5	Directing the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission to study health care spending in the Commonwealth. Report.

10	WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, U.S. health care spending
11	increased 4.3 percent to reach \$3.3 trillion, or \$10,348 per person, in 2016; and
12	WHEREAS, national health care spending is projected to continue to grow at a rate of 5.6 percent
13	per year between 2016 and 2025, a rate that is 1.2 percentage points faster than the growth of the Gross
14	Domestic Product per year during the same period; and
15 16	WHEREAS, between 1991 and 2014, the average annual rate of growth for personal health care spending in the Commonwealth was 6.5 percent, according to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid
17	Services; and
18	WHEREAS, personal health care spending in the Commonwealth totaled \$62.847 billion in 2014;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, the cost of health care is a major budget consideration and increasing burden for the
21	federal government, for state and local governments, for individuals, and for businesses and other
22 23	organizations; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Joint Legislative Audit and
24	Review Commission be directed to study health care spending in the Commonwealth.
25	In conducting its study, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall (i) estimate the
26	total number of residents of the Commonwealth with public health insurance coverage, with private
27	health insurance coverage, with subsidized health insurance coverage, and without health insurance
28 29	coverage; (ii) determine the number of residents of the Commonwealth who struggle to pay health care
29 30	costs or who have delayed or failed to receive health care due to difficulty paying health care costs; (iii) determine the amounts paid by the federal government, state and local governments, private health
31	insurance providers, and private individuals for health care in the Commonwealth; and (iv) develop a
32	summary of private health care spending in the Commonwealth, including spending for uncompensated
33	care, out-of-pocket payments by patients for health care services that are not covered by insurance,
34	copayments and coinsurance payments, health insurance premium payments, and contributions to health
35	insurance premiums paid by employers on behalf of employees.
36 37	All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission for this study, upon request.
38	The Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall complete its meetings for the first year by
39	November 30, 2018, and for the second year by November 30, 2019, and the chairman shall submit to
40	the Division of Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and
41	recommendations no later than the first day of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for
42	each year. Each executive summary shall state whether the Joint Legislative Audit and Review
43 44	Commission intends to submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a House or Senate document. The executive summaries and reports
45	shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for
46	the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's
47	website.
