That § 63.2-1715, as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, of the Code of 10 Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 11 § 63.2-1715. (Effective until July 1, 2019) Exemptions from licensure. 12 13 A. The following child day programs shall not be required to be licensed: 14 1. A child day center that has obtained an exemption pursuant to § 63.2-1716. 15 2. A program where, by written policy given to and signed by a parent or guardian, school-aged children are free to enter and leave the premises without permission or supervision, regardless of (i) 16 such program's location or the number of days per week of its operation; (ii) the provision of 17 transportation services, including drop-off and pick-up times; or (iii) the scheduling of breaks for snacks, 18 19 homework, or other activities. A program that would qualify for this exemption except that it assumes 20 responsibility for the supervision, protection and well-being of several children with disabilities who are 21 mainstreamed shall not be subject to licensure. 22 3. A program of instructional experience in a single focus, such as, but not limited to, computer 23 science, archaeology, sport clinics, or music, if children under the age of six do not attend at all and if 24 no child is allowed to attend for more than 25 days in any three-month period commencing with 25 enrollment. This exemption does not apply if children merely change their enrollment to a different focus area at a site offering a variety of activities and such children's attendance exceeds 25 days in a 26 27 three-month period. 28 4. Programs of instructional or recreational activities wherein no child under age six attends for more 29 than six hours weekly with no class or activity period to exceed one and one-half hours, and no child 30 six years of age or above attends for more than six hours weekly when school is in session or 12 hours 31 weekly when school is not in session. Competition, performances and exhibitions related to the instructional or recreational activity shall be excluded when determining the hours of program operation. 32 33 5. A program that operates no more than a total of 20 program days in the course of a calendar year 34 provided that programs serving children under age six operate no more than two consecutive weeks 35 without a break of at least a week. 6. Instructional programs offered by private schools that satisfy compulsory attendance laws or the 36 37 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests such as, but not limited to, music, sports, 38 39 drama, civic service, or foreign language. 7. Instructional programs offered by public schools that serve preschool-age children or that satisfy 40 41 compulsory attendance laws or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests such as, but 42 not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language. 43 8. Early intervention programs for children eligible under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities 44 45 Education Act, as amended, wherein no child attends for more than a total of six hours per week. 46 9. Practice or competition in organized competitive sports leagues. 47 10. Programs of religious instruction, such as Sunday schools, vacation Bible schools, and Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah classes, and child-minding services provided to allow parents or guardians who 48 49 are on site to attend religious worship or instructional services. 50 11. Child-minding services that are not available for more than three hours per day for any individual 51 child offered on site in commercial or recreational establishments if the parent or guardian (i) is not an 52 on-duty employee, except for part-time employees working less than two hours per day, (ii) can be 53 contacted and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes, and (iii) is receiving or providing services or participating in activities offered by the establishment. 54 55 12. A certified preschool or nursery school program operated by a private school that is accredited by an accrediting organization recognized by the State Board of Education pursuant to § 22.1-19 and 56

57 complies with the provisions of § 63.2-1717.

58 13. A program of recreational activities offered by local governments, staffed by local government

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59 employees, and attended by school-age children. Such programs shall be subject to safety and 60 supervisory standards established by local governments.

14. A program of instructional or athletic experience operated during the summer months by, and as 61 62 an extension of, an accredited private elementary, middle, or high school program as set forth in 63 § 22.1-19 and administered by the Virginia Council for Private Education.

15. A child day program offered by a local school division, staffed by local school division 64 65 employees, and attended by children who are at least four years of age and are enrolled in public school or a preschool program within such school division. Such programs shall be subject to safety and 66 supervisory standards established by the local school board. 67

68 16. Child-minding services offered on site by a small business to no more than five children at any given time, provided that the parent or guardian of every child is an on-duty employee of the small business and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes upon request. For purposes of this subdivision, "small business" means a business that has 50 or fewer employees and 69 70 71 average annual gross receipts of \$3 million or less averaged over the previous three years. 72

73 B. Family day homes that are members of a licensed family day system shall not be required to 74 obtain a license from the Commissioner.

75 C. Officers, employees, or agents of the Commonwealth, or of any county, city, or town acting within the scope of their authority as such, who serve as or maintain a child-placing agency shall not be 76 77 required to be licensed. 78

§ 63.2-1715. (Effective July 1, 2019) Exemptions from licensure.

A. The following programs are not child day programs and shall not be required to be licensed:

80 1. A program of instructional experience in a single focus, such as, but not limited to, computer science, archaeology, sport clinics, or music, if children under the age of six do not attend at all and if 81 no child is allowed to attend for more than 25 days in any three-month period commencing with 82 enrollment. This exemption does not apply if children merely change their enrollment to a different 83 focus area at a site offering a variety of activities and such children's attendance exceeds 25 days in a 84 85 three-month period.

