered at one time to any person in Virginia to whom alcoholic beverages may be 89 lawfully sold; except that the permittee may deliver more than four cases of wine or more than four 90 cases of beer if he notifies the Department in writing at least one business day in advance of any such 91 delivery, which notice contains the name and address of the intended recipient. The Board may adopt 92 such regulations as it reasonably deems necessary to implement the provisions of this section. Such 93 regulations shall include provisions that require (i) (a) the recipient to demonstrate, upon delivery, that 94 he is at least 21 years of age; and (ii) (b) the recipient to sign an electronic or paper form or other 95 acknowledgement of receipt as approved by the Board.

D. For purposes of §§ 4.1-234 and 4.1-236 and Chapter 6 (§ 58.1-600 et seq.) of Title 58.1, each 96 delivery of wine or beer by a permittee shall constitute a sale in Virginia. The permittee shall collect the 97 98 taxes due to the Commonwealth and remit any excise taxes monthly to the Authority and any sales taxes 99 to the Department of Taxation, if such taxes have not already been paid.
