Report. 6 Patrons-O'Quinn, Adams, D.M., Aird, Brewer, Campbell, J.L., Davis, Delaney, Edmunds, Filler-Corn, Kory, Leftwich, Lindsey, Mullin, Pillion, Simon and Thomas; Senator: Dance 7 8 Referred to Committee on Rules 9 10 WHEREAS, the 1998 federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) required states to establish a service delivery system that consolidates access to 17 federally funded programs through one-stop centers; and 11 WHEREAS, in 1999, the General Assembly established the Virginia Workforce Council and created 12 13 the Workforce Development Program as required by the WIA; and WHEREAS, the Commonwealth has implemented the WIA by establishing a framework for one-stop 14 15 service delivery of workforce services; and WHEREAS, in 2000, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission directed its staff to review 16 the efficiency and effectiveness of the Commonwealth's workforce training efforts; and 17 WHEREAS, Item 130 E.2 of the 2002-2004 Appropriation Act directed the Joint Legislative Audit 18 19 and Review Commission to review the administration of the WIA; and 20WHEREAS, in 2003, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission issued a comprehensive 21 review of workforce training in Virginia, in which it assessed Virginia's implementation of the WIA and 22 found that Virginia lacked a coherent, coordinated system of workforce training and that no formal 23 coordination among the workforce training programs existed; and 24 WHEREAS, in 2005, the General Assembly adopted House Joint Resolution 713, which established a 25 joint subcommittee to study the need for greater consolidation or coordination of the workforce 26 development and training resources available in the Commonwealth; and 27 WHEREAS, in 2013 and 2014, the General Assembly adopted House Joint Resolution 688 and 28 § 1-11(H) of the 2014 Appropriation Act, respectively, both of which directed the Joint Legislative 29 Audit and Review Commission to update its 2003 report on the Commonwealth's Implementation of the 30 Workforce Investment Act and to further study the effectiveness of Virginia's workforce development programs at ensuring that Virginians possess the skills and credentials desired by the state's employers 31 32 and to present recommendations to ensure entities with oversight responsibilities are provided access to 33 information regarding the programs' expenditures and outcomes; and WHEREAS, in 2014, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission issued a comprehensive 34 review of workforce training in Virginia, in which it assessed the Commonwealth's workforce training 35 36 programs and found that such programs were poorly organized and out of touch with employers and the 37 state's labor market: and 38 WHEREAS, in subsequent years a number of changes have been made to the Commonwealth's 39 workforce development system, including reform of the Virginia Workforce Council into the Virginia 40 Board of Workforce Development and the creation of a Chief Workforce Development Advisor; and WHEREAS, the passage of over four years since the Joint Legislative Audit and Review 41 42 Commission's completion of its most recent assessment of the Commonwealth's workforce development 43 programs has necessitated an update and reexamination of that assessment; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Joint Legislative Audit and 44 45 Review Commission be directed to study workforce development in the Commonwealth. In conducting its study, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall examine (i) which 46 entities in the Commonwealth are conducting workforce development activities, (ii) how much money is 47 48 being spent on such activities, (iii) the sources of such money, (iv) which metrics can be used to 49 determine the effects of spending on workforce development activities, and (v) based on those metrics, 50 which entities in the Commonwealth are producing the best results. 51 All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Legislative Audit and Review 52 Commission for this study, upon request. The Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall complete its meetings for the first year by 53 November 30, 2019, and for the second year by November 30, 2020, and the chairman shall submit to 54 the Division of Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and 55 recommendations no later than the first day of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for 56 each year. Each executive summary shall state whether the Joint Legislative Audit and Review 57

- recommendations for publication as a House or Senate document. The executive summaries and reports shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's 60