86 2. Programs of instructional or recreational activities wherein no child under age six attends for more 87 than six hours weekly with no class or activity period to exceed one and one-half hours, and no child 88 six years of age or above attends for more than six hours weekly when school is in session or 12 hours 89 weekly when school is not in session. Competition, performances and exhibitions related to the 90 instructional or recreational activity shall be excluded when determining the hours of program operation.

91 3. Instructional programs offered by private schools that serve school-age children and that satisfy 92 compulsory attendance laws or provide services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests 93 94 such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

95 4. Instructional programs offered by public schools that serve preschool-age children, satisfy compulsory attendance laws, or provide services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 96 97 as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single 98 interests such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

99 5. Early intervention programs for children eligible under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities 100 Education Act, as amended, wherein no child attends for more than a total of six hours per week. 101

6. Practice or competition in organized competitive sports leagues.

7. Programs of religious instruction, such as Sunday schools, vacation Bible schools, Bar Mitzvah or 102 103 Bat Mitzvah classes, and nurseries offered by religious institutions and provided for the duration of specified religious services or related activities to allow parents or guardians or their designees who are 104 105 on site to attend such religious services and activities.

8. A program of instructional or athletic experience operated during the summer months by, and as 106 107 an extension of, an accredited private elementary, middle, or high school program as set forth in 108 § 22.1-19 and administered by the Virginia Council for Private Education. 109

B. The following child day programs shall not be required to be licensed:

1. A child day program or child day center that has obtained an exemption pursuant to § 63.2-1716.

111 2. A program where, by written policy given to and signed by a parent or guardian, school-age children are free to enter and leave the premises without permission. A program that would qualify for 112 113 this exemption except that it assumes responsibility for the supervision, protection, and well-being of 114 several children with disabilities who are mainstreamed shall not be subject to licensure.

3. A program that operates no more than a total of 20 program days in the course of a calendar year, 115 provided that programs serving children under age six operate no more than two consecutive weeks 116 without a break of at least a week. 117

4. Child-minding services that are not available for more than three hours per day for any individual 118 119 child offered on site in commercial or recreational establishments if the parent or guardian (i) can be 120 contacted and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes and (ii) is 121 receiving or providing services or participating in activities offered by the establishment.

122 5. A certified preschool or nursery school program operated by a private school that is accredited by 123 an accrediting organization recognized by the State Board of Education pursuant to § 22.1-19 and 124 complies with the provisions of § 63.2-1717.

125 6. A program of recreational activities offered by local governments, staffed by local government 126 employees, and attended by school-age children. Such programs shall be subject to safety and 127 supervisory standards established by the local government offering the program.

128 7. A program offered by a local school division, operated for no more than four hours per day, 129 staffed by local school division employees, and attended by children who are at least four years of age 130 and are enrolled in public school or a preschool program within such school division. Such programs 131 shall be subject to safety and supervisory standards established by the local school division offering the 132 program.

133 8. Child-minding services offered on site by a small business to no more than five children at any 134 given time, provided that the parent or guardian of every child is an on-duty employee of the small 135 business and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes upon request. For purposes of this subdivision, "small business" means a business that has 50 or fewer employees and 136 137 average annual gross receipts of \$3 million or less averaged over the previous three years.

138 C. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day 139 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1 or 5, shall:

140 1. File with the Commissioner annually and prior to beginning operation of a child day program a 141 statement indicating the intent to operate a child day program, identifying the specific provision of this 142 section relied upon for exemption from licensure, and certifying that the child day program has disclosed 143 in writing to the parents or guardians of the children in the program the fact that it is exempt from 144 licensure;

145 2. Report to the Commissioner all incidents involving serious physical injury to or death of children 146 attending the child day program. Reports of serious physical injuries, which shall include any physical 147 injuries that require an emergency referral to an offsite health care professional or treatment in a 148 hospital, shall be submitted annually. Reports of deaths shall be submitted no later than one business 149 day after the death occurred; and

150 3. Post in a visible location on the premises notice that the child day program is operating as a 151 program exempt from licensure with basic health and safety requirements but has no direct oversight by 152 the Department.

153 D. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day 154 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1, 5, 6, or 7 shall:

155 1. Have a person trained and certified in first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation present at the 156 child day program whenever children are present or at any other location in which children attending the 157 child day program are present; 158

2. Maintain daily attendance records that document the arrival and departure of all children;

3. Have an emergency preparedness plan in place;

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160 4. Comply with all applicable laws and regulations governing transportation of children; and

161 5. Comply with all safe sleep guidelines recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

162 E. The Commissioner shall inspect child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to 163 subsection B to determine compliance with the provisions of this section only upon receipt of a 164 complaint, except as otherwise provided by law.

165 F. Family day homes that are members of a licensed family day system shall not be required to obtain a license from the Commissioner. 166

167 G. Officers, employees, or agents of the Commonwealth, or of any county, city, or town acting 168 within the scope of their authority as such, who serve as or maintain a child-placing agency shall not be 169 required to be licensed.
